## Summary

Transition from 7-periods to 8-periods

Classes go from 52 minutes to 45 minutes

School day will not be extended

- Middle Schools: 7:30 a.m. − 3:00 p.m.
- High Schools: 8:15 a.m. 3:45 p.m.

### Process

- Drs. Henson and Ford analyzed past principal experiences
- Received feedback from secondary principals; <u>all in favor</u> of transitioning to an 8-period schedule
- Conferenced with Fort Worth ISD executive director; FWISD transitioned for the 2018-2019 year
- Researched articles
- Met with Faculty and Staff Round-table



## Additional Information

New curriculum is being designed for 45-minute lessons (works better with an 8-period schedule)

2019-2020 Staffing Allocations and Course Loads

- Middle Schools: 26:1
- High Schools: 28:1
- Core teachers: Teach 6 courses + 1 professional learning/planning period + 1 conference period
- Elective teachers: Teach <u>7</u> courses + 1 conference period



# Research Findings

#### Pros

- Provides scholars with an additional class for enrichment or intervention (i.e. double blocking)
- Scholars can earn up to eight credits per year
- Core teachers have a PLC/planning period daily vs once per week
- Allows for planning, feedback and support of the new curriculum

#### Cons

- Course periods are shortened from 52- to 45-minutes
- Elective teachers have to teach one additional load of scholars
- Not enough time to differentiate
- It's a change from what stakeholders are used to
- Too much homework
