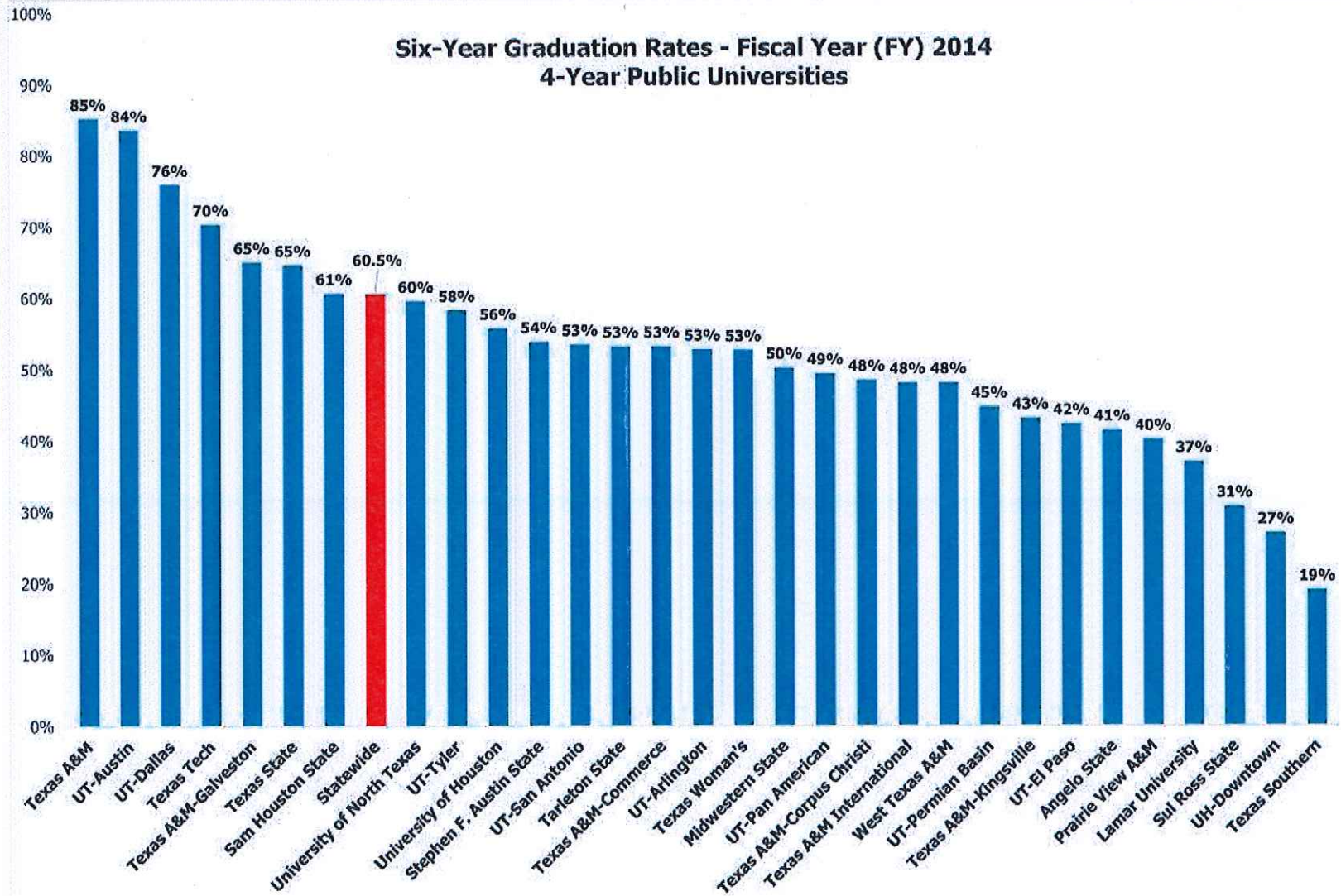

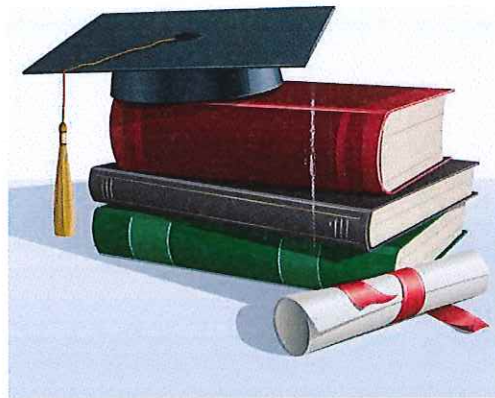

Serves children of the community and faculty and staff for a six week camp which includes field trips, daily activities and a one hour study period.

