# Legislative Update and Advocacy

## Background

In a statement of philosophy, the National School Board Association (NSBA) outlines four key roles for school board members that can ensure both excellence and equity in public schools. Those four key roles are as follows:

☆ VISION —	setting the vision for education in the local community;		
☆ STRUCTURE —	establishing the structure and environment to implement		
	the vision;		
☆ ACCOUNTABILITY —	establishing academic standards to achieve the vision,		
	assessing performance progress toward achieving the		
	vision, and formulating strategies to help marginal or		
	failing students; and		
☆ ADVOCACY —	being the preeminent advocate for the public schools and		
	their students.		

One means for school board members to advocate for public schools is through regular contact and influence with our state legislators.

## **Legislative Priorities**

Our legislative priorities as a school board include the following:

> Funding and support for mental health services in Iowa schools and across the state.

(IASB Resolution 7) Supports efforts to establish comprehensive community mental health systems to offer preventative and treatment services and comprehensive school mental health programs that include in-school access for students to mental health professionals and provisions for reimbursement by Medicaid and private insurers.

> Fund all schools on the same per-pupil amount.

- Defeat vouchers
- Remove the arbitrary cap on Dropout/At-risk funds. Other school districts get 5% of their per-pupil budgets to spend on dropout prevention. Belmond-Klemme was arbitrarily capped at 4%.

## **Legislative Report**

The Iowa Legislature convened on Monday, January 9, 2023.

Governor Reynolds addressed the Legislature on Tuesday, January 10. She made it clear that her number one priority is funding Iowa's private schools at the expense of the public schools. Toward that end, she proposed the following funding:

\$83 million increase	School Aid	(2.5% increase)
\$106 million	Education Savings Accounts (vouchers)
