



## **Enrollment and Staffing Update**

The District monitors enrollment throughout the month of September. Class sizes are larger than in the past due to the elimination of 344 positions and the layoff of 204 licensed employees. While there are no longer resources to reduce class size to previous levels, there are some critical needs identified by principals that must be addressed.

A 1% staffing reserve to address unexpected enrollment fluctuations. The District has also utilized slightly under \$1 million dollars in unemployment insurance reserves to respond to additional needs. These reserves were budgeted based on an estimate of the number of employees who would be laid off. We now have updated numbers and can safely reallocate these funds to address additional elementary, middle and high school needs. Utilizing the 1% staffing reserve and unemployment insurance reserves we have added the following positions:

- 21.5 certified positions and 2 classified positions at the elementary level
- 3.3 certified positions and 2 classified positions at the middle school level
- 4 certified positions and 12 classified positions at the high school level.

The District will continue to monitor enrollment and class size throughout September.

The reduction of \$37 million represents 344 fewer employee positions. After initial transfers, retirements and resignations, the District laid off 204 people in July. Since that time, additional employees have retired, resigned or taken leaves, and the District has recalled some laid off employees to open positions. These are not new positions nor is there additional cost to the District. The following numbers represent the most current layoff information.

- 114 people are laid off
- 51 people are fully recalled
- 22 people are partially recalled, meaning they have accepted fewer hours than what they are owed
- 3 laid off people accepted a classified position but remain on the licensed recall list
- 14 laid off people have resigned (some return as substitutes)

The document included in the board packet provides an overview of averages of class sizes across our elementary schools. Class sizes have increased across the District with the decrease of 344 positions. We are aware that some class sizes remain high, but we simply do not have the necessary resources to make the level of adjustments we would like across the District. Class sizes at the elementary level vary from the low 20's to high 30's.

Enrollment at the middle and high school levels continues to increase creating even larger classes than expected. Resources to these levels are being allocated to support classroom needs. To make significant certified adjustments at the high school level at this time is too disruptive to student schedules. Principals will be working to develop systems to support staff with the resources added this fall and they will be working to address class sizes with certified staffing for second semester.
