- d) The district offers online courses or blended learning opportunities to all eligible pupils, and publish course syllabi pursuant to Section 22f(1)(d).
- e) The district provides a link on the district's home page to the URL for the MiSchoolData Portal which will contain the required dashboard indicators pursuant to Section 22f(1)(e). If certain data elements for our district are unavailable from state data collections, we agree to provide those data in the form and manner determined by MDE.
- f) The district includes Teacher and Administrator job performance as a significant factor in compensation determination.
- g) The district's collective bargaining agreements do not include provisions contrary to prohibited subjects as outlined in section 15(3) of 1947 PA 336, MCL 423.215.
- h) The district implements a comprehensive guidance and counseling program.
- i) The district offers opportunities to complete 1 credit worth of non-English language learning experiences.
- 2. The Board of Education of Livonia Public Schools School District authorizes and directs its secretary to file this resolution with the State Aid and School Finance Office of the Michigan Department of Education.
- All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution are hereby rescinded.

BOARD POLICY DISPOSITION OF REAL PROPERTY

EBA JULY 21, 2014

The Board of Education believes that it is in the interest of the Livonia Public Schools School District to preserve, maintain, and retain ownership of its lands and buildings that have current or future educational value. The primary covenant of this policy is that the sale and permanent dispossession of the real property of this district is disfavored. The Board will analyze any unsolicited or solicited requests for the sale and permanent dispossess assets which substantially outweigh the Board's primary policy disfavoring such action.

In the event the Board of Education decides to exercise its property powers to sell real estate, the Board must authorize the conditions for sale. The Board reserves the right to reject any and all offers at its sole discretion. No property will be offered for sale until an independent appraisal is completed. Employees of the school district and members of the Board of Education shall be prohibited from purchasing directly or indirectly any real estate offered by the district.

The Board may authorize the administration to use qualified consultants who have expertise in land development matters on an hourly basis. The compensation paid to consultants can never be based upon percentage or commission formulas unless approved by the Board in which case the Board would seek a payment formula which allowed the district to opt for the lesser of either a fixed payment schedule or a percentage on a commission formula.

Proceeds derived from the sale of real estate will be held in trust in a special capital project fund account identified separately from any other capital project funds which shall be used for purchasing other real estate for the district and/or for renovating, replacing, or developing real estate, facilities, or long-term assets as authorized by the Board of Education, unless the fund balance of the district's General Fund is below 5% of the total expenditures at which time the Board of Education may determine to utilize proceeds in the General Fund to protect programs.

First Reading of Board Policy JCEC – Bullying Prevention Superintendent Dr. Liepa reported that the Policy Committee reviewed the proposed new language for the policy shown below, which will be brought to the Board for a second reading and possible adoption.

BOARD POLICY STUDENTS BULLYING PREVENTION



The Board of Education believes that a safe and civil environment in school is necessary for students to learn and achieve high academic standards. It is the policy of the District to provide a safe educational environment for all of its students. All forms of bullying toward a student, whether by students, staff, or third parties, including Board members, parents, guests, contractors, vendors, or volunteers, is strictly prohibited.

First Reading of Board Policy EBA – Disposition of Real Property This policy equally protects all students from bullying behavior regardless of the subject matter or motivation for such impermissible behavior. This policy applies to all activities in the District, including activities in a classroom, elsewhere on school premises, on a school bus or other school-related vehicle, or at any school-sponsored, school-approved or school-related activity or function whether or not it is held on school premises, such as field trips or athletic events where students are under the school's control, or where an employee is engaged in school business. This policy also applies to conduct using a telecommunications access device or telecommunications service provider that occurs off school premises if the telecommunications access device or the telecommunications service provider is owned by or under the control of the District. Misconduct occurring outside of school may also be disciplined if it interferes with the school environment.

