RECOMMENDATION:
It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve Second Reading of Policy EIA (LOCAL) – Academic Achievement: Grading Progress Reports to Parents. Implementation of the STAAR Program will have an impact on this policy. Two key EOC assessment concepts have significant policy implications for districts in the areas of course credit, and grading.

PROPOSED REVISIONS

RELATION TO ESSENTIAL KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS The District shall establish instructional objectives that relate to the essential knowledge and skills for grade-level subjects or courses. These objectives shall address the skills needed for successful performance in the next grade or next course in a sequence of courses.

Assignments, tests, projects, classroom activities, and other instructional activities shall be designed so that the student's performance indicates the level of mastery of the designated District objectives. The student's mastery level shall be a major factor in determining the grade for a subject or course.

GUIDELINES FOR GRADING

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each campus or instructional level develops guidelines for teachers to follow in determining grades for students. These guidelines shall ensure that grading reflects a student's relative mastery of an assignment and that a sufficient number of grades are taken to support the grade average assigned. Guidelines for grading shall be clearly communicated to students and parents.

The District shall permit a student who meets the criteria detailed in the grading guidelines a reasonable opportunity to redo an assignment or retake a test for which the student received a failing grade.

In accordance with grading guidelines, a student shall be permitted a reasonable opportunity to redo an assignment or retake a test for which the student received a failing grade.

END-OF-COURSE ASSESSMENTS When required by state law, a student's score on the initial end-ofcourse (EOC) assessment shall count for 15 percent of the student's final grade for the course as reported on the student's transcript.

RETAKES

If a student retakes an EOC assessment, the District will include the retake score as 15 percent of the final course grade only if the retake score allows a student to gain credit for the course. After a student earns credit for the course, subsequent retakes will not be included in the calculation of the final course grade.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

A student's ARD committee shall determine the type of assessment to be administered and how the score on an EOC assessment shall be used for final course grades, credit decisions, and graduation requirements.

GRADING

Calculation of grades with EOC assessment scores shall be in ac-

cordance with the District's grading guidelines.

PROGRESS REPORTING Grade reports shall be issued every six weeks for students in elementary school and middle school and every nine weeks for students in high school on a form approved by the Superintendent or designee. Performance shall be measured in accordance with this

policy and the standards established in EIE.

INTERIM REPORTS

Interim progress reports shall be issued for all students after the third week of each grading period. Supplemental progress reports may be issued at the teacher's discretion.

CONFERENCES

In addition to conferences recommended on report cards, conferences may be requested by a teacher or parent as needed.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY Students found to have engaged in academic dishonesty shall be subject to grade penalties on assignments or tests and disciplinary penalties in accordance with the Student Code of Conduct. Academic dishonesty includes cheating or copying the work of another student, plagiarism, and unauthorized communication between students during an examination. The determination that a student has engaged in academic dishonesty shall be based on the judgment of the classroom teacher or another supervising professional employee, taking into consideration written materials, observation, or information from students.
