Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the discretely presented component unit, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information, and the budgetary comparisons of the General Fund of Aztec Municipal School District No. 2, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the discretely presented component unit, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information, and the budgetary comparisons of the General Fund of Aztec Municipal School District No. 2, as of June 30, 2025, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Schedules A-1 through B-4 and notes to the Required Supplementary Information on pages 80 through 99 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management has omitted the Management Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of the financial reporting for placing the basic financial

statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements, the combining financial statements for the general fund, the combining financial statements for the discretely presented component unit, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, and Supporting Schedules I through IV required by 2.2.2 NMAC are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements, the combining financial statements for the general fund, the combining financial statements for the discretely presented component unit, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards and the Supporting Schedules I through IV required by 2.2.2 NMAC are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual report. The other information comprises the introductory section but does not include the basic financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with our audit of the basic financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the basic financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 30, 2025 on our consideration of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance.

That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

The issuance of long-term debt (e.g. bonds, notes, leases) provides current financial resources to governmental funds, while the repayment of the principal of long-term debt consumes the current financial resources of governmental funds. NOTE 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 was created under the provision of Chapter 22 Article 5, Paragraph 4, New Mexico Statutes 1978 to provide public education for the children within the District. The School Board is authorized to establish policies and regulations for its own government consistent with the laws of the State of New Mexico and the regulations of the NM Public Education Department and the Legislative Finance Committee. The School Board is comprised of five members who are elected for terms of four years.

The School Board operates seven schools within the District. In conjunction with the regular education programs, all of these schools offer special education. In addition, the School Board provides transportation and school food services for the students.

The summary of significant accounting policies of the District is presented to assist in the understanding of the District's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are the representation of Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. The financial statements of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 (the "District") have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standard Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The GASB periodically updates its codification of the existing Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards which, along with subsequent GASB pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations), constitutes GAAP for governmental units. The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below.

A. Financial Reporting Entity

In evaluating how to define the District, for financial reporting purposes, management has considered all potential component units. The decision to include any potential component units in the financial reporting entity was made by applying the criteria set forth in GASB Statement No. 14 as amended by GASB Statement No. 39. Blended component units, although legally separate entities, are in substance part of the government's operations. Each discretely presented component unit is reported in a separate column in the government-wide financial statements to emphasize that it is legally separate from the government.

The basic – but not the only – criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is the governing body's ability to exercise oversight responsibility. The most significant manifestation of this ability is financial interdependency. Other manifestations of the ability to exercise oversight responsibility include, but are not limited to, the selection of governing authority, the designation of management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters. A second criterion used in evaluating potential component units is the scope of public service. Application of this criterion involves considering whether the activity benefits the government and/or its citizens. A third criterion used to evaluate the potential component units for inclusion or exclusion from the reporting entity is the existence of special financing relationships, regardless of whether the government is able to exercise oversight responsibilities. Finally, the nature and significance of a potential component unit to the primary government could warrant its inclusion within the reporting entity. Based upon the application of these criteria, the District has one component unit as described in the following paragraphs, and is not a component unit of another governmental agency.

The Mosaic Academy charter school is chartered under the District and is the financial responsibility of the District. Mosaic Academy is a discretely presented component unit of the District, as defined by GASB Statement No. 14, as amended by GASB Statement No. 39, and has a separate governing board. A New Mexico charter school is considered a public school, accredited by the state board of public education and accountable to the District's local school board for ensuring compliance with applicable laws, rules and charter provisions. Mosaic Academy does not issue separate financial statements. The notes to financial statements and fund financial statements for the discretely presented component unit are included in these financial statements.

B. Government-wide and fund financial statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of inter-fund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from *business-type activities*, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support. The District does not have business-type activities as of June 30, 2025.

In the government-wide Statement of Net Position, the governmental activities column is presented on a consolidated basis and is reported on a full accrual, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. The District's net position is reported in three parts – Net investment in capital assets, restricted net position and unrestricted net position.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds and major individual enterprise fund are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. The District does not have any enterprise funds.

C. Measurement focus, basis of accounting, and financial statement presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement focus* and the *accrual basis of accounting*, as is the fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources resulting from non-exchange transactions are recognized in accordance with the requirements of GASB Statement No. 33, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Non-Exchange Transactions*. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which the taxes are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

Ad valorem taxes (property taxes) and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met. Expenditure-driven grants are recognized as revenue when the qualifying expenditures have been incurred and all other grant requirements have been met and the susceptible to accrual criteria have been met. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

Governmental funds are used to account for the District's general government activities, including the collection and disbursement of specific or legally restricted monies, the acquisition or construction of general fixed assets, and the servicing of general long-term debt.

Under the requirements of GASB Statement No. 34, the District is required to present certain of its governmental funds as major funds based upon certain criteria. The major funds presented in the fund financial statements include the following (in addition to the General Fund), which may include funds that were not required to be presented as major but were at the discretion of management:

General Fund:

The *Operational Fund* is used to account for the State Equalization Guarantee from the NM State Legislature and is the primary operating fund of the District, and accounts for all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in other funds. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The *Transportation Fund* is used to account for the costs associated with transporting school-age children to and from school. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The *Instructional Materials Fund* is used to account for the monies received from the State Department of Education for the purposes of purchasing instructional materials (books, manuals, periodicals, etc.) used in the education of students. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The *Local Revenue Operational Fund* is used for the maintenance of public-school buildings and grounds. Expenditures include wastewater treatments and the purchase of maintenance and repair equipment. Maintenance supports school safety on the simplest level by preventing and fixing small threats to staff, teachers, and students on school buildings and facilities.

The *Student Activities* are to account for monies maintained by management for various student groups at each location within the District. These are established to direct and account for monies used to support cocurricular and extracurricular student activities. As a general rule, cocurricular activities are any kinds of school-related activities outside the regular classroom that directly add value to the formal or stated curriculum. The student activity funds were appropriately reported in the current year in accordance with GASB Statement No. 84 and the fund balances are reported as part of the General Fund.

Capital Projects Funds:

The *Capital Improvements SB-9 Local Fund (31701)* provides financing for the purchase of equipment and capital improvements to District property. Funding is received from a 2 mill property tax levy and interest earned on investments, under New Mexico Senate Bill 9.

The *Education Technology Equipment Act (31900)* fund is used to account for funding which is to be used by the District to promote the comprehensive integration of advances technologies in education setting, through the conduct of technical assistance, professional development, information and resource dissemination and collaboration activities. Authorization is NMSA 22-15A-1.

Debt Service Funds:

The *Debt Service Fund (41000)* is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the payment of General Long-Term Debt principal, interest and related costs. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The *Ed Tech Debt Service Fund (43000)* is used to account for the accumulation of resources for the payment of General Long-Term Debt principal, interest and related costs associated with the Education Technology bond issues. Authority for the creation of this fund is the New Mexico Public Education Department.

As a general rule, the effect of inter-fund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are payments-in-lieu of taxes. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various functions concerned.

Program revenues included in the Statement of Activities derive directly from the program itself or from parties outside the District's taxpayer or citizenry, as a whole; program revenues reduce the cost of the function to be financed from the District's general revenues. Program revenues are categorized as (a) charges for services, which include revenues collected for cafeteria fees and lost books, etc., (b) program-specific operating grants, which includes revenues received from state and federal sources such as Title I and IDEA-B to be used as specified within each program grant agreement, and (c) program-specific capital grants and contributions, which include revenues from the state resources such as SB-9 and HB-33 funding to be used for capital projects. Internally dedicated resources are reported as *general revenues* rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues.

The District reports all direct expenses by function in the Statement of Activities. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with the function. The District does not currently employ indirect cost allocation systems. Depreciation expense is specifically identified by function and is included in the direct expense of each function, except for that portion of depreciation that is identified as unallocated in the Statement of Activities. Interest on general long-term debt is considered an indirect expense and is reported separately on the Statement of Activities.

D. Assets, Liabilities and Net Position or Equity

Cash and Cash Equivalents: The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments with original maturities of twelve months or less from the date of acquisition.

State statutes authorize the District to invest in Certificates of Deposit, obligations of the U.S. Government, and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool. Investments for the District are reported at fair value. Fair value is the amount at which a financial instrument could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties. The State Treasurer's Investment Pool operates in accordance with appropriate state laws and regulations. The reported value of the Pool is the same as the fair value of the pool shares. As of June 30, 2025, the District did not hold any pool shares in the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Fair Value Measurements: The fair value framework uses a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to the valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). As of June 30, 2025, there are no items are required to be valued using valuation techniques.

Restricted Assets: Restricted assets are those that are set aside for restrictions resulting from enabling legislation for future capital outlay expenditures and debt service payments. The District's restricted assets are made up of debt service funds that cannot be spent in the subsequent year.

Receivables and Payables: Inter-fund activity is reported either as loans, services provided, reimbursements, or transfers. Loans are reported as inter-fund receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation. Services provided, deemed to be at market or near market rates, are treated as revenues and expenditures/expenses. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund, and reduces its related costs as a reimbursement. All other inter-fund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or between proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements. All receivables are reported at their gross value and, where appropriate, are reduced by the estimated portion that is expected to be uncollectible.

