Curriculum Highlights:

We continue to explore life science and learn about US history. With the new semester Primary students will begin their, "This is My Community" expedition and the Intermediates will go forth and explore on their "Westward Ho!" Expedition. Both will be completing their life science studies as they engage in Bird, Butterfly and Macro Invertebrate investigations. Our Intermediate and Primary Students are moving from bones to birds and their exploration will help to cap their life science exploration during which they will continue mentoring Kindergarten scientists. Junior High and High School are completing their Revolution research hand will soon explore the work that led to our constitution. The continue working on character studies as they read "New Found Land" about Lewis and Clark. Junior High student have been exploring the periodic table of elements, chemical compounds and electricity.
