Cassie Elston-Bingham's 4/5 class participated in the audit, as did student council members. The student council will take the lead in implementing a recycling program if feasible.

Kirk has traveled to several TRSD schools to educate students about recycling and the positive impacts it offers the environment in the areas of pollution and resources management, as well as the opportunities it creates for the business community.

Students wore rubber gloves and sorted garbage from the cafeteria, from classrooms, and from other areas of the school, except the health room and bathrooms.
