For the month of October, kindergarteners learned about Fire Prevention, practiced both a fire and earthquake safety drill, celebrated Red Ribbon Week, went on an amazingly fun trip to Sweet Pickin's Pumpkin Patch, and finished up the month by celebrating Halloween in the classrooms with a Party and a Halloween Parade walk throughout the 9 classrooms and gymnasium for the parents/quardians.

- Reading using the KinderCorner Curriculum, students are learning about various topics that relate to real life situations. This month we learned about how many seasons there are in a year; fall, winter, spring, and summer. Students are continuing to learning how to identify letters by saying their names and sounds, listening for beginning sounds and blending words to make words.
- □ Math: Using the Envision math, we learned how to compare and order numbers 0 -10, understanding what is 1 more, 1 fewer, 2 more, 2 fewer and ordering numbers on a number line.
- Writing: Daily writing/picture drawing topics are related to the Daily Message and Star Story.

Kindergarten continued

Kindergarten and First Grade students are assessed monthly through the use of ISIP, STAR, and Aimsweb progress monitoring. These monthly assessments are carefully monitored by the coaches, leadership team, and teachers. Through analyzing incoming data, we have determined areas of need and utilized our Instructional Consultants to meet those needs.

In October, our Math Consultant did a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour PD with Kindergarten and a separate session with First Grade. She addressed number sense, fluency, and how to increase practice and engagement during centers by modeling for our teacher's specific strategies and routines to use during both calendar and math centers. These strategies and routines centered specifically around subitizing, the use of dot cards, ten frames, and five frames.

After carefully analyzing our Literacy Data, we determined that our students need additional support in phonemic awareness. This led us to not Inly implementing a 15-minute Phonemic Awareness enhancement time (Heggerty), but also having our Literacy Consultant deliver a PD centered on Phonemic Awareness during an extended Wednesday. (Testing has occurred on 11/1 that's why we did not submitted for report.)

First Grade

First grade is wrapping up another very busy month with many community members paying a visit to our school. To teach the students about fire safety Smokey the Bear, Browning's own fire fighters, and Billy the Brushwacker all paid a visit to the school and they even brought gift bags for the students, and gave them a tour of a fire engine. Torgerson's out of Great Falls also paid a visit, and donated 180 pumpkins- one for each first grader. The students were thrilled, and used the pumpkins in a Pumpkin Math activity on October 28th. Parents were invited in for this special event and helped the children measure the height and circumference of their pumpkins, count the lines, and come up with words to describe their pumpkins. They were also given an MBI survey to assess their understanding of our MBI initiatives. Our students are really demonstrating an understanding of the behavioral expectations due to the success of the Caught-Ya Card system, but we wanted to make sure the parents are involved in upholding the expectations as well. It was a great turn-out and a fun way to end the month.








1st Grade STAR MATH



- □ Last year we ended the year at 38% At/Above Benchmark, the grade level sat down and developed goals for January (winter benchmark). The goals are as following: 34% At/Above Benchmark, 43% On Watch, 16% Intervention, 6% Urgent Intervention.
- ── With the math grant we have implemented more student engagement during math instruction, we prioritized what is taught in our 15-minute calendar time to make it more purposeful, and also looked at math foundational skills and made sure we are including meaningful practice during math center time to ensure all student have strong number sense skills.

46 students- Tier 1 (At/Above Grade Level) 43 students- Tier 2- (A little below grade level) 72 students- Tier 3- (Severely below grade level)

- After we looked at the data we realized that the students tested in the computer lab in September then used the Chromebooks to test in October. We felt the students dropped and we aren't getting data that reflects what the students really know and where they truly are struggling. Now starting in November we will assign all reading groups a time to go to the computer lab to test on ISIP then after this date they will use their chromes in their classroom for the I-station reading program daily.
- We are at the end of the quarter and our 2 TA's, Kori Walter and Bonnie Roberts, are busy assessing all student on the Roots Formal Assessment, which is taken quarterly. After we get this data we will look at reading groups and will move students up or down to meet their reading needs. New reading groups will begin November 7th!
- □ First grade teachers are doing an amazing job. We have a new addition, Nathan Ziegler, who is replacing Jessica Racine in the classroom. His first real day by himself was October 31st, WOW! We also will be getting, Audrey Grey added to our team beginning November 7th, so can't wait to meet her and welcome her to our building.