The District receives monthly income from a tax levy in San Juan County. The funds are collected by the County Treasurer and are remitted to the District in the following month. Under the modified accrual method of accounting, the amount remitted by the San Juan County Treasurers in July and August is considered 'measurable and available' and, accordingly, is recorded as revenue in the governmental fund financial statements during the year ended June 30, 2025. Period of availability is deemed to be sixty days subsequent to year end for property taxes and ninety days subsequent to year end for other nonexchange revenues.

Certain Special Revenue funds are administered on a reimbursement method of funding; other funds are operated on a cash advance method of funding. The funds incurred the cost and submitted the necessary request for reimbursement or advance, respectively.

Inventory: The District's method of accounting for inventory is the consumption method. Under the consumption approach, governments report inventories they purchase as an asset and defer the recognition of the expenditures until the period in which the inventories are actually consumed. Inventory is valued at cost. In the General Fund, inventory consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. Inventory in the Food Service Fund consists of U.S.D.A. commodities and other purchased food and non-food supplies.

The cost of purchased inventory is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are consumed. Commodities consumed during the year are reported as revenues and expenditures; unused commodities are reported as inventories.

Prepaid items: Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements. These payments are related to grant reimbursements and are not recognized as expenditures and submitted for reimbursement until the purchase is complete. The District records prepaid items using the consumption method.

Capital Assets: Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental column in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000, per section 12-6-10 NMSA 1978, and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Pursuant to the implementation of GASB Statement No. 34, the historical cost of infrastructure assets, (retroactive to 1979) are to be included as part of the governmental capital assets reported in the government wide statements. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation. Information Technology Equipment including software is being capitalized and included in furniture, fixtures, and equipment in accordance with NMAC 2.20.1.9 C (5).

The District was a phase II government for purposes of implementing GASB Statement No. 34. However, the District does not have any infrastructure assets to report.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Library books are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. No interest was included as part of the cost of capital assets under construction during the year ended June 30, 2025.

Capital expenditures made on the District's building construction projects by the New Mexico Public School Facilities Authority are included in the District's capital assets as appropriate.

Property, plant, and equipment of the primary government are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Land improvements	10-20 years
Buildings/building improvements	20-50 years

Accrued Payroll Liabilities: In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize the accrual of unpaid salaries, wages, and benefits that employees earned prior to the end of the fiscal year. The amount recognized in the fund financial statements represents the amounts due to employees or due to third parties for the employee benefits.

Deferred Outflows of Resources: In addition to assets, the balance sheet reports a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a use of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expenditure) until that time. The District has four types of items that qualify for reporting in this category related to the pension and OPEB plans which are discussed at Notes 10 and 11.

Deferred Inflows of Resources: In addition to liabilities, the balance sheet reports a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. Revenue must be susceptible to accrual (measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period) to be recognized. If assets are recognized in connection with a transaction, but those assets are not yet available to finance expenditures of the current fiscal period, then the assets must be offset by a corresponding liability for deferred inflows of resources. The District has one type of item, which arises under the modified accrual basis of accounting that qualifies for reporting in this category. Accordingly, the item, unavailable revenue – property taxes, are reported only in the governmental funds balance sheet. These amounts are deferred and recognized as an inflow of resources in the period that the amounts become available. The District has recorded \$269,998 related to property taxes that are considered “unavailable”. The District also has items related to the pension and OPEB plans which are discussed at Notes 10 and 11.

Compensated Absences: The District recognized a liability for compensated absences in accordance with GASB Statement No. 101, *Compensated Absences*. Under this standard, liabilities are recognized for two types of leave;

1. Leave that has not been used—leave which is (a) attributable to services already rendered by employees, (b) accumulates and is permitted to be carried over into future periods, and (c) is more likely than not to be used as time off or settled in cash or noncash upon termination or otherwise..
2. Leave that has been used but not yet paid or settled—such as when employees have taken leave but have not yet received payment (or noncash settlement) for that leave.

The liability includes salary-related payments that are directly and incrementally associated with compensated absences such as employer-paid payroll taxes.

Eligible full-time and part-time employees accrue paid leave days at the following rate.

This policy takes the place of the more conventional "sick leave" which allows time off only if you are sick. The District believes this policy will give employees more flexibility in their personal lives and will allow for better planning between employees and supervisors.

Every eligible employee is credited with leave days to be used for any combination of illness, doctors' appointments, family business, childcare, or any other personal needs. Whenever an eligible employee is away from work for any reason, the time missed will be charged to the employee's accrued leave time. Financial compensation will not be paid in lieu of unused leave days. District personnel are urged to use professionalism, maturity and judgment in taking these days for reasons other than illness. It is suggested that leave days be taken at times when the employee's workload allows it, so that the employee's absence will not be a burden on co-workers or cause problems for District students or parents. Please schedule these days off in advance with your supervisor whenever possible. Responsible use of employee time will be a factor in every employee's summative evaluation.

Part-time employees will receive a prorated amount of leave days. For example, if an employee works half (1/2) time, they will receive half (1/2) the number of appropriate leave days. If they work a sixty percent (60%) contract, they will receive sixty percent (60%) of the number of appropriate leave days.

Accumulated Leave

All unused leave will be accumulated as sick leave and carried over from year to year. All employees will be required to use the current contract year's leave first before using accumulated sick leave. The accumulated leave may be used as sick leave only.

Incentive for Outstanding Attendance

The Board would like to reward annual outstanding attendance with the Aztec School District. Employees who have accumulated leave in the following increments will be eligible for additional leave time each year. This additional leave time will be added at the beginning of the contract year. These leave days can be used as leave during the contract year and will accumulate as sick leave at the conclusion of the contract year.

Longevity Incentive

All employees who have ten (10) years or more of service with the District and seventy-five (75) or more accumulated sick/leave days when they resign in good standing as determined by the Superintendent or retire from the District will receive forty (\$40.00) for every unused sick/leave day, up to a maximum of one hundred fifty (150) days, and fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for every unused sick/leave day, over one hundred fifty (150) days, up to a maximum of two hundred (200) days. The Longevity Incentive will be paid at the end of the fiscal year. (June)

Any employee who can be shown to have willfully violated or misused the District's leave policy or misrepresented any statement or condition will be subject to discipline, which may include reprimand, suspension, and/or dismissal.

Long-term Obligations: In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities Statement of Net Position. Bond premiums and discounts are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the effective interest method or the straight-line method if the difference from the effective interest method is inconsequential.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the period the bonds are issued. The face amount of the debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt services expenditures.

Net Position and Fund Equity: Governmental funds report fund balance classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent. The detail of the District's fund balances is presented on the face of the fund financial statements.

In the government-wide financial statements, fund equity is classified as net position and is displayed in three components:

Net investment in capital assets: Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

Restricted Net Position: Consist of net position with "legally enforceable" constraints placed on the use, either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulation of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Legally enforceable means that a government can be compelled by an external party – such as citizens, public interest groups, or the judiciary to use resources created by enabling legislation, only for the purposes specified by the legislation. Generally, the enforceability of an enabling legislation restriction is determined by professional judgment. If it is determined that the restrictions continue to be legally enforceable, then for the purposes of financial reporting, the restricted net position should not reflect any reduction for resources used for purposes not stipulated by the enabling legislation. Descriptions for the related restrictions for net position are restricted for "debt service or capital projects."

Unrestricted Net Position: All other net positions that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets".

The government-wide Statement of Net Position reports \$18,846,029 of restricted net position related to grants, capital projects and debt service.

Fund Balance: In the fund financial statements, governmental funds are reported in classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent. For committed and assigned fund balance, the District's highest level of decision-making authority is the Board of Education. Formal action by the Board of Education is required to establish a fund balance commitment or assignment.

For the classification of fund balances, the District considers restricted or unrestricted amounts to have been spent when an expenditure is incurred for the purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available. Also, for the classification of fund balances, the District considers committed, assigned or unassigned amounts to have been spent when an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of those unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

In the governmental fund financial statements, fund balance is classified and displayed in five components, as displayed below:

Nonspendable: Consists of amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. At June 30, 2025, the nonspendable fund balance of the District is comprised of inventory in the General Funds totaling \$158,579, which is not in spendable form.

D. Assets, Liabilities and Net Position or Equity (Continued)

Restricted: Consists of amounts that are restricted to specific purposes as a result of a) externally imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed: Consist of amounts that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the District's Board of Education. Those committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the District's Board of Education removes or changes the specified use by taking formal action.

Assigned: Consist of amounts that are constrained by the District's *intent* to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Formal action by the District's Board of Education is required to assign amounts to be used for specific purposes. The District did have \$414,288 of fund balances as of June 30, 2025 for student activity funds.

Unassigned: Represents fund balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the general fund except for those other governmental funds reflecting a deficit.

The District's policy is to apply restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purpose for which both restricted and unrestricted net positions are available.

Inter-fund Transactions: Quasi-external transactions are accounted for as revenues, expenditures or expenses. Transactions that constitute reimbursements to a fund from expenditures/expenses initially made from it that are properly applicable to another fund, are recorded as expenditures/expenses in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures/expenses in the fund that is reimbursed.

