II. Information and Action Items

	Description
1.	Lac welcomed the Council and thanked everyone for their attendance.
2.	Adult Education and Literacy (Tara Zekavat; handout attached)
	Tara Zekavat provided an overview on enrollment, benchmarks, completion, and
	success rates for AY24. AEL currently has 850 students and has met 89% of the
	enrollment target as of March 2024.
	Recent HGAC Quality Assurance and Financial audits revealed 100% satisfaction with
	no findings. This is the third consecutive year with no findings.
3.	Academic & Career Advising and Title V Grant (Mike Adkins)
	Advising added chatbot to better meet student need as well as added Virtual Fridays
	(however, face-to-face students are not turned away). To date, the department had
	11,600 academic advising sessions, 9500 sessions for career advising, and 3500
	sessions for transfer students. To support students with less than a 2.0 GPA, the
	department added Case Management advising.
	The Summer Bridge program had 26 student completers in 2023.
	Implementation for Degree Works is still underway.
4.	College Readiness Reading/Writing (T.K. Krpec; handout attached)
	• Fall 2023 had 72% of Not College Ready (NCR) students successfully complete ENGL
	1301 that was paired with NCBI 0300 (not college-level course), which is an
	improvement from spring 2023 with 68% success. The number of students enrolled in
	the paired courses in fall 2023 was 304. The average enrollment from fall 2019 to fall
	2022 is 204 students, thus fall 2023 numbers of NCR students enrolling in the paired
	courses greatly increased.
	• Fall 2023 had 87 students enrolled in INRW 0306 (the lowest level of college readiness
	courses) with a 75% success rate which is lower than success rates in fall 2022 and

	spring 2023, 82% and 79% respectively. The assumption is that more students are
	arriving under-prepared for college. The decline in scores and enrollment increase
	may also be a result of shifting threshold levels for entrance into ENGL 1301 paired
	with NCBI 0300. Future semesters will allow for greater data collection and feedback.
5.	
5.	College Readiness Math (Jennifer Mauch; handout attached)
	• The Math Department offers four paired courses for NCR students (pairing of credit-
	level math course with NCR math course). Overall, student success (defined as grade
	of ABC in <i>both</i> the credit-level and NCR math courses) improved in fall 2023 (58%
	success) as compared to fall 2021 (42%) and fall 2022 (49%).
	Starting fall 2023, Math 0306 (Basic Mathematics for College) replaced NCBM 0208
	(Support Course for Beginning Algebra) as the lowest level NCR math course. Students
	with very low TSIA2 placement scores are receiving instruction to improve basic math
-	skills before advancing to a Beginning Algebra course.
6.	Continuing Education & Dean of Workforce (Danny Bacot; handout attached)
	• The department continues to search for a Corporate Coordinator for the Bay City
	Campus; the position was reposted twice.
	 The department is implementing two grants 1) Skills Development Fund (SDF) for
	Small Businesses provided \$31,000 for various training programs, 2) Certified Nurse
	Assistant grant provided \$137,000 to upskill workers in healthcare.
	NRG grant ended last year and the company is working with WCJC on more training at
	three additional plant locations. Faculty trainers are needed.
	• Bay City Construction Trades should begin class April 23 rd in Carpentry. With
	completion of renovated space across the atrium from the current WCJC instructional
	space, phase 2 & 3 will follow with the addition of electrical and plumbing (dependent
	upon funding).
	• In AY23, the CE Department enrolled 1416 students with total revenue of \$424,363.
	Programs in healthcare enrolled 299, open enrollment had 161 students, contract
	training enrolled 730, and grant programs enrolled 226 students. To date, AY24 has
	served 1500 students.
	• Future training under development is Fort Bliss business education and a welding
	program in Ghana in collaboration with TAMU and GAE & ISTC (both affiliated with
	the Department of State).
7.	Counseling & Disability Services (Amber Barbee; handout attached)
	• The Homestead Pioneer Pantry provides clothing vouchers, food, toiletries, and
	detergent to about 197 students each month.
	• The department sponsored and co-sponsored several student-focused events (Stomp
	Out Suicide 5K Walk, Student Welcome Week, Holiday Cheermeister, etc.).
	 Disability Services made several improvements to processes and services (new
	brochures, expedited short-term disability services process, ISD site visits with
	recruiting to speak with students receiving special education and/or 504 services,
	implementation of AIM system, etc.).
8.	Distance Education (Michele Betancourt; handout attached)
	Regular & Substantive Interaction (RSI) federal policy requires all distance education
	courses to include regular and substantive interaction between the instructor and
	students. All online faculty were trained in RSI best practices in summer and fall 2023
	with additional training provided in spring 2024 and training available via an online,
	self-paced module.
	• 85% of documents in Brightspace are 90%+ accessible; this is an improvement over
	the 58% that were accessible in Blackboard in 2017. The department continues to
	offer f2f and online training on how to create accessible course materials and
	documents/forms. All VPI areas are required to complete this training to comply with
	federal mandates. DE has also trained several other departments (outside of VPI