"**Bullying**" is any written, verbal, psychological, physical act or electronic communication, including but not limited to cyberbullying, that is intended or that a reasonable person would know is likely to harm one or more students either directly or indirectly by doing any of the following:

- a. Substantially interfering with education opportunities, benefits, or programs of one or more students
- b. Adversely affecting the ability of a student to participate in or benefit from the District's educational programs or activities by placing the student in reasonable fear of physical harm or by causing emotional distress
- c. Having an actual and substantial detrimental effect on a student's physical or mental health
- d. Causing substantial disruption in, or substantial interference with, the orderly operation of the school

"Cyberbulling" is any electronic communication that is intended or that a reasonable person would know is likely to harm one or more students either directly or indirectly by doing any of the following:

- a. Substantially interfering with education opportunities, benefits, or programs of one or more students
- b. Adversely affecting the ability of a student to participate in or benefit from the District's educational programs or activities by placing the student in reasonable fear of physical harm or by causing emotional distress
- c. Having an actual and substantial detrimental effect on a student's physical or mental health
- d. Causing substantial disruption in, or substantial interference with, the orderly operation of the school

Bullying includes a person willfully and repeatedly exercising power or control over another with hostile or malicious intent (i.e., repeated oppression, physical or psychological, of a less powerful individual by a more powerful individual or group) that is reasonably perceived as being motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression or a mental, physical, or sensory disability or impairment; or by any other distinguishing characteristic. Bullying can be physical, verbal, psychological, written or a combination of all four. Some examples of bullying are:

- Physical hitting, kicking, spitting, pushing, pulling; taking and/or damaging personal belongings or extorting money, blocking or impeding student movement, unwelcome physical contact
- b. Verbal taunting, malicious teasing, insulting, name calling, making threats
- c. Psychological spreading rumors, manipulating social relationships, coercion, or engaging in social exclusion/shunning, extortion, or intimidation

d. Written - graphic or electronically transmitted

Any student, whether victim or not, who believes s/he has been or is the victim of bullying, or who is aware of another student who has been or is the victim of bullying, should, and every staff member must, report the situation to the building principal or his/her designee. Complaints against the building principal should be filed with the Superintendent or his/her designee. The student may also report concerns to a teacher or counselor who will be responsible for notifying the appropriate administrator.

The building principal (or his/her designee) shall investigate, as promptly as the circumstances permit, and document all complaints about bullying (as defined in this policy) and other behavior which may violate this policy. If the investigation finds an instance of bullying has occurred, it will result in appropriate consequences.

The individual responsible for conducting the investigation shall notify the parents/legal guardians of the victim, as well as of the perpetrator, of the verified incident(s) of bullying as well as the results of the investigation to the extent consistent with student confidentiality requirements. A record of this contact, or attempt to notify, shall be noted.

The individual responsible for conducting the investigation shall document all reported incidents which are prohibited and report all verified incidents of bullying or other behavior which violates this policy, as well as any remedial action taken, to the Superintendent or his/her designee.

The Superintendent, or his/her designee, shall submit a compiled report to the Board on an annual basis. The Superintendent is responsible for implementation of this policy. This policy will be publicized by being placed on the School District's website and in student handbooks.

Retaliation, or making a false accusation against a target of bullying, a witness, another person with reliable information about an act of bullying, or any person who reports, is thought to have reported, files a complaint, or otherwise participates in an investigation or inquiry concerning allegations of bullying is prohibited. Such retaliation shall be considered a serious violation of Board policy and independent of whether a complaint is substantiated. Suspected retaliation or false accusations should be reported in the same manner as bullying behavior. Making intentionally false reports about bullying behavior for the purpose of getting someone in trouble is similarly prohibited. Retaliation and intentionally false reports may result in disciplinary action as indicated above.

This policy is not intended to and should not be interpreted to interfere with legitimate free speech rights of any individual. However, the District reserves the right and responsibility to maintain a safe environment for students, conducive to learning and other legitimate objectives of the school program. This policy is published in the student handbook annually, which is accessible on the school and district websites.

Confidentiality

To the extent appropriate and/or legally permitted, confidentiality will be maintained during the investigation process. However, a proper investigation will, in some circumstances, require the disclosure of names and allegations. To the extent permitted by law, documents comprising the investigation will be maintained in a secure manner, will not be co-mingled with other documents, and will be disclosed only in accordance with law or on a "need to know" basis.

The Board may meet in emergency session in the event of a severe and imminent threat to the health, safety, or welfare of the public when two-thirds of the members decide that delay would be detrimental to efforts to lessen or respond to the threat.

BOARD POLICYGAHAPERSONNELMARCH 16, 2015STAFF INVOLVEMENT IN COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Recognizing that community activities are highly desirable supplements to school work, employees of the Livonia Public Schools School District are urged to take an active part in community life.