All other inter-fund transactions, except quasi-external transactions and reimbursements, are reported as transfers. Non-recurring or non-routine permanent transfers of equity are reported as residual equity transfers. All other inter-fund transfers are reported as operating transfers.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates affecting the District's financials include management's estimate of the useful lives of capital assets and the net pension and OPEB liabilities (including the related components).

E. Revenues

State Equalization Guarantee: School districts in the State of New Mexico receive a 'state equalization guarantee distribution' which is defined as "that amount of money distributed to each school district to ensure that the school district's operating revenue, including its local and federal revenues as defined (in Chapter 22, Section 825, NMSA 1978) is at least equal to the school district's program cost.

A school district's program costs are determined through the use of various formulas using 'program units' which take into consideration 1) early childhood education; 2) basic education; 3) special education; 4) bilingual-multicultural education; 5) size, etc. Payment is made from the public school fund under the authority of the Secretary of the Public Education Department. The District received \$30,780,211 in state equalization guarantee distributions during the year ended June 30, 2025.

E. Revenues (Continued)

Tax Revenues: The District receives mill levy and ad-valorem tax revenues primarily for debt service and capital outlay purposes. Tax revenues are recognized when they are in the hands of the collecting agency. The District records only the portion of the taxes considered to be 'measurable' and 'available' on a modified accrual basis. The District recognized \$8,283,945 in tax revenues during the year ended June 30, 2025. Descriptions of the individual debt service and capital outlay funds contained in these financial statements include information regarding the authority for the collection and use of these taxes.

Property taxes attach an enforceable lien on property as of January 1. Tax notices are sent to property owners by November 1st of each year to be paid in whole or in two installments by November 10th and April 10th of each year. San Juan County collects County, City, and School taxes and distributes them to each fund once per month except in June when the taxes are distributed twice to close out the fiscal year.

Transportation Distribution: School districts in the State of New Mexico receive student transportation distributions. The transportation distribution is allocated to each school district in accordance with formulas developed by the State Transportation Director and the Secretary of the Public Education Department. The funds shall be used only for the purpose of making payments to each school district for the to-and-from school transportation costs of students in grades K through twelve attending public school within the school district. The District received \$1,087,114 in transportation distributions during the year ended June 30, 2025.

Instructional Materials: Section 22-15-5 NMSA 1978 creates the instructional material fund, a non-reverting fund used for the purchase of instructional materials. The fund is administered by PED and contains money appropriated by the Legislature through a categorical appropriation. The instructional material law provides parameters for how funds are to be distributed to school districts. Instructional Materials must align to New Mexico state standards. For fiscal year 2025, instructional materials funds flowed through the monthly SEG distributions

Public School Capital Outlay: Under the provisions of Chapter 22, Article 24, a public school capital outlay fund was created. The money in the fund may be used only for capital expenditures deemed by the public school capital outlay council necessary for an adequate educational program, and the capital outlay expenditures are limited to the purchase, or construction of temporary or permanent classrooms.

The council shall approve an application for grant assistance from the fund when the council determines that:

1. A critical need exists requiring action;
2. The residents of the school districts have provided all available resources to the district to meet its capital outlay requirements;
3. The school district has used its resources in a prudent manner;
4. The school district is in a county or counties which have participated in the reappraisal program and the reappraised values are on the tax rolls, or will be used for the tax year 1979 as certified by the property tax division; and
5. The school district has provided insurance for buildings of the school district in accordance with the provisions of Section 13-5-3 NMSA 1978.

The council shall consider all applications for assistance from the fund and after public hearing shall either approve or deny the application. Applications for grant assistance shall only be accepted by the council after a district has complied with the provisions of this section. The council shall list all applications in order of priority and all allocations shall be made on a priority basis.

Money in the fund shall be disbursed by warrant of the Department of Finance and Administration on vouchers signed by the Secretary of Finance and Administration following certification by the council that the application has been approved.

During fiscal year 2025, the District did not receive special capital outlay funds.

SB-9 State Match: The Director shall distribute to any school district that has imposed a tax under the Public School Capital Outlay Improvements Act (22-25-1 to 22-25-10 NMSA 1978) an amount from the public school capital improvements fund that is equal to the amount by which the revenue estimated to be received from the imposed tax as specified in Subsection B of section 22-25-3 NMSA 1978, assuming a one hundred percent collection rate, is less than an amount calculated by multiplying the product obtained by the rate imposed in the District under the Public School Capital Improvements Act. The distribution shall be made by December 1, of each year that the tax is imposed in accordance with Section 22-25-3 NMSA 1978. Provided, however, in the event that sufficient funds are not available in the public school capital improvement funds to make the state distribution provided for in this section, the dollar per program unit figure shall be reduced as necessary.

The district received \$204,615 in SB-9 state match funds during the year end June 30, 2025.

Federal Grants: The District receives revenues from various Federal departments (both direct and indirect), which are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. These programs are reported as Special Revenue Funds. Each program is operated under its own budget, which has been approved by the Federal Department or the flow-through agency (usually the New Mexico Public Education Department). The various budgets are approved by the Local School Board and the New Mexico Public Education Department.

F. Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Educational Retirement Board (ERB) and additions to/deductions from ERB's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by ERB, on the economic resources measurement focus and accrual basis of accounting. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

G. Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions (OPEB)

For purposes of measuring the net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB, and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA) and additions to and deductions from NMRHCA's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by NMRHCA. For this purpose, NMRHCA recognizes benefit payments when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

H. Newly Adopted GASB Pronouncements

During the year ended June 30, 2025 the District adopted GASB Statement *No. 101 Compensated Absences*, this pronouncement does have a significant impact on these financial statements which is disclosed in Note 7. The District also adopted Statement No. 102 *Certain Risk Disclosures*, this pronouncement does not have a significant impact on these financial statements.

Budgetary Information

Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are prepared by management and are approved by the local Board of Education and the School Budget and Planning Unit of the Public Education Department. Auxiliary student activity accounts are not budgeted.

These budgets are prepared on the Non-GAAP (Cash) budgetary basis, excluding encumbrances, and secure appropriation of funds for only one year. Carryover funds must be re-appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. Because the budget process in the State of New Mexico requires that the beginning cash balance be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year, such appropriated balance is legally restricted and is therefore presented as a designated portion of the fund balance.

Actual expenditures may not exceed the budget at the function level. Budgets may be amended in two ways. If a budget transfer is necessary within a major category called a 'function,' this may be accomplished with only local Board of Education approval. If a transfer between 'functions' or a budget increase is required, approval must also be obtained from the New Mexico Public Education Department.

The budgetary information presented in these financial statements has been amended in accordance with the below procedures. The District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

1. In April or May, the local school board submits to the School Budget and Finance Analysis Bureau (SBFAB) of the New Mexico Public Education Department, a proposed operating budget for the ensuing fiscal year commencing July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them. All budgets submitted to the State of New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) by the District shall contain headings and details as described by law and have been approved by the New Mexico Public Education Department.
2. In May or June of each year, the proposed "operating" budget will be reviewed and approved by the SBFAB and certified and approved by the local school board at a public hearing of which notice has been published by the local school board who fixes the estimated budget for the District for the ensuing fiscal year.
3. The school board meeting, while not intended for the general public, is open for the general public unless a closed meeting has been called.
4. The "operating" budget will be approved by the local board at an open board meeting and then will be integrated formally into the accounting system prior to July 1st. Encumbrances shall be used as an element of control and shall be integrated into the budget system.
5. The District shall make corrections, revisions and amendments to the estimated budgets fixed by the local school board to recognize actual cash balances and carryover funds, if any. These adjustments shall be reviewed and approved by the SBFAB.
6. The superintendent is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the school board and the New Mexico Public Education Department.

7. Budget change requests are processed in accordance with Supplement 1 (Budget Preparation and Maintenance) of the Manual of Procedures Public School Accounting and Budgeting. Such changes are initiated by the District and approved by the SBFAB.
8. Legal budgetary control for expenditures is at the function level.
9. Appropriations lapse at fiscal year-end. Funds unused during the fiscal year may be carried over into the next fiscal year by budgeting those in the subsequent fiscal year’s budget. The budget of Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 has been amended during the current fiscal year in accordance with these procedures. The budget schedules included in the accompanying financial statements reflect the approved budget and amendments thereto.
10. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Funds and Debt Service Funds.
11. Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are adopted on a basis not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Encumbrances are treated the same way for GAAP purposes and for budget purposes.

The Board of Education may approve amendments to the appropriated budget, which are required when a change is made affecting budgeted ending fund balance. New Mexico state law prohibits a Governmental Agency from exceeding an individual function.

The accompanying Statements of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget (Non-GAAP Budgetary Basis) and Actual present comparisons of the legally adopted budget with actual data on a budgetary basis.

Since accounting principles applied for purposes of developing data on a budgetary basis differ significantly from those used to present financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, a reconciliation of resultant basis, perspective, equity, and timing differences in the excess (deficiency) of revenues and other sources of financial resources for the year ended June 30, 2025, is presented.

The appropriated budget for the year ended June 30, 2025, was properly amended by the Board of Education throughout the year. These amendments resulted in the following changes:

The District is required to balance its budgets each year. Accordingly, amounts in excess or deficient are presented as changes in cash designated for expenditures, not as an excess or deficiency of revenues over expenditures.