	areas).
	• Fall 2024 Convocation Professional Development will be focused on the appropriate
	use of Artificial Intelligence (AI).
	• Expiration of Turn-It-In contract is October 2024. Since the cost of the plagiarism-
	detecting platform has significantly increased in the past several years, a DE
	committee of faculty will review alternative products.
	Due to new TEA requirements, effective fall 2024, all faculty teaching dual credit
	sections will be required to enter grades in Brightspace. An automated system, using
	AI, will email ISD contacts if a dual credit student falls below the established threshold
•	and needs academic support. Library (Christy Ruby; handout attached)

	• Christy reviewed various databases and online offerings. <i>OneSearch</i> is very useful and may be used for most library offerings. <i>Niche</i> is a professional development database.
	Many in-person services are offered, such as classroom instructional sessions,
	computers, meeting rooms, study space, DVDs, etc.
	• The library is hosting several fun events such as Theatre Thursday and Night Against
	Procrastination (NAP). NAP is planned as a support for students as they study for final
	exams; the library will be open until midnight in Wharton and until 9:00 p.m. on the
	Richmond and Sugar Land campuses. In fall 2023, 100 students participated on the
	Wharton campus. Spring 2024 is the first time this event is offered on the Richmond and Sugar Land campuses.
	-
	• Library electronic media and e-book utilization has increased. In AY23, 200,603 electronic media items were accessed and 694,323 e-books were accessed (40%
	increase from previous year).
10.	Dual Credit & University Transfer (Natalie Stavinoha)
10.	 Dual credit headcount for spring 2024 is 734 students.
	 Fees for dual credit students were revised, approved by the BOT, and become
	• rees for dual credit students were revised, approved by the BOT, and become effective summer 2024.
	\circ \$55/SCH in-district
	 \$63/SCH out-of-district
	 The changes apply to courses that earn both high school and college credit,
	thus concurrent course fees remain at the regular tuition and fee rate.
	 WCJC honor cords to wear for high school graduation will be given to 208 students
	who earned 15 or more college credits.
	Bay City ISD has 16 students on-track to graduate with an AA degree. Wharton ISD has
	10.
	 New articulation agreements were signed with Texas Women's University for general
	transfer and for a blended nursing program (allows a WCJC ADN student to take TWU
	nursing classes and earn a BSN). Also, a general transfer agreement was signed with
	Texas Tech University.
	• Several ISDs are offering vocational dual credit. Bay City ISD has 18 students signed up
	for dual credit EMS courses for fall 2024. WISD and El Campo ISD offer dual credit
	welding. ECISD offers automotive dual credit. Louise ISD plans offers welding dual
	credit in spring of 2025.
11.	Senior Citizens (Traci Myers; handout attached)
	• The program serves Wharton and Colorado counties (Wharton, El Campo, Eagle Lake,
	Columbus, and Weimar) with Meals on Wheels, congregate meals, in-person
	activities, and local transportation. From October 2023 to mid-March 2024, 9532
	meals were delivered or served.
	 March 23rd is the 5K Stride and Stroll fundraiser.
	 The program continues to search for a new facility in Columbus since the Mansfield
	Library is being sold and no longer available. Several positions remain open for

