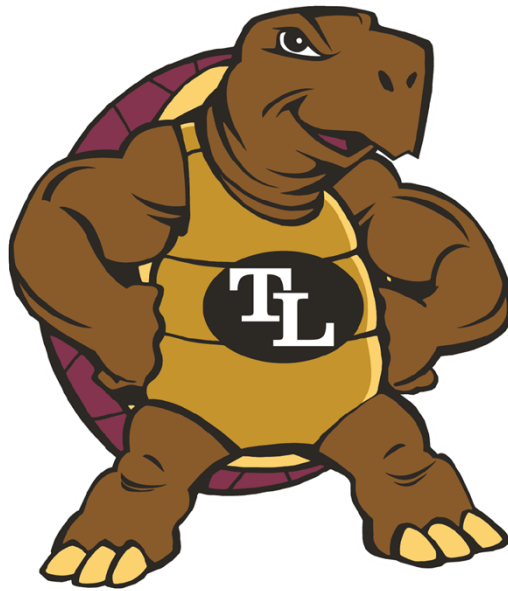

Proposal To Provide School Safety & Security Assessment Services

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ABOUT OUR ORGANIZATION

The Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association (WSSCA) was founded in 1968 as an association of professionals dedicated to improving security, safety, and health in Wisconsin schools. WSSCA is a 501(c) (3) non-profit and non-government organization that includes school administrators, supervisors, teachers, building and grounds (facilities) personnel, health and nursing personnel, safety coordinators/directors, security coordinators, school resource officers, school districts, private/religious schools as well as business/corporations and other organizations that provide school safety & security products, services, and solutions. WSSCA provides resources and training that empower members to create safe and secure schools in Wisconsin and beyond.

WSSCA was explicitly named as one of two state resources to consult with the Office of School Safety and Department of Public Instruction regarding creating model safety practices in 2017 Wisconsin Act 143. In addition, WSSCA was a major contributor to the development of the *Wisconsin Comprehensive School Security Framework* document published by the Wisconsin Department of Justice in 2019.

WSSCA has established close partnerships with the State of Wisconsin governmental agencies such as the Department of Justice - Office of School Safety (OSS), Department of Public Instruction (DPI), Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM), and key Wisconsin educational leadership professional associations such as WASDA, AWSA, WASBO, WCASS, and WASB to provide safety & security-related professional development and resources / best practices to Wisconsin schools.

WSSCA is managed by a board of directors consisting of an executive director, an assistant executive director, an assessment coordinator, a certification coordinator, a finance coordinator, members, and advisors.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOL SAFETY & SECURITY ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

Since 2013, the Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association has provided school safety and security assessments to public and private schools nationwide. The process was initiated after the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut and has been modified and revised over the years to stay aligned with current recommendations, best practices, and statutory requirements.

The WSSCA School Security Assessment Protocol, adapted from the National Clearinghouse for Educational Facilities, is a comprehensive tool that thoroughly evaluates a school's safety measures. It incorporates insights from the Texas School Safety Center, The National Center for



School Safety, The Sandy Hook Commission Report, The U.S. Department of Homeland Security National Threat Assessment Center, The U.S. Department of Education Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools (REMS) Technical Assistance Center, Wisconsin Statute 118.07, Wisconsin Department of Justice Office of School Safety, and the Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association (WSSCA).

ABOUT OUR SCHOOL SAFETY & SECURITY ASSESSMENT PROCESS

During the standard assessment process, WSSCA examines the five pillars of emergency management of Prevention, Preparation, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery under two main categories:

- I. Human Action
 - A. Climate and Culture (12)
 - B. Safety Plans, Policies, and Procedures (24)
 - C. Supervision (6)
 - D. Active Access Control (17)
 - E. All Staff Training & Instruction (17)
 - F. Crisis Team(s) and Roles (10)
 - G. Drills (6)
- II. Technology and Infrastructure
 - A. Communications (7)
 - B. Monitoring & Surveillance (10)
 - C. Interior Evaluation (19)
 - D. Exterior Evaluation (20)