The reconciliation between the Non-GAAP budgetary basis amounts and the financial statements on the GAAP basis for each governmental fund is included in the individual budgetary comparison. The District budgets on a modified cash basis with respect to payroll or held checks being accrued and expensed, therefore, fund balances on the budget statements do not reconcile to cash due to the District's accrued payroll which is presented on the accrual basis.

NOTE 3. Deposits and Investments

State statutes authorize the investment of the District's funds in a wide variety of instruments including certificates of deposit and other similar obligations, state investment pool, money market accounts, and United States Government obligations. All invested funds of the District properly followed State investment requirements as of June 30, 2025.

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the District. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The rate of interest in non-demand interest-bearing accounts shall be set by the State Board of Finance, but in no case shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred percent of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the day of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State or the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments. The collateral pledged is listed on Schedule I of this report. The types of collateral allowed are limited to direct obligations of the United States Government and all bonds issued by any agency, district or political subdivision of the State of New Mexico.

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, public unit deposits are funds owned by the public unit. Time deposits, savings deposits and interest bearing NOW accounts of a public unit in an institution in the same state will be insured up to \$250,000 in aggregate and separate from the \$250,000 coverage for public unit demand deposits at the same institution.

The District has presented Certificates of Deposit and money market accounts of \$1,048,861 as investments in the Statement of Net Position. As of June 30, 2025, the District also has \$8,424,075 in U.S. Governmental Fixed Income Securities which are considered cash and cash equivalents.

Interest Rate Risk—Investments. The District does not have a formal policy limiting investment maturities that would help manage its exposure to fair value losses from increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk—Investments. For an investment, concentration of credit risk is when any one issuer is 5% or more of the investment portfolio of the District. Since the District only purchases investments with the highest credit rating, the concentration is not viewed to be an additional risk by the District. The U.S. Governmental Fixed Income Securities comprises 88.93% of the total investments and the certificate of deposits make up the other 11.07%.

Fair Value Measurement

The fair value framework uses a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to the valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the District has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets.
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. See above for discussion of valuation methodologies used to measure fair value of investments.

The valuation methodologies described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the District believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Statutes require collateral pledged for repurchase agreements in excess of the federal deposit insurance to be delivered, or a joint safekeeping receipt be issued, to the District for at least one hundred and two percent of the amount on deposit with the institution. Custodial credit risk – Investments. For an investment, custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of its short-term investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. Of the District's \$16,583,842 in repurchase agreements, the entire balance is uninsured and collateralized by collateral of underlying securities held by the investment's counterparty not in the name of the District. The District's policy related to short-term investments is to comply with the state statute as put forth in the Public Money Act (Section 6-10-1 to 6-10-63, NMSA 1978). The carrying value of the District's repurchase agreements at June 30, 2025 was \$14,419,257; total amount of deposits of \$16,583,842 less outstanding items of \$2,164,585.

Interest Rate Risk for Investments. The District does not have a written policy for limiting interest rate risk. However, the average maturity of certificates of deposit is twelve months or less, which is an effective limit of interest rate risk.

NOTE 7. Long-Term Debt

General Obligation Bonds:

The District issues general obligation bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and construction of major capital facilities. The District did not maintain any outstanding balances of general obligation bonds.

Lease Purchase Notes:

The District issues Education Technology General Obligation Lease Purchase Certificates of Participation (Lease Purchase Notes) under the terms of a lease-purchase agreement by and between the District and the New Mexico Public Schools Education Technology Assistance Foundation, LLC pursuant to the Education Technology Equipment Act, NMSA 1978, §§ 6-15A-1 to 6-15A-16 for the purchase of technology related equipment and improvements as allowed under this Act. All lease purchase notes are for governmental activities.

In prior years, the general fund was typically used to liquidate long-term liabilities other than general obligation bonds and lease purchase notes.

Compensated Absences – Twelve-month contract employees of the District are able to accrue a limited amount of general leave during the year. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025, the District adopted the provisions of GASB Statement No. 101, *Compensated Absences*. As a result of this implementation, beginning net position was reduced by \$3,491,361 in the government-wide financial statements, to recognize previously unrecorded compensated absences liabilities. Governmental fund statements were not impacted, as only matured compensated absences are recognized in those funds. During fiscal year June 30, 2025, compensated absences increased \$121,645 over the prior year accrual. See Note 1 for more details.

NOTE 8. Risk Management

The District is a member of the New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority (NMPSIA). The Authority was created to provide comprehensive core insurance programs by expanding the pool of subscribers to maximize cost containment opportunities for required insurance coverage. The District pays an annual premium to the NMPSIA based on claim experience and the status of the pool. The Risk Management Program includes Workers Compensation, General and Automobile Liability, Automobile Physical Damage, and Property and Crime coverage. Also included under the risk management program are Boiler and Machinery, Underground Storage Tanks and Catastrophic Student Accident Insurance. The NMPSIA provides coverage for up to a maximum of \$750,000,000 for each property damage claim with a \$25,000 deductible for each building.

General liability coverage is afforded to all employees, volunteers and school board members and the limit is subject to the NMSA Tort Claims Act on a per occurrence basis. The automobile and property liability limit is subject to the provisions of the Tort Claims Act. The crime limit is \$1,250,000 per occurrence for Faithful Performance. A limit of \$1,250,000 applies to Depositor's Forgery, Credit Card Forgery and Money Orders. A limit of \$100,000 applies to Money and Security, with all crime coverage subject to a \$750 deductible.

In case the NMPSIA's assets are not sufficient to meet its liability claims, the agreement provides that subscribers, including the District, cannot be assessed additional premiums to cover the shortfall. As of June 30, 2025, there have been no claims that have exceeded insurance coverage. The District is in the process of attempting to recover costs associated with this event and this continues to be an ongoing matter.

NOTE 10. Pension Plan – Educational Retirement Board

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan description. The New Mexico Educational Retirement Act (ERA) was enacted in 1957. The act created the Educational Employees Retirement Plan (Plan) and, to administer it, the New Mexico Educational Retirement Board (NMERB). The Plan is included in NMERB's annual comprehensive financial report. The report can be found on NMERB's Web site at https://www.nmerb.org/Annual_reports.html.

The Plan is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer pension plan established to provide retirement and disability benefits for certified teachers and other employees of the state's public schools, institutions of higher learning, and state agencies providing educational programs. Additional tenets of the ERA can be found in Section 22-11-1 through 22-11-52, NMSA 1978, as amended.

The Plan is a pension trust fund of the State of New Mexico. The ERA assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to a seven-member Board of Trustees (Board); the state legislature has the authority to set or amend contribution rates and other terms of the Plan. NMERB is self-funded through investment income and educational employer contributions. The Plan does not receive General Fund Appropriations from the State of New Mexico.

The Plan administers a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan, which is a qualified plan under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Service Code and is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(a). All accumulated assets are held by the Plan in trust to pay benefits, including refunds of contributions as defined in the terms of the Plan.

Eligibility for membership in the Plan is a condition of employment, as defined Section 22-11- 2, NMSA 1978. Employees of public schools, universities, junior and community colleges, public technical and vocational institutions, state special schools, charter schools, regional education cooperatives, the New Mexico Activities Association, and certain employees at state agencies that provide an educational program, who are employed more than 25% of a full-time equivalency, are required to be members of the Plan, unless specifically excluded.

Summary of Plan Provisions for Retirement Eligibility by Tier –

Tier 1: Membership prior to July 1, 2010

For members employed before July 1, 2010, a member is eligible to retire when one of the following events occurs:

- The member's age and allowable service credit add up to the sum of 75 or more. Those who retire under the age of sixty, and who have fewer than 25 years of earned service credit will receive reduced retirement benefits, or
- The member is at least sixty-five years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 25 years or more.

Tier 2: Membership on or after July 1, 2010, but prior to July 1, 2013

Section 22-11-23.1, NMSA 1978 changed the eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on, or after, July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013. The eligibility for a member who either becomes a new member on or after July 1, 2010, and before July 1, 2013, or at any time prior to July 1, 2010 was refunded all members contributions and then becomes re-employed after July 1, 2010 is as follows:

- The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit will receive reduced retirement benefits, or

- The member is at least sixty-seven years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 30 years or more.

Tier 3: Membership beginning on or after July 1, 2013, but prior to July 1, 2019

Section 2-11-23.2, NMSA 1978 added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2013, or who were employed before July 1, 2013 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2013. These members must meet one of the following requirements.

- The member's minimum age is 55 and has earned 30 or more years of service credit. Those who retire earlier than age 55, but with 30 years of earned service credit will have a reduction in benefits to the actuarial equivalent of retiring at age 55, or
- The member's age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit receive reduced retirement benefits, or
- The member's age is 67, and the member has earned five or more years of service credit.

Tier 4: Membership beginning on or after July 1, 2019

Section 2-11-23.3, NMSA 1978, added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2019, or who were employed before July 1, 2019 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2019. These members must meet one of the following requirements.

- The member is any age and has 30 or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member is at least 67 years of age and have 5 or more years or earned service credit, or
- The sum of the member's age and years of earned service credit equals at least 80.

Forms of Payment – The benefit is paid as a monthly life annuity with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member's accumulated contributions plus accumulated interest, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member's surviving beneficiary.

Benefit Options – The Plan has three benefit options available.

