Brief Description: Purchase of a districtwide, common literacy resource for all elementary classrooms. Presentation on recommended curriculum to the Board of Education on March 16, 2026.

Recommended Resource: Repurposing of current (older version) AP Psychology textbook will be used.		
Brief Description: Psychology 2 previously existed as a GHS course until 2020-21 when AP Psychology debuted. Student interest appears high enough to sustain Psychology 2 as a one-semester course, with the prerequisite being a grade of 'B' or better in Psychology 1 (the Psychology course will be renamed Psychology 1). Additionally, we will be seeking dual credit status for students completing the combination of Psychology 1 and Psychology 2. This non-Honors/AP pathway to dual credit Psychology will serve a different type of student than typically enrolls in AP Psychology.

Note: The current textbooks being used for AP Psychology will be repurposed and used in the new Psychology 2 course, negating a need to purchase a textbook for that course.

Brief Description: The current textbook for Psychology is outdated (1998) and lacks curricular coverage of developments in psychology that have occurred over the past three decades. This resource closely aligns to the Psychology curriculum, is clearly organized around key psychological concepts, and its credibility as a research-based, peer-reviewed text is established. Topics such as human development, learning, behavior, cognition, and social processes are included.

Recommended Resource: <i>Klara and the Sun</i> , Kazuo Ishiguro, Vintage International Publishing (2021)		
Brief Description: AP Literature focuses largely on British literature from the Anglo-Saxon Era through the early European Modern period. While this historical survey provides valuable canonical grounding, it leaves a noticeable gap in exposure to contemporary works (specifically British contemporary works) that resonate with students in 2026. This novel was selected for the purposes of: Expanding the breadth of the AP curriculum by including a contemporary novel (specifically a dystopian science fiction story) that complements many of the thematic elements studied in earlier texts Introducing contemporary thematic concerns such as artificial intelligence, social inequality, biotechnology, and emotional connection in a technologically mediated world. Topics like these resonate with high school students. Enhancing representation of diverse perspectives. The author's Japanese-British heritage and his focus on global, post-modern contexts broadens the current cultural range of the course. Offering a complex narrative structure, intricate narration, and dense thematic material ideal for AP-style analysis and free-response essays on the AP Exam in May.

It is a structurally complex text that tackles a variety of themes pertinent to teenagers, including identity, self-acceptance, conformity vs. individualism, and racial bias and stereotyping.</p> <p>This book will be an option for students to choose as part of the Literary Circle unit. Students are provided with a few books to choose from and form their own book groups for the duration of the unit. The whole class comes together every few days to discuss the novels from different perspectives, comparing and contrasting the similarities and differences between literary styles, character development, and other aspects of literary analysis.</p>

<p>Brief Description: This is a contemporary mystery novel that aligns with the needs of literary circles in the English 1 Honors curriculum. The novel features an autistic narrator that creates a unique and engaging reading experience. The text encourages empathy and understanding for those that are "different." The narrator does swear, which contributes to the novel's authenticity, characterization, and themes. It reinforces how differently those with autism can experience and interpret the world while also revealing a lot about the people who interact with autistic individuals. The incidents of swearing are not gratuitous but serve to contrast adult dysfunction with childlike innocence.</p> <p>This book will be an option for students to choose as part of the Literary Circle unit. Students are provided with a few books to choose from and form their own book groups for the duration of the unit. The whole class comes together every few days to discuss the novels from different perspectives, comparing and contrasting the similarities and differences between literary styles, character development, and other aspects of literary analysis.</p>

This novel helps to fill this gap through:</p> <p>Innovative form - the book is written entirely in verse, requiring students to engage in both literary and poetic analysis.</p> <p>Expansion of the literary canon - The novel features black voices and urban landscapes in a critical and ethnically challenging text.</p> <p>Close reading - This book forces students to slow down, read closely, and analyze symbols, themes, and allusions, which are all part of the English 1 Honors curriculum.</p> <p>This book will be an option for students to choose as part of the Literary Circle unit. Students are provided with a few books to choose from and form their own book groups for the duration of the unit. The whole class comes together every few days to discuss the novels from different perspectives, comparing and contrasting the similarities and differences between literary styles, character development, and other aspects of literary analysis.</p>

Brief Description: The current German textbook series lacks the features of a modern world language resource (similar to what French and Spanish have recently adopted). This newly-released resource is from the same publisher as the resource currently in use by our AP German course and the series begins building up to AP German in the level 1 textbook. Class sets of physical textbooks will be used, along with online workbook access for each student. Seeking approval of Levels 1 and 2 now (Levels 3 and 4 are still in development), with the purchase of Level 1 materials intended for the 2026-27 school year and Level 2 materials for the 2027-28 school year.
