## **AC. Houghton Elementary**

# Irrigon High School GRADUATION

On Friday June 1<sup>st</sup>, we graduated 42 seniors. A third of this year's class graduated with a 3.0 or better with six of those having a 4.0 or better. Amber Kramer was recognized as our valedictorian with a 4.102 GPA and Jessica Working was our salutatorian with a 4.085 GPA. Overall, our seniors earned over \$640,000 in scholarships and awards. Our single biggest scholarship went to Maritriny Mejia who earned the Gates Millennium Scholarship that will pay for her college all the way through her doctorate degree. All members of the class of 2012 met the new state requirement of meeting the reading benchmark.

### **SENIOR CAREERS TRIP**

Last month, we took our seniors to visit Intel. This is the second year in a row they have hosted and continue to provide an amazing tour with lots of valuable information about the different employment opportunities available within their company, as well as information about college degrees and internship programs available. One of the highlights of the tour was being able to look through a powerful electron microscope (the same one that President Obama used on his recent visit to Intel) to see single atoms.

### **MOCK INTERVIEWS**

For the second year in a row we held our mock interviews which now include juniors as well as sophomores. These interviews were added to our ICE portfolio's last year in an effort to better prepare students for obtaining summer employment. The interviews also provide students practical experience if they find themselves having to be interviewed in the future for scholarships. ## **ATHLETICS**

The state track meet was held in Monmouth on May 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. We had a great showing with just six athletes all of whom placed in the top eight or better in a total of ten different events. Freshman AJ Timpy took 7<sup>th</sup> in the pole vault while another freshman, Anthony Landeros, took 7<sup>th</sup> in the 800m dash and 5<sup>th</sup> in the high jump. Junior Osvaldo Macias took 6<sup>th</sup> in the long jump and 7<sup>th</sup> in the triple jump. The men's team was led by senior Ramon Leon who took 4<sup>th</sup> in the long jump and the 110m hurdles, while finishing in 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 300m hurdles. In the end, our boys' team placed 8<sup>th</sup> in state – our strongest finish ever at the state track meet! For the lady knights, freshman Ana Carmona took 8<sup>th</sup> in the pole vault while junior Andrea Gasparova finished 6<sup>th</sup> in the javelin.

Our softball team ended the regular season on a strong note with a second place finish in the conference. They won their first game at the state level before falling short in the

quarterfinal game. Our softball team continues to be a source of pride for us with their continued success at reaching post season play.

### **Riverside High School**

We have had a stressful but rewarding last few weeks at Riverside. 61 of our 63 seniors graduated this year. We surveyed our senior students regarding post-secondary educational plans. We learned that:

### **School Staff**




WRE 2011-2012 Point Growth by Grade & Subject (spring to spring)




Windy River Elementary had a Great Growth Year with over 70% of the fourth and fifth grade students growing from 5 points, to some over 20 points this year in math. The teaching staff, in

general, put a large emphasis this year on math because of the increase in RIT scores for passing the math benchmark, and their work paid off.

Over 50% of the fourth and fifth grade students grew from 5, to again, some over 20 points this year in reading. Sixth grade students were not far behind with their averages being 40% of the students growing in math and 47% of the students growing in reading from 5 to 15+ points. These statistics are the growth results from spring of 2011 to spring of 2012.





Windy River is very comparable to the State of Oregon with passing the OAKS benchmarks. Note that both fifth and sixth grade math scores are above the state in passing, with fourth grade being very close. The reading scores are also very comparable with the State.

We had some great individual successes this year. Two of our special education students gained 20 points and over! A fifth grader gained 20 points in math and a fourth grader gained 21 points in math AND 22 points in reading. Outstanding!!

### **Management's Discussion and Analysis**

## **Financial Highlights**

There have been no significant financial forecast changes for previous years, current year, or projections for next year.

#### **Future Financial Planning**

The district is continues to evaluate expenses and revenues in the current year and is planning for specific expenditures:

- 1. Technology
- 2. Vehicles
- 3. Maintenance

Our focus in the next fiscal year will be to continue to upgrade desktops and monitors at all facilities. We will also be expanding our wireless infrastructure in specific locations to ensure that over time we are prepared and capable of wireless demands.

We have been in contact with the government dealer awarded the vehicle contract; however, the pricing for the 12-13 year has not been established and we will need to wait until the pricing is established to order the vehicles. The plan currently is to order 2 additional vehicles allowing each community and the superintendent to have a vehicle. We will continue to use the remaining vehicles (1999 Fords) until they are no longer usable.

Maintenance - see below.

### **Current Financial Issues and Concerns**

The district is in the process of completing an RFP for food service and is anticipating the award being completed by June 15, 2012 (based on board approval). The Food Service Committee met and heard presentations from both Chartwells and Sodexo and received the formal proposals on May 29. The committee evaluated the proposals on May 31<sup>st</sup>; however, we felt there were numerous questions that

needed to be answered to ensure all proposals were being evaluated based on the same information. The Committee will make the final recommendation the week of June 11<sup>th</sup>.

#### Maintenance

The district is evaluating all maintenance projects based on the following criteria:

- 1. Student Safety
- 2. Extending or maintaining the useful life of a current asset
- 3. Cost savings for the district

Based on those criteria there are a limited number of projects that will be initiated in the following fiscal year. The focus will be on the following:

- 1. Crack sealing at all schools
- 2. Boilers or equivalent at ACH and HHS.
- 3. The high water at IES.

Currently, we are waiting for Oregon department of Energy to get back to the district on recommendations for certain projects (water heaters at HHS and boilers – HHS and ACH). We are also looking at monitoring equipment for all HVAC systems so we can manage from a centralized facility or by community.

The crack sealing should be started any day and we are expecting this to extend the useful life of the pavement by 8-10 years.

The electrical has been wired and we are currently trying to find the correct horsepower pump to start draining the water on the East side of IES. Once we have a good idea of the water volume we will have a better idea of how to handle the other high water issues at IES.