- **Option A – Straight Life Benefit** – The single life annuity option has no reductions to the monthly benefit, and there is no continuing benefit due to a beneficiary or estate, except the balance, if any, of member contributions plus interest less benefits paid prior to the member's death.
- **Option B – Joint 100% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 100% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the same benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.

- **Option C – Joint 50% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 50% survivor’s benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the reduced 50% benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member’s monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member’s increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary’s death.

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) – All retired members and beneficiaries receiving benefits receive an automatic adjustment in their benefit on July 1 following the later of 1) the year a member retires, or 2) the year a member reaches age 65 (Tier 1 and Tier 2) or age 67 (Tier 3 and Tier 4).

As of July 1, 2013, for current and future retirees the COLA is immediately reduced until the Plan is 100% funded. The COLA reduction is based on the median retirement benefit of all retirees excluding disability retirements.

Retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 10% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.5%. Once the funding is greater than 90%, the COLA reductions will decrease. The retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 5% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.7%.

Members on disability retirement are entitled to a COLA commencing on July 1 of the third full year following disability retirement. A member on regular retirement who can prove retirement because of a disability may qualify for a COLA beginning July 1 in the third full year of retirement.

Disability Benefit: Eligibility – A member is eligible for a disability benefit provided (a) he or she has credit for at least ten years of service, and (b) the disability is approved by the Board of Trustees.

Monthly Benefit – The monthly benefit is equal to 2% of FAS times years of service, but not less than the smaller of (a) one-third of FAS or (b) 2% of FAS times years of service projected to age 60.

Form of Payment – The disability benefit commences immediately upon the member’s retirement. Disability benefits are payable as monthly life annuity, with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member’s accumulated contributions, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member’s surviving beneficiary. If the disabled member survives to age 60, the regular optional forms of payment are then applied.

Refund of Contributions – Members may withdraw their contributions only when they terminate covered employment in the State and their former employer(s) certification determination has been received by NMERB. Interest is paid to members when they withdraw their contributions following termination of employment at a rate set by the Board of Trustees. Interest is not earned on contributions credited to accounts prior to July 1, 1971, or for contributions held for less than one year.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions – At June 30, 2025, the District reported a liability of \$41,294,791 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2024, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2023. The total pension liability was rolled-forward from the valuation date to the plan year ending June 30, 2024 using generally accepted actuarial principles. There were no significant events or changes in benefit provisions that required an adjustment to the roll-forward liabilities as of June 30, 2024.

The District’s proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the District’s long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating educational institutions at June 30, 2023, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2024, the District’s proportion was 0.46990 percent, which was an decrease of 0.02701 percent from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2023.

For the year ended June 30, 2025, the District recognized pension income of \$3,483,666. At June 30, 2025, the District reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

Discount rate. A single discount rate of 7.00% was used to measure the total pension liability as of June 30, 2024. This is the same rate used for June 30, 2023. The 7.00% single discount rate was based on a long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.00%. Based on the stated assumptions and the projection of cash flows, the pension plan’s fiduciary net position and future contributions were sufficient to finance all projected future benefit payments of current plan members.

As a result, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

The projections of cash flows used to determine the single discount rate assumed that plan member and employer contributions will be made at the current statutory levels.

NOTE 11. Post-Employment Benefits – State Retiree Health Care Plan

General Information about the OPEB

Plan description. Employees of the District are provided with OPEB through the Retiree Health Care Fund (the Fund)—a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plan administered by the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA). NMRHCA was formed February 13, 1990, under the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Act (the Act) of New Mexico Statutes Annotated, as amended (NMSA 1978), to administer the Fund under Section 10-7C-1-19 NMSA 1978. The Fund was created to provide comprehensive group health insurance coverage for individuals (and their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses) who have retired or will retire from public service in New Mexico.

The Fund was created to provide comprehensive group health insurance coverage for individuals (and their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses) who have retired or will retire from public service in New Mexico.

NMRHCA is an independent agency of the State of New Mexico. The funds administered by NMRHCA are considered part of the State of New Mexico financial reporting entity and are OPEB trust funds of the State of New Mexico. NMRHCA’s financial information is included with the financial presentation of the State of New Mexico.

Benefits provided. The Fund is a multiple employer cost sharing defined benefit healthcare plan that provides eligible retirees (including terminated employees who have accumulated benefits but are not yet receiving them), their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance and prescription drug benefits consisting of a plan, or optional plans of benefits, that can be contributions to the Fund and by co-payments or out-of-pocket payments of eligible retirees.

Contributions – Employer and employee contributions to the Fund total 3% for non-enhanced retirement plans and 3.75% of enhanced retirement plans of each participating employee’s salary as required by Section 10-7C-15 NMSA 1978. The contributions are established by statute and are not based on an actuarial calculation. All employer and employee contributions are non-refundable under any circumstance, including termination of the employer’s participation in the Fund. Contributions to the Fund from the District were \$407,775 for the year ended June 30, 2025.

OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to OPEB

At June 30, 2025, the District reported a liability of \$5,544,438 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability was measured as of June 30, 2024, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as June 30, 2024. Rate of Return. Discount Rate. The discount rate used to measure the Fund’s total OPEB liability is 7.00% as of June 30, 2024. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employer contributions will be made at rates proportional to the actuary determined contribution rates. For this purpose, employer contributions that are intended to fund benefits of current plan members and their beneficiaries are included. Projected employer contributions that are intended to fund the service costs for future plan members and their beneficiaries are not included. Based on those assumptions, the OPEB plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments for current plan members. The 7.00% assumed investment return on plan assets, which includes the assumed inflation rate of 2.50%, was used to calculate the net OPEB liability.

NOTE 14. Concentrations

The District depends on financial resources flowing from, or associated with, both the Federal Government and the State of New Mexico. Because of this dependency, the District is subject to changes in specific flows of intergovernmental revenues based on modifications to Federal and State laws and Federal and State Appropriations.

NOTE 15. Subsequent Events

The date to which events occurring after June 30, 2025, the date of the most recent Statement of Net Position, have been evaluated for possible adjustment to the financial statements or disclosures is November 30, 2025. NOTE 16. Tax Abatements

In accordance with GASB Statement No. 77, the District is required to disclose information on certain tax abatement agreements affecting the District. A tax abatement is created when a government enters into an agreement with an individual or entity in which the government promises to forgo tax revenues and the individual or entity promises to subsequently take a specific action that contributes to economic development or otherwise benefits the government or its citizens. NOTE 16. Contingent Liabilities

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the District expects such amount, if any, to be immaterial.

The District is involved in various claims and lawsuits arising in the normal course of business. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, it is the opinion of the District's legal counsel that resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the District.

NOTE 17. Subsequent Pronouncements

Effective Date: The provisions of this Statement are effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2025. NOTE 1. Financial Reporting Entity- Mosaic Academy Charter School

Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 has determined that Mosaic Academy Charter School (Charter School) is a major component unit of the District under Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 14, the Financial Reporting Entity and GASB Statement No.39, Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units, an amendment of GASB Statement No.61, The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus- an amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No.34. Since the Charter School relies on its charter from the District and the Charter School share certain financial benefits with the District, in the case of revenue being passed through the District, to possible financial burdens, such as possibility being liable for operating deficits, a financial benefit/burden exists. The charter school's approximate enrollment is 180 students.

Governmental funds are used to account for the Charter School's general government activities, including the collection and disbursement of specific or legally restricted monies and the acquisition or construction of capital assets.

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources- which are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. Special revenue fund codes are organized into the broad categories designated by the first two digits in the five-digit fund number as follows: 21000- Student Nutrition, 22000- Athletic Event Gate Receipts, 23000- Non-Instructional Support, 24000- Federal Flow-through Grants, 25000- Federal Direct Grants, 26000- Local Grants, 27000- State Flow-through Grants, 28000- State Direct Grants, 29000- Combined Local/State Grants.

Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

NOTE 2. Stewardship, Compliance and Accountability

Budgetary Information

Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are prepared by management and are approved by the local Board of Education and the School Budget and Planning Unit of the Public Education Department. Auxiliary student activity accounts are not budgeted.

These budgets are prepared on the Non-GAAP (Cash) budgetary basis, excluding encumbrances, and secure appropriation of funds for only one year. Carryover funds must be re-appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year. Because the budget process in the State of New Mexico requires that the beginning cash balance be appropriated in the budget of the subsequent fiscal year, such appropriated balance is legally restricted and is therefore presented as a designated portion of the fund balance.

Actual expenditures may not exceed the budget at the function level. Budgets may be amended in two ways. If a budget transfer is necessary within a major category called a 'function,' this may be accomplished with only local Board of Education approval. If a transfer between 'functions' or a budget increase is required, approval must also be obtained from the New Mexico Public Education Department.

