Teaching, Learning & Relevance

- As part of our efforts to support all students, especially those who may need extra help in reading or math, we participate in a state program called Achievement Gap Reduction, or AGR. To stay organized and meet the requirements of the program, we use what's called the AGR data-keeping template. This tool helps us track which students are receiving additional support, how that support is delivered, and how students are progressing over time. It's not just a checklist—it helps us reflect on our practices, make sure we're using our time and staff effectively, and identify where we might need to adjust instruction to better meet student needs. Ultimately, the template supports our goal of closing learning gaps and ensuring every student has the opportunity to grow and succeed.
