We are beginning a new collaboration with the Morrison Center to provide counseling services to students at Barnes who face transportation or access barriers. Morrison Center is currently hiring a bilingual counselor to serve our community at the school, working in close conjunction with our school counselor to be sure that the most in need are prioritized. We look forward to having this important service in our school.

Summary of Progress:

Our Barnes families have donated over 1,400 hours of their precious time to help our school continue to thrive and grow. Our afterschool program has started up with Impact NW as well as offering food backpacks to over 60 families per week in conjunction with the help of our Faith Based partners. SMART has been actively reading with our kindergarteners as well as reaching out to help after school. BEC has started preliminary meetings with the 4th and 5th grade teams to begin our STEM Connect program. Beaverton Foursquare has already held one Brain Break day to give 120 students an opportunity to be engaged with educational activities on a non-school day. Cedar Hills Baptist and Four Square Church are gearing up for our Holiday Food baskets for our families in need. Future Teachers, collaboration with Meadow Park, will begin soon. Students at the Middle school level travel to Barnes to help assist teachers in the morning before school, getting volunteer hours in while experiencing what it is like to assist in a school building.


Read to Me Program

There is a growing body of evidence that supports the importance of students being read to prior to formal reading instruction happening. By the time a 5 year old comes to kindergarten, we hope that they will have a background of 500+ books that have been shared with them. This exposure to so many books provides them with the foundation for literacy. By listening to books, they know that reading makes sense, that it's fun, is done for many reasons, and there are patterns. By having the big picture of the joy of reading, it then makes more sense to study the parts of reading.

If the overall reading experience were a great chocolate chip cookie and kids had lot of cookie experience, it would then been easier to understand the importance of quality ingredients (like baking soda or butter) that might not be as engaging or meaningful if presented in isolation. If students know great books and the purpose and joy of reading, then phonics or punctuation marks will be more meaningful.

In order for all kids to be ready, we are hoping to FLOOD our kinders with great reading experiences through a Read to Me program.

We invite volunteers to stop by to read to a child during any of theses time blocks (8:30-9:30, 9:45-10:40, 11:30-12:30, 1:20-3:00). Feel free to bring you favorite book or show up and we'll have books for you. First, make sure you have your district id badge then check in at the office. Next, head to the Kindergarten pod where you will find a "Read to Me Volunteers" station. The station includes a log book, bag with 10 books, and guidance for volunteers.

- Continue connections to local resource that support our expeditions (inquiry units) Tillamook Forest Center, Jackson Bottom Wetlands, PCC Rock Creek and other locations for field studies. PCC Rock Creek's resources for us include: gardens, wetland, and bathouses, with PEE staff functioning as guest experts for our students.

- We are continuing our Math Lab for all students in grades 3, 4, and 5.

- Reconnect with Laural Park at Bethany Village; establish regular volunteer opportunities at Terra Linda for their residents.
- Investigate the possibility of building a track on Terra Linda's campus and possibly build the track in Summer 2016.

 Pius currently provides 40 food bags each Friday afternoon for Terra Linda students. This is an opt-in program for families. We would like to expand the number of available Backpacks through partnerships with other community partners then invite our Terra Linda families to opt-in to the expanded program. Currently we have approximate 165 students eligible for free or reduced lunch, so more students could benefit from the Backpack Program.

- Math Lab Progress: For approximately 25 minutes each week, a community volunteer sits down with one or two students and coaches the students on improving their mathematical calculation fluency. Support is differentiated to meet individual students' needs. Currently approximately 40 volunteers support Math Lab at Terra Linda. The program started this year in mid-October.
- Sunset High School connections: Through the Elementary School Tutor class, students help teachers and work the students in assigned elementary classrooms at Terra Linda. Students can earn a semester of elective credit for this course. We also have students volunteering for a number of programs for which no credit is earned. Sunset students support our Monday afternoon homework club for grades 4 and 5 and our Monday afternoon tutoring center for grade 2. For our recent Hispanic Parent Night, 16 bilingual students volunteered to help parents navigate a variety of online resources. They also assisted parents with setting up email and ParentVue accounts.
- Campus Clean-Up Progress: We would like to invite businesses and faith partners
 within the Terra Linda Boundary to participate in this event. We have already
 gathered a list of businesses and plan to reach out to them soon by sharing facts
 and stories about our school. We will connect with them about volunteer
 opportunities in early 2016.
- Laurel Park Progress: With the changing demographics at Terra Linda, we have fewer volunteers available to support the many programs, such as Read Naturally, Art Literacy, and Math Lab. In the past, Terra Linda has had a strong relationship with Laurel Park, and we would like to re-establish and expand that relationship.
- The PTC has established a Track Committee to develop the plan for the track and to investigate possible fund raising sources and activities. The committee is considering support from sources already connected to Terra Linda as well as sources in the community. An FIP has already been submitted to start the process with the Beaverton School District. The ideal completion date would be Fall 2016, but the actual date depends on the success of fundraising. Discussion is still in process to determine next steps.
