Gresham-Barlow School District Citizens Comments to the Board

I am a resident of the District submitting this as public comment for the 5/07/2025 School board meeting regarding the recent sale of GBSD-owned land. I believe this sale raises serious concerns that deserve public scrutiny and discussion. Specifically:

- Lack of Procedural Transparency: There is growing concern that the proper public processes for the sale of public land were not followed. Community members deserve full transparency when public assets are being divested.
- 2. Lack of Surplus Designation and Strategic Evaluation: To our knowledge, the land was never formally declared "surplus" or evaluated through a public process to determine whether it was no longer needed by the district. Selling district land without a clear and public determination that it is truly unnecessary undermines responsible stewardship and limits future flexibility for school infrastructure or program expansion.

3. Long-Term Impact of Increased Housing Density: Perhaps most troubling is the sale of school district land for development aligned with HB 2001, which encourages denser middle housing. This sale could directly increase the student population within the district—yet it simultaneously reduces the district's land holdings that might be needed to support this growth. In short, the district is selling land that it may soon need, creating a short-sighted tradeoff that burdens future planning and capacity.	
This kind of decision-making erodes public trust and sets the district on a reactive course. I urge the board to pause any further land sales, conduct a full public review of this transaction, and engage in a transparent long-range facilities and land-use planning process that puts students and community needs first.