Budgetary Information - (Continued)

The budgetary information presented in these financial statements has been amended in accordance with the below procedures. The Charter School follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

1. In April or May, the local school board submits to the School Budget and Finance Analysis Bureau (SBFAB) of the New Mexico Public Education Department, a proposed operating budget for the ensuing fiscal year commencing July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them. All budgets submitted to the State of New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) by the Charter School shall contain headings and details as described by law and have been approved by the New Mexico Public Education Department.
2. In May or June of each year, the proposed “operating” budget will be reviewed and approved by the SBFAB and certified and approved by the local school board at a public hearing of which notice has been published by the local school board who fixes the estimated budget for the Charter School for the ensuing fiscal year.
3. The school board meeting, while not intended for the general public, is open for the general public unless a closed meeting has been called.
4. The “operating” budget will be approved by the local board at an open board meeting and then will be integrated formally into the accounting system prior to July 1st. Encumbrances shall be used as an element of control and shall be integrated into the budget system.
5. The Charter School shall make corrections, revisions and amendments to the estimated budgets fixed by the local school board to recognize actual cash balances and carryover funds, if any. These adjustments shall be reviewed and approved by the SBFAB.
6. The superintendent is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the school board and the New Mexico Public Education Department.
7. Budget change requests are processed in accordance with Supplement 1 (Budget Preparation and Maintenance) of the Manual of Procedures Public School Accounting and Budgeting. Such changes are initiated by the Charter School and approved by the SBFAB.
8. Legal budgetary control for expenditures is at the function level.
9. Appropriations lapse at fiscal year-end. Funds unused during the fiscal year may be carried over into the next fiscal year by budgeting those in the subsequent fiscal year’s budget. The budget of the Charter School has been amended during the current fiscal year in accordance with these procedures. The budget schedules included in the accompanying financial statements reflect the approved budget and amendments thereto.
10. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Capital Projects Funds and Debt Service Funds.
11. Budgets for the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Debt Service Funds are adopted on a basis not consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Encumbrances are treated the same way for GAAP purposes and for budget purposes.

The Board of Education may approve amendments to the appropriated budget, which are required when a change is made affecting budgeted ending fund balance. New Mexico state law prohibits a Governmental Agency from exceeding an individual function.

The accompanying Statements of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget (Non-GAAP Budgetary Basis) and Actual present comparisons of the legally adopted budget with actual data on a budgetary basis.

Since accounting principles applied for purposes of developing data on a budgetary basis differ significantly from those used to present financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, a reconciliation of resultant basis, perspective, equity, and timing differences in the excess (deficiency) of revenues and other sources of financial resources for the year ended June 30, 2025 is presented.

The appropriated budget for the year ended June 30, 2025, was properly amended by the Board of Education throughout the year. These amendments resulted in the following changes:

The Charter School is required to balance its budgets each year. Accordingly, amounts in excess or deficient are presented as changes in cash designated for expenditures, not as an excess or deficiency of revenues over expenditures.

The reconciliation between the Non-GAAP budgetary basis amounts and the financial statements on the GAAP basis for each governmental fund is included in the individual budgetary comparison. The Charter School budgets on a modified cash basis with respect to payroll or held checks being accrued and expensed, therefore, fund balances on the budget statements do not reconcile to cash due to the Charter School’s accrued payroll which is presented on the accrual basis.

NOTE 3. Deposits and Investments

State statutes authorize the investment of the Charter School’s funds in a wide variety of instruments including certificates of deposit and other similar obligations, state investment pool, money market accounts, and United States Government obligations. All invested funds of the Charter School properly followed State investment requirements as of June 30, 2025.

Deposits of funds may be made in interest or non-interest bearing checking accounts in one or more banks or savings and loan associations within the geographical boundaries of the Charter School. Deposits may be made to the extent that they are insured by an agency of the United States or by collateral deposited as security or by bond given by the financial institution.

The rate of interest in non-demand interest-bearing accounts shall be set by the State Board of Finance, but in no case shall the rate of interest be less than one hundred percent of the asked price on United States treasury bills of the same maturity on the day of deposit.

Excess of funds may be temporarily invested in securities which are issued by the State or by the United States government, or by their departments or agencies, and which are either direct obligations of the State or the United States or are backed by the full faith and credit of those governments. The collateral pledged is listed on Schedule I of this report. The types of collateral allowed are limited to direct obligations of the United States Government and all bonds issued by any agency, Charter School or political subdivision of the State of New Mexico.

According to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, public unit deposits are funds owned by the public unit. Time deposits, savings deposits and interest bearing NOW accounts of a public unit in an institution in the same state will be insured up to \$250,000 in aggregate and separate from the \$250,000 coverage for public unit demand deposits at the same institution.

Deposits:

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits. Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of bank failure, the Charter School’s deposits may not be returned to it. The Charter School does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk, other than the following state statutes as put forth in the Public Money Act (Section 6-10-1 to 6-10-63, NMSA 1978.) At June 30, 2025, \$468,821 of the Charter School’s deposits of \$718,821 was exposed to custodial credit risk. All of the \$468,821 was insured and collateralized by collateral held by the pledging bank’s trust department, not in the Charter School’s name. As of June 30, 2025, the carrying amount of these deposits was \$702,561; total amount of deposits of \$718,821 less outstanding items of \$16,150. New Mexico State Statutes require collateral pledged for deposits in excess of the federal deposit insurance to be delivered, or a joint safekeeping receipt be issued, to the Charter School for a least one half of the amount on deposit with the institution. The schedule listed below will meet the State of New Mexico, Office of the State Auditor’s requirements in reporting the insured portion of the deposits.

NOTE 6. Risk Management

The Charter School is a member of the New Mexico Public Schools Insurance Authority (NMPSIA). The Authority was created to provide comprehensive core insurance programs by expanding the pool of subscribers to maximize cost containment opportunities for required insurance coverage. The Charter School pays an annual premium to the NMPSIA based on claim experience and the status of the pool. The Risk Management Program includes Workers Compensation, General and Automobile Liability, Automobile Physical Damage, and Property and Crime coverage. Also included under the risk management program are Boiler and Machinery, Underground Storage Tanks and Catastrophic Student Accident Insurance. The NMPSIA provides coverage for up to a maximum of \$750,000,000 for each property damage claim with a \$25,000 deductible for each building.

General liability coverage is afforded to all employees, volunteers and school board members and the limit is subject to the NMSA Tort Claims Act on a per occurrence basis. The automobile and property liability limit is subject to the provisions of the Tort Claims Act. The crime limit is \$1,250,000 per occurrence for Faithful Performance. A limit of \$1,250,000 applies to Depositor's Forgery, Credit Card Forgery and Money Orders. A limit of \$100,000 applies to Money and Security, with all crime coverage subject to a \$750 deductible.

In case the NMPSIA's assets are not sufficient to meet its liability claims, the agreement provides that subscribers, including the Charter School, cannot be assessed additional premiums to cover the shortfall. As of June 30, 2025, there have been no claims that have exceeded insurance coverage. The Charter School is in the process of attempting to recover costs associated with this event and this continues to be an ongoing matter.

Plan description. The New Mexico Educational Retirement Act (ERA) was enacted in 1957. The act created the Educational Employees Retirement Plan (Plan) and, to administer it, the New Mexico Educational Retirement Board (NMERB). The Plan is included in NMERB’s annual comprehensive financial report. The report can be found on NMERB’s Web site at https://www.nmerb.org/Annual_reports.html.

The Plan is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer pension plan established to provide retirement and disability benefits for certified teachers and other employees of the state’s public schools, institutions of higher learning, and state agencies providing educational programs. Additional tenets of the ERA can be found in Section 22-11-1 through 22-11-52, NMSA 1978, as amended.

The Plan is a pension trust fund of the State of New Mexico. The ERA assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to a seven-member Board of Trustees (Board); the state legislature has the authority to set or amend contribution rates and other terms of the Plan. NMERB is self-funded through investment income and educational employer contributions. The Plan does not receive General Fund Appropriations from the State of New Mexico.

The Plan administers a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan, which is a qualified plan under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Service Code and is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(a).

All accumulated assets are held by the Plan in trust to pay benefits, including refunds of contributions as defined in the terms of the Plan. Eligibility for membership in the Plan is a condition of employment, as defined Section 22-11- 2, NMSA 1978. Employees of public schools, universities, junior and community colleges, public technical and vocational institutions, state special schools, charter schools, regional education cooperatives at state agencies that provide an educational program, who are employed more than 25% of a full-time equivalency, are required to be members of the Plan, unless specifically excluded.

Pension Benefit – A member’s retirement benefit is determined by a formula which includes three component parts: 1) the member’s final average salary (FAS), 2) the number of years of service credit, and 3) a 0.0235 multiplier. The FAS is the average of the member’s salaries for the last five fiscal years of service or any other consecutive five fiscal year period, whichever is greater.

Summary of Plan Provisions for Retirement Eligibility –

Tier 1: Membership prior to July 1, 2010

For members employed before July 1, 2010, a member is eligible to retire when one of the following events occurs:

- The member’s age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 75 or more. Those who retire under the age of sixty, and who have fewer than 25 years of earned service credit will receive reduced retirement benefits, or
- The member is at least sixty-five years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 25 years or more.

Tier 2: Membership on or after July 1, 2010, but prior to July 1, 2013

Section 22-11-23.1, NMSA 1978 changed the eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on, or after, July 1, 2010 and before July 1, 2013. The eligibility for a member who either becomes a new member on or after July 1, 2010, and before July 1, 2013, or at any time prior to July 1, 2010 was refunded all members contributions and then becomes re-employed after July 1, 2010 is as follows:

- The member’s age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit will receive reduced retirement benefits, or
- The member is at least sixty-seven years of age and has five or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member has service credit totaling 30 years or more.