	numerous months (site managers for Eagle Lake, Weimar, and Columbus).
12.	Student Success & Campus Life (Lindsey McPherson; 2 handouts attached)
	 Student Life hosted numerous events on all four campuses, such as Welcome Back Week, National Pizza Day, Halloween Movies & Treats, Finals Fuel Breakfast, Valentine's Build-a-Bag, etc.
	• In fall 2023, Phi Theta Kappa had 67 new members with 750 eligible students invited in spring 2024. The chapter earned two stars and is on the path to earn a third. WCJC students received numerous scholarships and transfer opportunities.
	• Interest in student clubs is starting to rebound, with 15 active clubs and organizations this semester.
	• The National Society of Leadership & Success has 78 students and alumni members. The organization provides leadership and career opportunities and will host a speaker series.
	• 109 residents live in the residence halls with a 9% increase in Mullins and 5% increase in Frankie from spring 2023. (Mullins Hall has 53 beds and Frankie Hall has 75 beds.) Res Life events include Celebrating Chinese New Year and Celebrating Mardi Gras/Fat Tuesday. Of the seven events to date, the average attendance is 65 per event.
	 The Learning Centers are located on three campuses and services include tutoring, computer labs, course reserves, science models, copying/printing, and success workshops. Assigned faculty tutoring started in spring 2024 with 10 faculty at Wharton, 7 at Richmond, and 9 at Sugar Land. Spring 2024 Center visitors to date at Wharton totaled 420 with 309 at Richmond and 347 at Sugar Land. Brainfuse is the online tutoring platform and is accessible through Brightspace. A Peer Tutoring Program is under development as is a Success Workshop Series in collaboration with other Student Success areas.
13.	TRiO (Jessica Falcon; handout attached)
	 Students participating in the TRiO grant have 90% persistence rate (85% required), 91% good academic standing (85% required), 48% earned a certificate or degree (20% required), and 11% earned a degree AND transferred (10% required). 180 students are served (144 required). The program exceeds all grant expectations. TRiO provides the following services: course selection/advising, FAFSA assistance, financial literacy support, academic support, and graduation/transfer assistance. From September through February, the Center utilization totaled 2524 visits or a monthly average of 420 visits.
14.	Vocational Support/Perkins (Wendy Tamayo; handout attached)
	 The Perkins grant serves students enrolled in vocational programs and focuses on improving their success by funding instructional equipment to enhance program curriculum, providing instructional resources, and offering student financial assistance with childcare and transportation. In AY24, the grant funding totaled \$208,986, which included \$41,107 mid-year allocation. Instructional equipment was purchased for Automotive, Welding, and
	 Process Technology. Professional development was funded for Early Childhood, EMS, and Paralegal Studies. Wendy advises all vocational students. Some events in which she participated include
	• Wendy advises an vocational students. Some events in which she participated include the STEM Workshop, One-Stop Registration, Pioneer Frontier: Student Resource Fair, Central Fort Bend Chamber's Manufacturing Day, Women in Industry, etc.

- 2) AEL Integrated Education and Training (IET): The AEL IET funds pay 100% of tuition and fees of eligible AEL students enrolled in WCJC Level 1 Certificate programs and 95% of the tuition of CE Health Programs.
- **3) PY 23-24 Audit:** The HGAC Quality Assurance and Financial audits had zero findings and 100% satisfaction review for the third year in a row. These audits include the AEL program performance in different areas such as data entry, measurable skills gains, quality instruction, billing and financial reporting.
- **4) Upcoming Events:** GED Graduation tentatively on June 20, 2024 (Pending Facility Request Approval)

5) The AEL Grant Award July 1, 2024:

In November 2023, the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) requested applications from eligible providers for Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) services for one or both of the following:

a) Section 231 Activities: To develop, implement, and improve adult education and literacy under AEFLA § 231, including programs for Corrections Education and Institutionalized Individuals under AEFLA § 225.

b) Section 243 Activities: To carry out Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education (IELCE) under AEFLA § 243.

