			available. Additionally, there are no funding options available through the county
			jails or court systems within the 6 county region.

		I.	The only treatment funding source available to the NEMCCAB region is the PIHP,
			Northern Michigan Regional Entity (NMRE). NMRE provides an assessment to
			determine eligibility for funding of residential substance abuse treatment not the
			Substance Use Assessment. This entity also provides funding for Outpatient
			Treatment only after a Substance Ase Assessment is completed; they do not fund
			the assessment. Substance Use is the highest documented need via the COMPAS
			Risk Assessment data in each county within the NEMCCAB Region. The most
			effective way to address treatment needs is to remove barriers to success, including
			the costly assessment required to obtain further treatment. Also, Substance Use
			Assessments are not available within the NEMCCAB jails making this program
			necessary. Especially for those incarcerated pending trial.

а.	a. Describe how this program meets each of the following Evidence Based Principles:		
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	1.	Assess	Actuarial Risk/Needs – The Substance Use Assessment Program is for anyone with a
1			nented need. It is required for the following programs/services: Drug/Sobriety Court
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and Outpatient Substance Use Treatment. It is also a requirement for all defendants charged with an OUIL 3rd Offense, prior to sentencing.

- 2. Enhance Intrinsic Motivation Participants that complete this assessment may be determined eligible for other Community-Based Programming, and is a requirement if charged with an OUIL 3rd, prior to sentencing. This assessment allows for placement in programs/services based on client's needs. It is available to those that request it, therefore enhances the likelihood of treatment recommendation compliance. Drug/Sobriety Court participants are required to complete the assessment in order to request enrollment into the program; which enhances their investment into the program. The program itself is structured and geared towards enhancing participant involvement; utilizing a graduated system with rewards and sanctions. The same is true for Community-Based Programs that require this assessment. The assessment provides an avenue for appropriate service/program recommendations that are structured towards reducing Substance Use, which will likely be difficult but have natural reqards that increase motivation.
- 3. Target Interventions (indicate all that apply)
 - a. Risk Principle: Prioritize supervision and treatment resources for higher risk offenders -This Assessment is provided for those Pretrial defendants and/or sentenced felons with a documented need, including documented substance abuse history, current substance abuse related felony probation violation, or current felony charge/conviction that requires a substance abuse assessment by law. Drug/Sobriety Court can determine which participants need the intensive services offered by this program; Outpatient services also utilizes this tool to determine the level of need and appropriate treatment recommendations.
 - b. Need Principle: Target interventions to criminogenic needs -According to the Crime and Justice Institute's Eight Evidence-Based Principles the first standard is to Assess Actuarial Risk/Needs. As the ASAM Level of Case Assessment is a nationally recognized assessment all clients referred to this service will be utilizing as means of targeting appropriate treatment interventions.
 - c. Responsivity Principle: Be responsive to temperament, learning style, motivation, culture, and gender when assigning programs -Treatment recommendations developed from this assessment informs specific treatment interventions based on each defendant/offenders' specific needs. Drug Court and all outpatient therapy services utilize this assessment to determine the type of interventions needed and how to be responsive to how those needs will be addressed.
 - d. Dosage: Structure 40-70% of high-risk offenders' time for 3-9 months -This assessment provides the standard for dosing structure for substance use treatment recommendations for Drug Court & Outpatient services. Without these recommendations these programs would not be able to provide appropriate services, i.e., level of intensity of therapy interventions or Drug/Sobriety Court supervision.



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e. Treatment Principle: Integrate treatment into the full sentence/sanction requirements -Treatment recommendations developed from this assessment informs specific treatment interventions based on each defendant/offenders' specific needs. Drug/Sobriety Courts are a highly structured sentence/sanction program that incorporates treatment into every level of their program. With the assistance of a Substance Use Assessment, they are able to address each person in an individualized way that improves their potential outcomes.

4. Skill Train with Directed Practice – Each Counselor has a minimum of a Master's Degree and MCBAP Certification; Certified Advanced Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CAADC), Certified Alcohol & Drug Counselor (CADC), or MCBAP-approved development plan in place w/eligibility to obtain CAADC Certification within 6 months. Therefore; the recommendations carry significant weight in the Drug/Sobriety Court & Outpatient programs. When a recommendation is made, it is utilized in direct practice by these programs to provide appropriate services/interventions.

5. Increase Positive Reinforcement – This program is designed as a caveat for targeted interventions within the Drug/Sobriety Courts and Outpatient programs with skilled professionals who can meet the needs of the clients served. By completing this assessment and gaining access to appropriate services that can be beneficial to Mental Health and sobriety, clients are receiving positive reinforcement.

6. Engage Ongoing Support in Natural Communities – The Substance Use Assessment Program is required for the following: Drug/Sobriety Court; Outpatient Treatment; and all defendants charged with an OUIL 3rd Offense, prior to sentencing. This program removes a barrier to access services in a Community-Based setting, allowing the client access to crucial Evidence-Based practice services and continuity of care. Drug/Sobriety Courts are an alternative to incarceration, which keeps individuals in the community, and assists in creating healthy supports within the community. Outpatient Therapy accomplishes the same goals, by teaching those with unhealthy thinking and behavior patterns to exchange those patterns for healthy alternatives that allow for increased support in their natural environments.

7. Measure Relevant Processes/Practices – Captures statistical data for number of enrollees who did not receive a prison disposition, as well as number of enrollees who successfully complete assessment recommendations.

8. Provide Measurement Feedback – Shares data reguarding participation/program success and effectiveness with stakeholders.

b. <u>Program Key Performance Measure</u> – 80% of defendants charged with OUIL 3rd, who successfully complete the Assessment will not receive a prison disposition at sentencing.

<u>Data Element</u> – Number of defendants assessed and number of defendants who receive/do not receive a prison disposition at sentencing.