Tier 3: Membership beginning on or after July 1, 2013, but prior to July 1, 2019

Section 2-11-23.2, NMSA 1978 added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2013 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions, and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2013. These members must meet one of the following requirements.

- The member's minimum age is 55 and has earned 30 or more years of service credit. Those who retire earlier than age 55, but with 30 years of earned service credit will have a reduction in benefits to the actuarial equivalent of retiring at age 55, or
- The member's minimum age and earned service credit add up to the sum of 80 or more. Those who retire under the age of 65, and who have fewer than 30 years of earned service credit receive reduced retirement benefits, or
- Or the member's age is 67, and the member has earned 5 or more years of service credit.

Tier 4: Membership beginning on or after July 1, 2019

Section 2-11-23.3, NMSA 1978, added eligibility requirements for new members who were first employed on or after July 1, 2019, or who were employed before July 1, 2019 but terminated employment and subsequently withdrew all contributions and returned to work for an ERB employer on or after July 1, 2019. A member in this tier must meet one of the following requirements.

- The member is any age and has 30 or more years of earned service credit, or
- The member is at least 67 years of age and have 5 or more years or earned service credit, or
- The sum of the member's age and years of earned service credit equals at least 80.

Forms of Payment – The benefit is paid as a monthly life annuity with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member's accumulated contributions plus accumulated interest, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member's surviving beneficiary.

Benefit Options – The Plan has three benefit options available.

- **Option A – Straight Life Benefit** – The single life annuity option has no reductions to the monthly benefit, and there is no continuing benefit due to a beneficiary or estate, except the balance, if any, of member contributions plus interest less benefits paid prior to the member's death.
- **Option B – Joint 100% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 100% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the same benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.
- **Option C – Joint 50% Survivor Benefit** – The single life annuity monthly benefit is reduced to provide for a 50% survivor's benefit. The reduced benefit is payable during the life of the member, with the provision that, upon death, the reduced 50% benefit is paid to the beneficiary for his or her lifetime. If the beneficiary predeceases the member, the member's monthly benefit is increased to the amount the member would have received under Option A Straight Life benefit. The member's increased monthly benefit commences in the month following the beneficiary's death.

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) – All retired members and beneficiaries receiving benefits receive an automatic adjustment in their benefit on July 1 following the later of 1) the year a member retires, or 2) the year a member reaches age 65 (Tier 1 and Tier 2) or age 67 (Tier 3 and Tier 4).

As of July 1, 2013, for current and future retirees the COLA is immediately reduced until the Plan is 100% funded. The COLA reduction is based on the median retirement benefit of all retirees excluding disability retirements. Retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 10% COLA reduction; their average COLA will be 1.5%. Once the funding is greater than 90%, the COLA reductions will decrease. The retirees with benefits at or below the median and with 25 or more years of service credit will have a 5% COLA reduction, their average COLA will be 1.7%.

Members on disability retirement are entitled to a COLA commencing on July 1 of the third full year following disability retirement. A member on regular retirement who can prove retirement because of a disability may qualify for a COLA beginning July 1 in the third full year of retirement.

Disability Benefit:

Eligibility – A member is eligible for a disability benefit provided (a) he or she has credit for at least ten years of service, and (b) the disability is approved by the Board of Trustees.

Monthly Benefit – The monthly benefit is equal to 2% of FAS times years of service, but not less than the smaller of (a) one-third of FAS or (b) 2% of FAS times years of service projected to age 60.

Form of Payment – The disability benefit commences immediately upon the member’s retirement. Disability benefits are payable as monthly life annuity, with a guarantee that, if the payments made do not exceed the member’s accumulated contributions, determined as of the date of retirement, the balance will be paid in a lump sum to the member’s surviving beneficiary. If the disabled member survives to age 60, the regular optional forms of payment are then applied.

Refund of Contributions – Members may withdraw their contributions only when they terminate covered employment in the State and their former employer(s) certification determination has been received by NMERB. Interest is paid to members when they withdraw their contributions following termination of employment at a rate set by the Board of Trustees. Interest is not earned on contributions credited to accounts prior to July 1, 1971, or for contributions held for less than one year.

Contributions – For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 educational employers contributed to the Plan based on the following rate schedule.

The contribution requirements are established in statute under Chapter 10, Article 11, NMSA 1978. The requirements may be amended by acts of the New Mexico Legislature. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Charter School paid employer contributions of \$281,394 and \$250,620, which equal the amount of the required contributions for each fiscal year.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions – At June 30, 2025, the Charter School reported a liability of \$2,858,735 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2024, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2023.

The total pension liability was rolled-forward from the valuation date to the plan year ending June 30, 2024, using generally accepted actuarial principles. There were no significant events or changes in benefit provisions that required an adjustment to the roll-forward liabilities as of June 30, 2024.

The Charter School’s proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the Charter School’s long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating educational institutions at June 30, 2023, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2024, the Charter School’s proportion was 0.03253% percent, which was an increase of 0.0116% percent from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2023.

For the year ended June 30, 2025, the Charter School recognized pension income of \$41,937. At June 30, 2025, Charter School reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

Discount rate. A single discount rate of 7.00% was used to measure the total pension liability as of June 30, 2024. This is the same rate used for June 30, 2023. The 7.00% single discount rate was based on a long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 7.00%. Based on the stated assumptions and the projection of cash flows, the pension plan’s fiduciary net position and future contributions were sufficient to finance all projected future benefit payments of current plan members.

As a result, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

The projections of cash flows used to determine the single discount rate assumed that plan member and employer contributions will be made at the current statutory levels.

General Information about the OPEB

Plan description. Employees of the Charter School are provided with OPEB through the Retiree Health Care Fund (the Fund)—a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plan administered by the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA). NMRHCA was formed February 13, 1990, under the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Act (the Act) of New Mexico Statutes Annotated, as amended (NMSA 1978), to administer the Fund under Section 10-7C-1-19 NMSA 1978. The Fund was created to provide comprehensive group health insurance coverage for individuals (and their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses) who have retired or will retire from public service in New Mexico.

NMRHCA is an independent agency of the State of New Mexico. The funds administered by NMRHCA are considered part of the State of New Mexico financial reporting entity and are OPEB trust funds of the State of New Mexico. NMRHCA’s financial information is included with the financial presentation of the State of New Mexico.

Benefits provided. The Fund is a multiple employer cost sharing defined benefit healthcare plan that provides eligible retirees (including terminated employees who have accumulated benefits but are not yet receiving them), their spouses, dependents and surviving spouses and dependents with health insurance and prescription drug benefits consisting of a plan, or optional plans of benefits, that can be contributions to the Fund and by co-payments or out-of-pocket payments of eligible retirees.

Contributions – Employer and employee contributions to the Fund total 3% for non-enhanced retirement plans and 3.75% of enhanced retirement plans of each participating employee’s salary as required by Section 10-7C-15 NMSA 1978. The contributions are established by statute and are not based on an actuarial calculation. All employer and employee contributions are non-refundable under any circumstance, including termination of the employer’s participation in the Fund. Contributions to the Fund from the Charter School were \$30,475 for the year ended June 30, 2024.

OPEB Liabilities, OPEB Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to OPEB

At June 30, 2025, the Charter School reported a liability of \$387,003 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability was measured as of June 30, 2024, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as June 30, 2023. The Charter School’s proportion of the net OPEB liability was based on actual contributions provided to the Fund for the year ending June 30, 2024. At June 30, 202, the Charter School’s proportion was .02168 percent.

Rate of Return. The long-term expected rate of return on OPEB plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which the expected future real rates of return (net of investment fees and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These returns are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage, adding expected inflation and subtracting expected investment expenses and a risk margin. The target allocation and projected arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class, after deducting inflation, but before investment expenses, used in the derivation of the long-term expected investment rate of return assumptions.

Discount Rate. The discount rate used to measure the Fund’s total OPEB liability is 7.00% as of June 30, 2024. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employer contributions will be made at rates proportional to the actuary determined contribution rates. For this purpose, employer contributions that are intended to fund benefits of current plan members and their beneficiaries are included. Projected employer contributions that are intended to fund the service costs for future plan members and their beneficiaries are not included. Based on those assumptions, the OPEB plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments for current plan members. The 7.00% assumed investment return on plan assets, which includes the assumed inflation rate of 2.50%, was used to calculate the net OPEB liability.

NOTE 10. Right of Use Asset and Liability

During fiscal year 2022 the Charter School implemented GASB Statement 87, Leases and the Charter School has long term agreements for the use of building and land to be used for classroom and administration which began on August, 2022 and will continue through fiscal year 2047. These leases are paid monthly with payments ranging of 17,500 with an interest rate of 6.44%. The agreement provides for the purchase of the assets at the end of the lease and does not provide for an extension of the agreement

Special Revenue Funds

Student Nutrition Program (21000) – This program provides financing for the school breakfast and lunch program. Funding is provided from fees from patrons and USDA food reimbursements, under the National School Lunch Act.

Universal Free Meals (21100) – This award is based upon reimbursable meal counts and claims are automatically generated in the Student Nutrition Portal.