Assessment Process Overview

WSSCA proposes to utilize the following steps to effectively and efficiently manage/coordinate the Turtle Lake School District school safety & security assessment project:

- Clarify/Finalize Scope of Work and Assessment Project Approval
- Collect and Review Safety & Security Related Information/Documentation
- Hold Assessment Project Coordination and Project Launch Meetings
- Conduct Onsite School/Facility Visits and Interviews



- Prepare Summary Reports and Recommendations

Clarify/Finalize Scope of Work and Assessment Project Approval

Upon selecting WSSCA for the Turtle Lake School District school safety and security assessment project, the WSSCA Assessment Project Coordinator will work with the Turtle Lake School District leadership to clarify and finalize the scope of work for this project. Following this meeting, WSSCA will prepare a draft agreement for the Turtle Lake School District review and approval.

Collect and Review Safety/Security Related Information/Documentation

The following Turtle Lake School District school and district information/documentation will be needed by the WSSCA assessment team a minimum of two weeks before the start of the initial onsite visits:

- a. School Crisis / Emergency Operations Plans
- b. Current floor/site plans and school evacuation routes
- c. Documentation of recent and planned safety/security improvements
- d. Safety and security-related policies

The WSSCA assessment team will review this information/documentation to understand better the current state or status of Turtle Lake School District school safety and security practices, processes, procedures, and protocols and help establish a baseline for assessment team members to begin their work.

Hold Assessment Project Coordination and Project Launch Meetings

Project Coordination Meeting consists of an on-site meeting between the WSSCA Assessment Coordinator and the Turtle Lake School District leadership. The meeting aims to discuss and determine, to the greatest extent possible, the project schedules/timeframes, milestones, and logistics related to the assessment project.

Project Launch Meeting - A project launch meeting will be held on the morning of each onsite assessment visit. These meetings will involve the WSSCA assessment team members, key Turtle Lake School District leaders involved in school safety and security, and may include local emergency responder representatives (such as law enforcement, fire department, city/county emergency management, and public health) as determined by Turtle Lake School District, and any other key staff or major stakeholders (i.e., local hospital or mental health provider representatives) identified by Turtle Lake School District. The goal/purpose of these meetings is to provide:



- Introductions of WSSCA assessment project team members, Turtle Lake School District leadership, and local emergency responder representatives
- An overview of the assessment process.
- Clarification, as needed, to the WSSCA assessment team members regarding information/documentation provided by Turtle Lake School District

Document Review (Off-site)

The WSSCA Assessment Coordinator will receive all current school safety and security governing documents per the list provided. The papers will be reviewed and evaluated.

Recommendations for improving/modifying governing documents will be provided in written form and presented to Turtle Lake School District leadership.

- Emergency Operations Plan
- Policies
- Procedures and protocols
- School Safety Team membership
- Staff Training

Conduct Onsite School/Facility Visits

Two WSSCA assessors conduct each onsite assessment, which will take approximately 4 to 5 hours per school. The onsite interviews with the school teams are a critical step in the assessment process. WSSCA recommends that the school team includes, at a minimum, school administration, SRO or local law enforcement representative, lead custodian, school security representative, student representative (if desired), and other key (Turtle Lake School District command level) staff involved in the school's safety / EOP plan. Members of the school team and others approved by Turtle Lake School District are welcome and encouraged to participate in the walk-throughs.

Following each onsite visit, the assessment team prepares a comprehensive after-action report (AAR) that addresses the top Turtle Lake School District areas included in the assessment template/protocol and provides a summary of strengths, weaknesses, vulnerabilities/threats, opportunities for improvement, incidental observations/considerations, and an assessment of leadership disposition to safety and security.



The WSSCA Assessment Coordinator reviews the AARs and then shares them with the Turtle Lake School District leadership and designated school/facility contact(s). If requested, WSSCA will provide a follow-up virtual meeting with the Turtle Lake School District leadership and/or designated school/facility contact(s) to discuss/clarify and answer any questions related to the AAR.

