

Typically, I submit our Tier Movement graphs for Overall Reading and Letter Knowledge. Since this is End of the Year data, I felt it was important to submit all subtest data along with Distribution reports for September and May.


The Distribution Reports demonstrate how deeply students were into Tier 3 upon entering school. If you pay attention to the actual scores at the bottom of the Distribution report, you'll see that the 38 students who ended in Tier 3 actually made great progress within their Tier between Sept-May.

The Letter Knowledge subtest was a primary focus for us this year, and used as one indicator of the success of our interventions. The focus paid off and the Distribution Report showing student growth between the September and May graphs is powerful! The following data was presented and analyzed by Kindergarten staff the last week of the school year. As a team, we brainstormed ideas for implementation that would grow our weaker areas and listed out activities or practices that are sustainable. That document of ideas, next steps, and effective practices will be utilized in planning with the Principals and Leadership Team during the August Leadership week.

Kindergarten - Overall Reading












Kindergarten - Phonemic Awareness










Kindergarten - Listening Comprehension










Kindergarten - Vocabulary








Kindergarten End of the Year Aimsweb (math) Data 2018-19

The Tier Transition Summary below shows that we increased our Tier 1 and decreased our Tier 3 dramatically! Tier 1 went from 22% to 63%, (60% was our goal)! Our Tier 3 decreased from 50% to 28%, (25% was our goal).

The last two graphs show the 4 subtests, first in the Fall and then the Spring. Analyzing our subtest data, which was done with teachers in May, helps us discuss the effectiveness of practices we had in place this year as well as areas to develop next year. For the last 3 years, Kindergarten has implemented a Guided Math Framework. This year, we stepped away from using Envision Math as a resource and began using a curriculum that's better aligned to the Guided Math Framework. As a grade level team, we determined our GM Framework is effective and we developed ideas that will be included in the planning done during SBE in June and Leadership Week in August.



Thanks for a great year! And have a wonderful summer!


First Grade Data


1st Grade - September 2018




1st Grade - May 2019

Math has had some changes this year. These changes were brought forth by the piloting of the guided math modules by one teacher. After her data showed that students were understanding the concepts and skills that were taught and they had time to practice and apply skills, the student growth on STAR was apparent. We then moved all teachers move into utilizing the guided math modules and use them during their math block time. By our end of the year data, we have attributed a lot of this growth to how guided math teaches the skills and strategies and the amount of time students have to practice these skills.

Since I have been the coach the last 4 years, this grade levels end of the year data is the highest I have ever saw.