The extent to which school personnel are known and accepted as citizens of the community has a direct relationship with the degree of understanding and good will between the schools and the community.

Administrators are encouraged to identify personally with the many facets of community life, providing opportunities for all citizens, including non-parents, to experience a relationship with the school district.

All personnel are encouraged to participate in local service clubs and civic organizations. School personnel may upon approval participate in civic or service club activities during the school day provided they do not conflict with scheduled responsibilities.

Cooperative relationships should be maintained between the school system and civic, service, and business associations such as the Chamber of Commerce. Visitations between business and industrial leaders and teachers and other personnel shall be encouraged.

BOARD POLICY INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM SPECIAL PROGRAMS

IDD(2) MARCH 16, 2015

The Board of Education provides special programs and services to meet the needs of its students with special needs. These programs and services will be coordinated by the Department of Student Services, which interprets and operates these services according to law.

BOARD POLICY INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM REPORT CARDS

IHAB MARCH 16, 2015

The superintendent or designee shall have the authority to classify and control the promotion of students in accordance with the general school laws of the State of Michigan.

Reporting to parents is an integral part of the school program and is requisite to assuring a sharing of responsibility by parents and teachers for the learning and growth of the child.

The progress of each pupil shall be measured periodically, and reports of such progress shall be communicated to his/her parents or guardian at regular intervals. These reports, both oral and written, are intended to assist both the student and the parent and to stimulate their cooperation in furthering the student's continued growth.

Reports shall at all times attempt to assess the pupil's performance in terms of both his/her capacity and actual achievement. The responsibility of devising various reporting forms and practices shall be that of the superintendent or designee and the staff.

BOARD POLICY STUDENTS STUDENT BEHAVIOR AND CONDUCT

The Livonia Public Schools' Board of Education and administration and instructional staff to promote, through policies and regulations, the highest possible standard of conduct and atmosphere for good instruction. It is earnestly desired to have high standards of conduct, behavior, and school achievement. Development of good habits in citizenship and conduct as individuals requires a consistent, calm atmosphere which will promote the individual and group learning process.

- 1. Students shall be held strictly responsible at all times for diligent application to school work and the development of efficient study habits.
- 2. Students shall show proper respect at all times to other students, staff members, school visitors, and adult volunteers. Both students and staff members have an obligation to maintain at all times conditions which will promote the proper atmosphere for learning and the carrying on of other school activities.
- 3. Malicious destruction of school property must result in the replacement or repair of property or payment for the damages by the student or his/her parents or guardian.
- 4. Students shall help keep the school grounds and property clean at all times.

BOARD POLICY STUDENTS STUDENT HEALTH EXAMINATION

JGCA MARCH 16, 2015

PARTICIPANTS IN ATHLETIC PROGRAMS

A student who wishes to participate in interscholastic games or sports must satisfactorily complete a health or medical examination administered by a qualified physician <u>prior to</u> <u>entering into any athletic competition</u>. The following statements are considered as part of this policy:

- 1. No student should be allowed to begin formal practice in a sport without an adequate health examination on file with the school.
- 2. In cases of serious injury or extended illness, students should be reexamined by a physician before again being allowed to compete.
- 3. Students who have been disqualified in one interscholastic sport are not necessarily disqualified from that particular sport permanently nor does it mean that they have been disqualified from all sports. The health examination shall specifically indicate which sports competition the student may participate in, if any.
- 4. The decision of a qualified physician should be regarded as final. No person may overrule the decision to qualify or disqualify a student in interscholastic competition for health reasons.
- 5. Health costs shall be paid by the student's parent or guardian. The superintendent or designee may make exceptions based on financial hardship.
- 6. Health examination shall not be required of any student whose parents or guardians present in writing religious objections to such an examination.

BOARD POLICY STUDENTS AWARDS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

JN MARCH 16, 2015

It shall be the policy of the school district to give appropriate recognition to pupils for progress and/or attainment in all areas of classroom scholastic endeavor as well as in areas of the school's co-curriculum and extracurricular activities.

The recognition should be as closely related as possible to the nature of the achievement and should be assessed by school administration.

BOARD POLICY STUDENTS STUDENT RECORDS

JR MARCH 16, 2015

The compilation, maintenance, disclosure, and deletion of or access to student records shall be in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 and other applicable laws.
