Great teachers don't give up on students with low grades, short attention spans, challenging behaviors, and they also don't ignore or bore high achievers. Teaching is a juggling act, and the teachers who make a difference are those who set high expectations, motivate students, and believe in all of their students, regardless of where they come from or their abilities.

When I started at Idaho Hill this year, I had many professionals approach me regarding the third grade class. I heard there were challenges behaviorally. Academically. Emotionally. It was going to be our largest class in the building. As the year began, my third grade teacher, Daisy Sjostrom, approached me in tears. She felt overwhelmed. She was worried about meeting the needs of all of her students. At that moment, I knew I had the right teacher for the job!

Daisy is reflective. She consistently observes, evaluates, and adjusts moment by moment based on the needs of her students. She worked hard at establishing order and now maintains a positive and productive learning environment, setting clear expectations and effective strategies to address disruptive behavior. She has done a remarkable job of building a rapport with students, fostering a sense of trust and respect, and does her best to provide constructive feedback to help her students grow.

Daisy knows third grade standards well and has the ability to explain skills and concepts clearly and effectively; she often uses digital technology to help support students' learning and recognizes she has a very diverse group of learners, which means she will tailor her approach to meet the needs of all of her students. There isn't a day that goes by that Daisy is not working in a small group setting with her students. If students are not working at the back table with Mrs. Sjostrom, she has it set where students are able to work independently or collaboratively, providing choice for students, depending on their own personal needs. This approach takes time to plan, organize, and execute, which is likely why I see Daisy at school on weekends.

Daisy does an exceptional job working effectively with colleagues and parents to support student learning. Her adaptability has allowed for an *all hands on deck* team approach where the third graders are receiving extra help from many different faculty members. Daisy also has a volunteer who comes in to help her students with math. Great teachers embrace and welcome the extra help and support to do what's best for their students! In our most recent IRI January Benchmark, 81% of Daisy's class showed growth in reading.

The third grade classroom is in good hands with Daisy Sjostrom. All students would be in good hands with her. The staff at Idaho Hill Elementary are fortunate and blessed to have her on the team! Thank you, Daisy, for all your hard work and dedication!

They may help supervise lunches, monitor recesses, or take command of before and after bus duty.

Her day begins by setting up materials for early morning recess before she greets the students in the morning as they're arriving at school.
