29 students chosen for national merit scholar program

Twenty-nine seniors from the Denton Independent School District have been recognized in the 2010 National Merit Scholarship program.

National Merit Semifinalists

The district had eight seniors named National Merit Semifinalists. They are part of an elite group of only 16,000 semifinalists chosen nationwide. This is the largest number from Denton ISD to receive this honor in more than 10 years.

Denton High

Patrick Burke, son of Kevin and Rose Burke, is a member of the National Honor Society, Amnesty International and the Denton High academic decathlon team. He is active in the math club, eco club and French club. He plans to attend the University of Washington and study political science.

Trevor Davila, son of Troy Davila, is an active member in the Denton High orchestra and math club. He is unsure of his college selection but plans on majoring in mathematics or computer science.

Sylvia Li, daughter of Chi-tien and Pei-chuan Li, is a member of the Denton High orchestra, math club, eco club, Spanish club and National Honor Society. She is also active in yoga and Tae Kwon Do. Li is undecided on her college choice but plans on majoring in engineering or environmental science.

All National Merit Semifinalists will be notified in February if they are selected as a National Merit Finalist.

Guyer High School senior **Elizabeth West** has been recognized by UniServity as a winner in the second annual Learning Platform Awards for Excellence.

The awards recognize and celebrate the success of schools and individuals from around the world who use creative and innovative ways to support teaching and enrich the learning experience by using the cLc Learning Platform.

The cLc (connected learning communities) is a web-based collaborative and personalized learning environment which has been developed in conjunction with schools, education authorities/districts and prominent thought leaders in education.

West earned this recognition for her work on her cLc learning portfolio. On her educational space online, West posted learning activities for students around the world to use and learn languages like German, French, Italian and American Sign Language. West's website also featured a section for learning to play the trumpet.

West has studied four years of German, four years of French, one year of Spanish and is currently learning Italian on her own. She plans on studying foreign languages at UNT upon graduating, but has her sights set on studying in Germany for a year before starting college.

Stephen Shade, department head of world languages at Guyer, supported and assisted West throughout the process. West received a crystal trophy for her creative work online, while Guyer received a check for \$816 on behalf of UniServity.

School district earns national technological recognition

The Denton Independent School District has been named one of the Top 10 technologically advanced school districts in the country by the Center for Digital Education.

School districts across the United States took part in the survey and were broken down into three classifications: large (15,000 students or more), medium (2,500 to 14,999 students) and small (below 2,500 students). Denton ISD was one of only four districts in Texas to earn a Top 10 ranking in any classification.

The study, sponsored by the Center for Digital Education, National School Boards Association and *Converge* magazine, analyzes the use of technology by school districts to communicate with students, parents, staff and the community as well as how it is implemented to improve district operations.

All top-ranked districts were honored at an awards reception during the NSBA's Technology and Learning Conference, Oct. 29, in Denver, Colorado.

Board of Trustees Glenna Harris and Mia Price, along with Technology Officer Ernie Stripling and Instructional Technology Director Robert Bostic, were presented the award.