Through this Grant Award, grantees will enhance the Texas workforce system by delivering services which will assist:

a) Adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and economic self-sufficiency;

b) adults who are parents or family members to obtain the education and skills that are necessary to becoming full partners in the educational development of their children, and lead to sustainable improvements in the economic opportunities for their family;

c) adults in attaining a secondary school diploma and in the transition to postsecondary education and training, including through Career Pathways; and

d) immigrants and other individuals who are English Language Learners (ELL) in: (1) improving their reading, writing, speaking and comprehension skills in English, and their mathematical skills; and (2) acquiring an understanding of the American system of government, individual freedom, and the responsibilities of citizenship.

This RFA uses a different format than TWC's standard RFA. Through this RFA, applicants have the ability to apply for Section 231 Activities or Section 243 Activities, or both. AEL applied for both Section 231 & 243 Activities and submitted the RFA directly to Texas Workforce Commissions (TWC) in January 2024. The proposal is for \$1,231,605 Section 231 and \$520,000 in Section 243 (Total Award: \$1,751,605).

• Regular and Substantive Interaction (RSI)

- The federal government now requires all distance education courses to incorporate regular and substantive interaction. RSI is meant to distinguish "correspondence" courses (those with little or no instructor interaction, and ineligible for federal financial aid) from "distance" courses (those with significant instructor interaction, and therefore eligible for federal financial aid).
- During the Summer and Fall 2024 semesters, all online faculty were trained on the new RSI requirements. Additionally, a fully online, self- paced RSI training module was also developed so that new faculty could complete.
- An additional workshop, "Leveraging Brightspace to meet RSI Requirements" was also offered during the Fall 2023 and Spring 2024 semesters and will also be presented at the Spring meeting of the Texas Distance Learning Association in March.

• Accessibility

- Currently, Panorama (our online accessibility management platform) indicates that 85% of documents and media housed in Brightspace are 90% + accessible.
- This represents a significant improvement since DE first began the "Accessibility: Six Core Skills" training back in 2017, when our Ally report in Blackboard indicated only 58% of documents were accessible.
- Our biggest issue continues to be PDF documents (why most documents are not 100% accessible and accounts for the bulk of the remaining 15%).
- DE will be developing both a face-to-face and an online self-paced training course on creating accessible pdf documents and creating accessible fillable forms.

• Convocation Fall 2024

- We have continued to see excellent participation among faculty and staff who have agreed to present at our bi-annual faculty and staff professional development day during convocation in the fall and spring.
- This fall we are trying out a theme-based convocation "Teaching and Learning in the Age of AI"
- We welcome presentations from faculty and staff on all aspects of using/limiting AI.

o Turn-it-in

- Turn-it-in Feedback Studio is an instructional technology product that makes it easy to address plagiarism, and streamlines grading and feedback of papers and essays. It was first purchased with Title V funds back in 2012 for about \$17K. Since that time the price has continued to rise dramatically (currently around \$40K).
- The DELT (Distance Education and Learning Technologies) Committee has convened a subcommittee with additional faculty members from across campus to investigate possible alternatives to Turn-it-in.

o Dual Credit

- In order to comply with new TEA requirements, effective fall 2024, all faculty teaching dual credit sections will be required to enter their grades in Brightspace. Approximately every 4-6 weeks an intelligent agent will run through the class and send an email to the appropriate party at the high schools (and cc the dual credit coordinator at WCJC) to indicate if the student falls below the established threshold.
- Faculty will be required to set up the required intelligent agent(s) at the start of the term. DE will provide training and detailed documentation (handouts and videos) on how to accomplish this prior to the fall semester.
- The dual credit coordinator will ensure that faculty are provided with the correct emails of the contact individuals at the high schools at the start of the semester so that the intelligent agents.