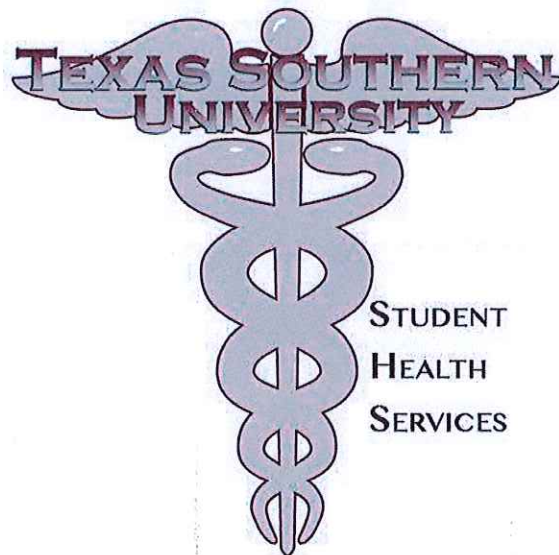
OFFICE OF CAREER SERVICES

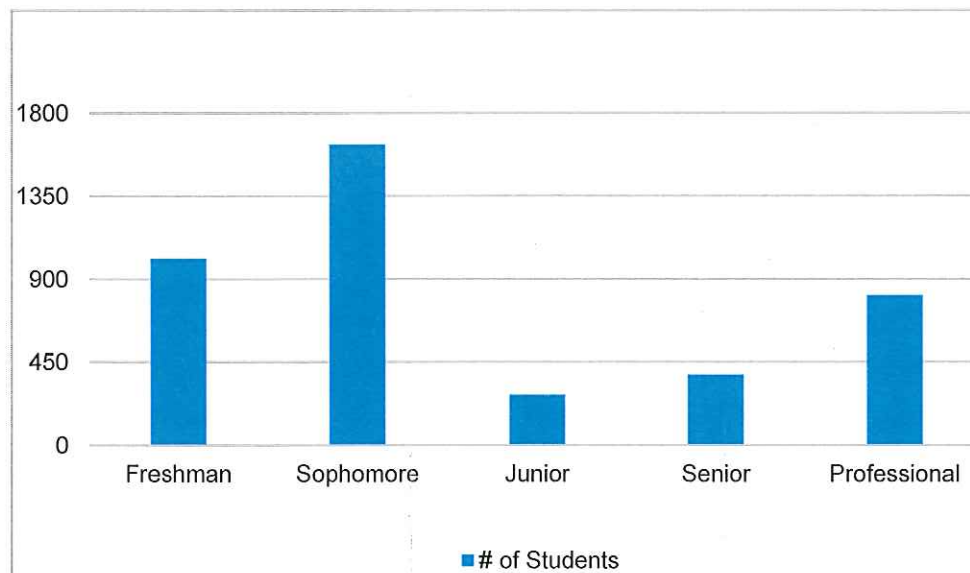

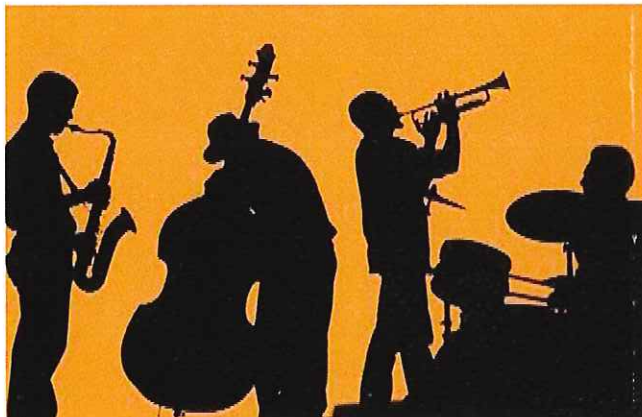

The Center is dedicated to serve as a catalyst for change augmented by academic achievement, career ambitions, and opportunities for the women at Texas Southern University.

