5.0800.07 TEACHER'S AUTHORITY Issue Date: 4/10/97 Updated: 1/2/20 FH A teacher may send a student to the Principal's office in order to maintain effective discipline in the classroom. The Principal shall respond by employing appropriate discipline management techniques. A teacher may remove from class a student who has been documented by the teacher to repeatedly interfere with the teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in the class. Not later than the third class day after the day on which the student is removed from the class, the Principal shall schedule a hearing to be attended by the Principal or the Principal's designee, a parent or guardian of the student, the teacher, and the student. Following the hearing, whether or not all requested parties are in attendance after valid attempts to require their attendance, the Principal shall take one or more of the following actions: 1. Suspend the student for a period not to exceed six school days. 2. Place the student in an alternative education program. 3. Place the student back in the class. If the student is removed by the teacher a second time within the same semester, the student may be returned to that class only by action of the Superintendent at the Principal's request. If the student is removed by the teacher a third or subsequent time within the same semester, the student may be returned to that class only by action of the Board at the request of the Superintendent.	5.0800.07 REMOVAL FROM CLASSROOM FOR INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR Issue Date: 10/1/2026 A teacher may refer a student to the Principal (or other administrator) in order to maintain effective discipline in the classroom. The Principal shall respond by employing appropriate discipline management techniques. A teacher may remove from class a student who has been documented by the teacher to have violated school rules or district policy according to instructions given by the Principal. Examples of such conduct may include, but are not limited to: repeatedly interfering with the teacher's ability to communicate effectively with the students in the class, conduct that is distracting, disrupting, disrespecting, defying, destroying, degrading, dangerous, etc. within the district accountability system. The teacher and/or school administrator shall place the student on the appropriate conduct level, give the corresponding conduct accountability grade, offer pertinent interventions, impose consequences, and possibly enter into a conduct contract with the student and their parents according to the district accountability system.
