#### ALIGNS TO BOARD PRIORITY:

 Learning – The District will provide an aligned, rigorous curriculum, with instructional and technology programs preparing students to meet or exceed all educational standards.

**BACKGROUND INFORMATION:** In order to keep the Board informed concerning District initiatives for instructional practices, the following information is being presented:

- Thinking Maps training is an AISD initiative designed to provide teachers with
  instructional tools to promote and develop critical thinking skills that can be used by
  students in a variety of subjects and settings. For struggling students, especially in the
  area of writing, the inability to focus and organize their thinking is often the student's
  greatest challenge. This systematic way of thinking helps level the playing field for
  academically struggling students and helps other students apply learning in more
  complex ways.
- The Thinking Maps process facilitates four specific habits of the mind: listening and understanding, collection of data, questioning and hypothesizing, and metacognition (organization of the thinking processes). When students develop Thinking Maps during learning opportunities, the overall experience is more meaningful to all students.
- Teachers benefit when students put their thinking on a map because the visual allows
  the teacher to obtain information on how students are organizing and applying their
  thinking processes. Teachers also have a better understanding of the student's
  attention to detail, order, and the relationships that students are able to draw between
  concepts.
- The district-wide implementation of Thinking Maps is one of many instructional strategies that teachers can utilize to help student's master content and develop critical thinking skills.





Circle Maps – Define in Context-Brainstorming









## Bubble Maps – Describing –Attributes




## Double Bubble – Comparing and Contrasting





Tree - Classifying







## Brace – Part to Whole Relationship






## Flow - Sequence