Prepare and Present the Final Assessment Report

The WSSCA Assessment Coordinator will prepare summary reports for each project phase reflecting gaps, vulnerabilities, findings, and recommendations for improvement.



ASSESSMENT PROJECT COST PROPOSAL

The Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association proposes to perform school safety & security assessment services for the one school building and campus that comprise Turtle Lake School District per the scope of work outlined in this Proposal at the cost of **NOT TO EXCEED three thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,200.00)**. This cost is based on providing one AAR report.

The proposed cost includes all WSSCA assessment team payroll-related expenses, applicable travel, lodging, incidental expenses, compilation of AAR and summary reports, project management, and administrative overhead.

WSSCA will track and record all costs related to this assessment project and invoice Turtle Lake School District (based on actual cost and administrative overhead) after the project.

Additional services requested outside the proposed scope of work will be charged at \$75/hour plus expenses (i.e., travel and lodging).



ABOUT OUR ASSESSMENT TEAM MEMBERS

Patrick Finnemore

Patrick Finnemore has a Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Mechanical Engineering and has over 40 years of experience in facilities management, design, and construction. He recently retired as the Director of Facilities for the Kenosha Unified School District and served in that role for 25 years. He is a former member of the WSSCA Board of Directors. He has served two three-year terms as a member of the Wisconsin Association of School Business Officials (WASBO) Board of Directors, including one year as president of the WASBO Board. He is a past recipient of the WASBO Facilities Manager of the Year and Wallace E. Zastrow awards, as well as the Wisconsin Athletic Directors Association (WADA) Distinguished Service award. He received the Energy Star Partner of the Year and Earth Day Challenge Certificate of Achievement from the US Environmental Protection Agency. Her responsibilities include identifying loss trends and solutions to eliminate exposures to ensure staff, students, and public safety. Jodi served as a past president of the Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association (WSSCA) and is currently an advisor. She is also part of the WSSCA Safety & Security Assessment team, which offers audits to school districts. She is an active Wisconsin Association of School Business Officials member and Co-Chair of its Risk Management & Safety Committee. Widely respected as an industry expert, Jodi has presented at National and International Conferences such as PRIMA and ASBO. She is an OSHA Authorized General Industry Trainer to Conduct 10 & 30 Hour Courses. She is a training mentor and instructor for the WASBO National Alliance Certified School Risk Manager program and an ALICE training instructor. Jodi has obtained the WASBO Facilities Manager Certification, WSSCA School Safety & Security Certification, Youth Mental Health First Aid Training USA, and CSRM Workers' Compensation Specialist Certificate. Mike has been a frequent presenter of best practice seminars for school officials in crisis and emergency management and the team leader for developing the state certification program for school safety coordinators through the Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association (WSSCA). Mike is certified as a School Safety Coordinator, School Safety Trainer by Safe Havens International, School Safety Assessor, Naloxone (NARCAN) Trainer, and a certified Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) Specialist. As a safety coordinator, Mike has worked with several organizations, including WSSCA, Wisconsin OJA-Homeland Security, and The Center for School, Youth, and Citizen Preparedness. Currently, Mike is working for the Wisconsin DPI as a Program and Policy Analyst on School Safety Planning/Operations and Continuity of Operations for the Wisconsin School for the Deaf and the Wisconsin Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired. He served the Manitowoc Public School District (MPSD) from 2001-2022. He spent 16 years as a School Counselor at junior high and elementary schools. In 2004 he was asked to lead the district safety team along with being a school counselor. In 2017 Michael was appointed as the District Mental Wellness/Safety Coordinator, a position he continues to serve. During his time leading district safety, Michael has worked to develop strong partnerships with local Fire, Police and Sheriff's departments, implementation of annual building safety audits, district implementation of the Standard Response Protocol/Standard Reunification Method, developed/ maintains the district safety operations calendar and staff safety response training. Prior to education, Michael served 26 years working Law Enforcement in Wisconsin both full and part time.
