

Data is shared with staff

Plan and Design

- After data is reviewed, site teams develop goals and action plans
 - Goals are developed, based on data
 - Action plans may be developed by each department, grade level, teacher


Plan and Design

- Principals meet with Director of Assessment,
 Evaluation and Performance to review and refine plans
- Plans are shared with district-level staff
 - Superintendent/Assistant Superintendent
 - Director of Assessment, Evaluation, and Performance
 - Director of Special Education
 - Curriculum Coordinator
 - Supervisor of the Office of Education Equity
 - Federal Programs Supervisor

Sites may refine action plans based on data

 Final site plan evaluation takes place at following year's site team meeting(s)

Then and Now

Site plans were written independently

- Goals did not reflect the direction of the district as a system
- Not all sites had site plans
- Site plans did not address the district's three aims
- Goals were not consistently measureable
- Plans were not consistently reviewed; results were not evaluated

Site plans are written with district support

- Site plans are written in alignment with district initiatives
- All sites have site plans
- Site plans focus on district's three aims
- Goals are SMART
- Plans are regularly reviewed and used to drive staff development
- Results are reviewed as a part of the continuous improvement process
