# Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)



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### INTRODUCTION

Did you know that Amphitheater Public Schools can choose to serve meals at no cost to all enrolled students at selected schools? By Participating in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), schools in high poverty areas can serve breakfast and lunch to students at no cost to them or the District.

Why was CEP established? CEP was established by The Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 to improve access to free school meals in eligible schools and Local Educational Agencies (LEAs).

After consulting with the Arizona Department of Education and the Association of Arizona Food Banks (AAFB), it was reported LEAs and schools implementing CEP have experienced great success and are satisfied with the program. According to a survey completed by AAFB, out of 58 districts that adopted CEP and responded to the survey, 100% were satisfied and would recommend it to other schools. District satisfaction with CEP is apparent, when you look at the number of district participation in the program and the growth demonstrated each year (See Table I).

### **BENEFITS OF CEP**

Across Arizona and nationwide, CEP has helped schools by:

- Increasing student participation CEP alleviates the need for families to submit school meal
  applications; therefore, eligible students who forget or fail to submit an application will still be able
  to eat at no cost.
- Easing the administrative burden CEP schools can operate more efficiently by utilizing data
  collected from other Federal programs; thus, resulting in less paperwork and lower administrative
  costs. Families do not need to turn in free and reduced-price meal applications. In addition, schools
  do not need to process applications, send out low balance letters, assign eligibility status to students
  or conduct verification of household income.

- Increasing student enrollment Some schools participating in CEP have reported an increase in student enrollment. The Director of Nutrition Services at Washington Elementary School District stated that families with students at charter schools reported leaving to attend a non-pricing school to take advantage of free meals.
- Improving the learning environment By offering all students nutritious meals at no cost, CEP helps participating schools ensure their students will come to class well-nourished and ready to learn.
- Improving program efficiency CEP gives food service staff more time to focus on preparing nutritious meals their students will enjoy.
- Eliminating over identification issues Because all students in CEP schools have access to meals at no charge, there is no longer stigma associated with only providing free and reduced-price meals to low-income students.
- Eliminating meal charges and unpaid meal balances No child at a CEP school will be denied a meal due to a negative account balance, nor will they be required to charge meals to their account which will result in financial relief for parents and families. We will be able to eliminate the alternative meal option at CEP eligible schools completely and Food Service staff will no longer have to follow up on unpaid meal charges.
- Eliminating meal payments Also, meal counting and claiming will be easier and schools will no longer need to collect meal payments from students.

### PARTICIPATION AND ELIGIBILITY

Participating in CEP is a voluntary decision based on our district's identified student percentages.

Which schools are eligible? Schools in low-income areas with an identified student percentage of at least 40% are eligible to apply. Districts may elect CEP on behalf of a single school, a group (or groups) of schools or the entire district as long as the combined identified student percentage (ISP) is greater than or equal to 40 percent (ISP  $\geq$  40 percent). Identified students (Directly Certified) are those certified for free school meals without the use of school meal applications.

## How are Directly Certified (DC) students identified?

Identified students are **Directly Certified** through a data matching process if they live in households that participate in:

- SNAP (Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program)
- TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families)
   or are
- Homeless, migrant, in foster care, enrolled in Head Start

### **Calculating the ISP**

The ISP is determined by dividing the number of identified students as of April 1 by the number of enrolled students as of April 1, and multiplying by 100.

Based on the ISP figures above and the financial estimations reported below (See CEP Monthly Federal Reimbursement Estimator), it would benefit the District to group the following eight schools: Amphitheater High School, Amphitheater Middle School, Nash Elementary School, Holaway Elementary School, Keeling Elementary School, Rio Vista Elementary School and Rillito Center. With their combined ISP of 61.8% x 1.6 (multiplier), 98.89% of all meals served at these locations would be claimed at the free rate.

Although Rillito Center's ISP is only 25.58%, it made sense to add the site to the group since food production, meal delivery and meal claiming emerges out of the Amphi Middle School Cafeteria. Other sites with higher

ISP's such as La Cima Middle School, Walker Elementary and Donaldson, generated higher revenues with current procedures, therefore, were left out of the group.

### **CLAIMING & REIMBURSEMENT**

**How does Amphitheater Public Schools currently claim meals?** Currently, the District claims meals at the following rates:

- Free
- Reduced
- Paid

Rates are dependent on information reported on free and reduced meal applications and Directly Certified student matches

**How would Amphitheater Public Schools claim meals under CEP?** The District would claim meals at the following rates:

- Free
- Paid rates

Rates are dependent on Directly Certified student matches.

### How is reimbursement calculated?

- The ISP is multiplied by 1.6 to determine the percentage of meals reimbursed at the federal free meal rate.
- The remainder of meals served will be reimbursed at the federal paid meal rate.

The following table shows the difference between our current meal claiming percentage and the projected claiming percentages under CEP:

Using the ISP numbers and the meals claimed for the month of April (2019), we were able to estimate the level of Federal reimbursement under CEP using the USDA CEP estimator tool.

The following is an estimation using our current participation numbers with no anticipated participation change:

The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) Monthly Federal Reimbursement Estimators projected CEP would provide a revenue increase between \$20,064.88 and \$46,023.09. The \$20,064.88 projection would be for the current level of participation and the \$46,023.09 would include an anticipated participation increase of 4% at breakfast and 10% at lunch. It is very likely participation will increase both at breakfast and lunch due to the serving of all free meals.

### **IMPACT ON TITLE I**

### Will CEP affect Title 1 funding?

Both the United States Department of Agriculture and the Arizona Department of Education have released guidance indicating CEP will not impact the total amount of Title I funding received at the district level since Title I funding is based on economic need. With partial implementation of CEP, the District would determine economic need for CEP school sites using the 1.6 multiplier. All other schools would continue to use free and reduced-price eligibility data. Additional guidance can be found by referencing ADE HNS #21-2018.

### DISTRICT FOOD SERVICE DEPARTMENT PLAN

The Food Service Department would like to partially implement CEP at Amphitheater Public Schools by designating eight school sites to the program starting the 2019/2020 School Year. The eight sites include:

- Amphitheater High School
- Amphitheater Middle School
- Nash Elementary School
- Holaway Elementary School
- Keeling Elementary School
- Prince Elementary School
- Rillito
- Rio Vista Elementary School

These are the eight sites with the highest identified student percentage (ISP) that would provide the District with a 98.89% free reimbursement rate for all meals served/claimed during the next four school years (SY 2019/2020 thru SY 2023/2024). By designating these high-needs schools for CEP, we would be able to serve free breakfast and lunch to all students enrolled at these schools without collecting school meal applications. Student accounts would no longer accumulate school meal debt and staff would be relieved from collecting payments from students for breakfast and lunch. The partial implementation of CEP would increase revenues substantially by providing an increase of monthly revenue between \$20,064.88 and \$46,023.09.