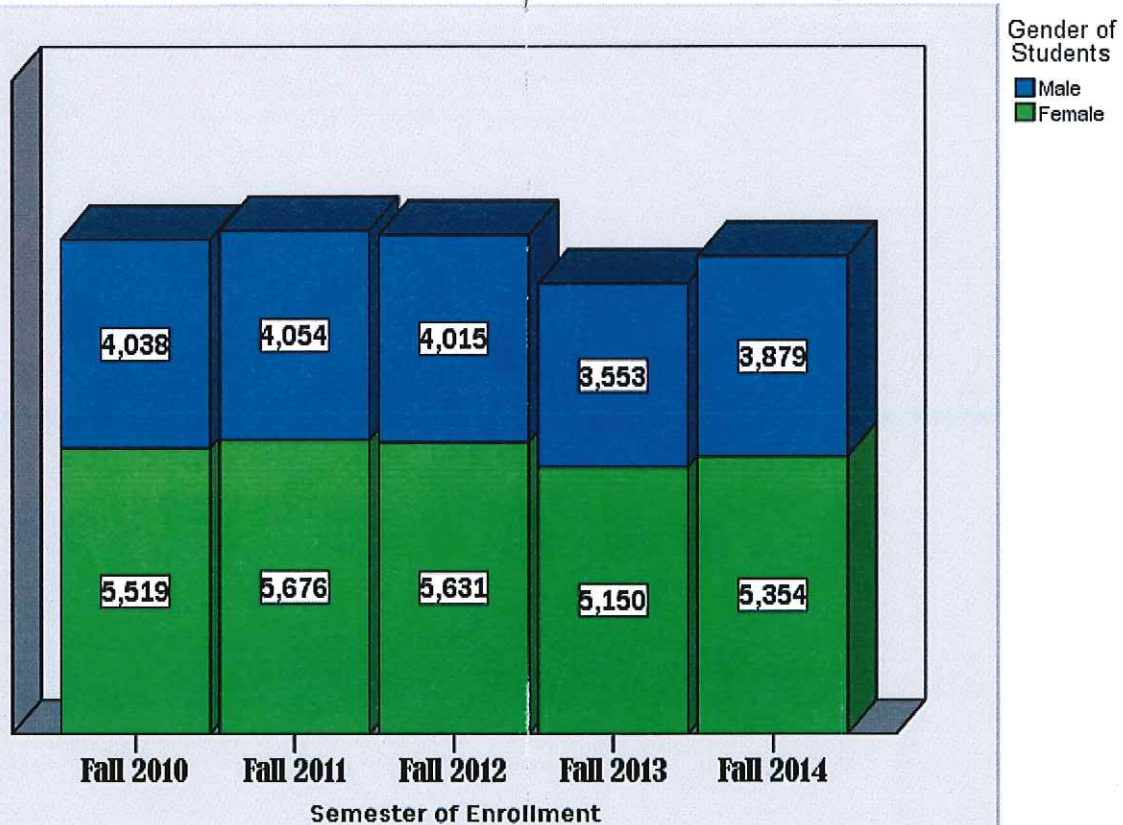
Vision

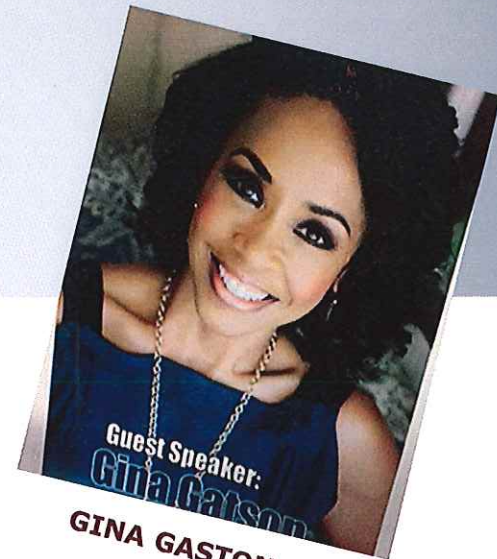
