ccpl2go

ccpl2go made a successful debut in the CarmelFest parade. As part of the plan to have the vehicle visit special events this summer, it will appear at the Touch a Truck event on July 22 and at Kroger's Fan Fest on July 23. Following a ribbon-cutting ceremony on July 30, the vehicle will have an open house in front of the library on August 1. - Stratford senior community (non-public stop)
- Barrington senior community (non-public stop)

Little Free Libraries

Four new Little Free Libraries have been constructed by local craftsman Robert Lancaster. Look for the video about how they were built on the library's Facebook page. These four structures will be installed at Inlow Park, Central Park East Woods, the Soho Café, and the Green at City Center. The existing

Business and Organization Connections

The merger of the Carmel and Fishers Chambers of Commerce into OneZone has made it more challenging for the library to initiate collaborations. Nevertheless, CCPL will be hosting several training sessions about the Reference USA database in October that are geared toward the business community.

The team discussed options for customer relationship management software that can be used for the database, and Insightly shows the most promise. This free, web-based software offers important features like usability, accessibility, and security. The next step will be to gather key staff members with programming and outreach responsibilities to discuss how the database will be used and how entries should be categorized for maximum effectiveness.