Athletics (22000) – This fund is used to account for fees generated at athletic activities throughout the School District. The gate receipts are obtained from the general public and are expended in this fund. The authority for creation of this fund is 6.20.2 NMAC.

Title I (24101) – To help local education agencies (LEAs) and schools improve the teaching and learning of children failing, or most at-risk of failing, to meet challenging State academic standards. Funding authorization: Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Title I, Part A, 20 U.S.C.6301 et seq.

Entitlement IDEA-B (24106) – To account for a program funded by a federal grant to assist the schools in providing free appropriate public education to all handicapped children. Authorized by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004, Title I, Part B (Public Law 108-446).

New Mexico Autism Project (24108) – The purpose of this fund is to support the implementation of the NMAP's researched based model to improve outcomes for students with autism spectrum disorders (ASD). The program is funded by the United States government, under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part B, Section 611-617, and part D, Section 674 as amended, 20 U.S.C 1711-1417 and 1420. Authority for creation of this fund is New Mexico State Autism Spectrum Disorder Project.

Preschool IDEA-B (24109) – The objective of the Assistance to States for the Education of Handicapped Children Program is to assist in providing free, appropriate public education to all handicapped children from ages three to five. Authorized by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004, Title I, Part B (Public Law 108-446).

Fresh Fruits & Vegetables (24118) – These funds are awarded through the USDA Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program for School Food Authority (SFA) Elementary School Sites to offer nutritious fresh fruit and vegetables to students in the classroom.

Charter Schools (24146) – Federal flow through funding geared towards promoting the setup, continuation, and thriving of charter schools.

English Language Acquisition (24153) – To provide funds to improve the educational performance of limited English proficient students by assisting the children to learn English and meet State academic content standards. Authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Title III (Public Law 107-110).

Teacher/Principal Training & Recruiting (24154) – To improve the skills of teachers and the quality of instruction in mathematics and science, and also to increase the accessibility of such instruction to all students. Authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Title II, Part A, Sec. 2101-2151 (Public Law 107-110).

Youth Conservation (28133) – Allows for students to participate in conservation programs at National, State and City Parks as well as a study time for academic programs.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, the discretely presented component unit, each major fund, the aggregate remaining fund information, and the budgetary comparisons of the General Fund of the Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 (the District), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated November 30, 2025.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements, on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. We identified certain deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2025-001 that we consider to be a material weakness.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether District's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that are required to be reported per section 12-6-5 NMSA 1978 that we have described in the accompanying schedule of Section 12-6-5 NMSA 1978 finding as items 2025-002 and 2025-003.

The District's Response to Findings

Government Auditing Standards requires the auditor to perform limited procedures on the District's response to the findings identified in our audit and described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. The District's response was not subjected to the other auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

Purpose of This Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. We have audited Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's compliance with the types of compliance requirements identified as subject to audit in the OMB *Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on each of Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2025. Aztec Municipal School District No. 2's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

In our opinion, Aztec Municipal School District No. 2 complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2025.

Basis for Opinion on Each Major Federal Program

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). SECTION II - FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS

2025-001 — Deficiencies in IT General Computer Controls and IT Environment – (Material Weakness)

Condition: During our audit, we noted that there were various deficiencies within the IT General Computer Control and overall environment. The following were noted:

- We noted that the district has now engaged with a professional IT firm for penetration testing and exposure discovery that reported 17 open exposures that outlined network security risk. The firm also reported other various risks including 286 open exposures to data leaks, 6 open exposures to application security, and 720 social engineering risks. These have been noted by auditors as areas for ongoing improvement and are currently being addressed by District staff with the assistance of a professional IT Firm.
- We noted that the District were made aware, in the prior year, of suggested preventative cybersecurity measures that were not adhered to prior to the cyberattack. The District had not performed formal cybersecurity penetration testing from an outside third-party and we noted that the District would benefit from a formal, standards-based information security program, an assessment of the state of security as a whole including penetration testing to identify external access vulnerabilities, and a roadmap to move to a more robust security posture.

Criteria: According to NMAC 1.12, provides guidance on an Enterprise Security Policy for the protection of information technology (IT) assets and resources including data and information. The policy establishes that protection must be provided for IT assets, resources, and data/information from unauthorized access, use, disclosure, disruption, modification, or destruction to provide integrity, confidentiality, availability, accountability, and assurance, and establishes that controls must be maintained over information systems, resources, and data/information sufficient to contain risk of loss or misuse of information. In addition, the Committee of Sponsoring Organizations (COSO) COSO Internal Control – Integrated Framework (2013), consists of five critical elements that must be present in carrying out the achievement objectives of an organization. These elements are known as the control environment, risk assessment, control activities, information and communication and monitoring, which includes the implementation of good internal controls over IT general computer controls within the organization.

Effect: These deficiencies resulted in weaknesses in internal controls and led to a cybersecurity incident. A cybersecurity attack was launched on the District and which required the District to hire, as an emergency, an IT firm to assist with getting the District's systems running again. Ultimately, these costs will cost the District hundred of the thousands of dollars in actual costs and lost time.

Cause: The District had not invest in suggested procedures and did not perform sufficient monitoring of its IT General Computer controls which contributed to deficiencies in the information technology environment.

Auditors' Recommendations: The District should perform (by a third-party expert) a complete risk assessment of the IT General Computer Controls and IT environment and develop appropriate and timely responses to reduce and mitigate the risks identified in such risk assessment.

Agency Response: The District concurs with the finding. Since the time of the audit, the District has taken significant steps to strengthen its cybersecurity posture and address the deficiencies noted.

The District has engaged a professional cybersecurity vendor to perform monthly, extensive penetration testing and security audits. These assessments provide continuous monitoring of vulnerabilities and ensure that risks are identified and remediated in a timely manner.

In addition, the District has implemented a substantially more robust security architecture, including:

- Network segmentation to limit exposure and reduce lateral movement in the event of a breach
- Least-access principles to ensure users and systems receive only the minimum permissions required.
- Ransomware protection and endpoint detection and response (EDR) tools on all end user and server devices to provide real-time threat detection and mitigation.
- A new, secure backup infrastructure with improved redundancy and recovery capabilities.

- Secure remote monitoring and management (RMM) and centralized patch management, ensuring that updates and security patches are deployed promptly and consistently across all systems.
- Multi-factor authentication (2FA) implemented for all VPN connections and any external access.

A structured lifecycle process for hardware and software, under which outdated or unsupported systems are replaced once they no longer receive security updates from the vendor.

Furthermore, the District has developed a formal Incident Response Plan (IRP) in collaboration with the New Mexico Office of Broadband Access and Expansion and the New Mexico Office of Cybersecurity. This IRP establishes standardized procedures for identifying, responding to, and recovering from cybersecurity incidents and provides the District with a coordinated, statewide-supported approach to incident management.

The District remains committed to enhancing its information security environment and ensuring alignment with NMAC 1.12, COSO internal control principles, and industry best practices. These improvements, alongside continued partnership with cybersecurity professionals and state cybersecurity agencies, strengthen the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of District data and systems. The District will continue to evaluate and refine its controls to maintain a strong and resilient cybersecurity posture.

Timeframe for corrective action plan: Fiscal Year 2026

2025-002 — Budgetary Over Expenditures and OMBS Report of Actuals (Other Noncompliance)

Condition: The District has over expended its budget in the following fund (functions):

In addition, we noted several funds where the District adjusted its actual expenditures subsequent to submitting its final 4th quarter report of actuals to the NM Public Education Department and inadvertently did not submit an amended report.

Criteria: NMAC 6.20.2.10 states that all District funds, with the exception of student activity funds, are to be budgeted by the local governing body and submitted to the State of New Mexico Public Education Department for approval. Once adopted, any claims or warrants in excess of budget are a violation of New Mexico State Statute 6-6-6, 1978 Compilation.

Effect: The internal controls established by adherence to budgets have been compromised and excess spending could result and has resulted in noncompliance with state requirements. In addition, the District's information reported to NM Public Education Department is inaccurate and does not agree with year end audited trial balance.

Cause: The District did not properly submit a budget adjustment for the function in which actual expenses were greater than final budget at the end of the fiscal year. Also, the district made adjustments without updating the report of actuals and submitting an amended report.

SECTION IV – SECTION 12-6-5 NMSA FINDINGS

Auditor's Recommendations: We recommend that the District monitor its budgets closely and prepare budget adjustments as necessary and that the district submits all budget adjustments timely in the future. Also, any adjustments made to the trial balance should be reflected in the report of actuals to ensure the information uploaded into OBMS agrees to the trial balance.

Agency Response: The District acknowledges the audit recommendation and is implementing procedural enhancements to strengthen ongoing budget monitoring and reporting alignment.

The Business Office will expand periodic budget-to-actual reviews at the function level to identify potential variances earlier in the fiscal year and, when needed, initiate budget adjustments in accordance with applicable requirements.

In addition, the District will formalize a reconciliation step to ensure that updates recorded in the year-end trial balance are reflected in the report of actuals prior to OBMS submission, so that reported information agrees with final audited balances.

Responsible district position: Associate Superintendent of Finance

Timeframe for corrective action plan: Implementation will begin in the current fiscal year and will be maintained on an ongoing basis

2025-003 — Failure to Notify NM State Auditor for 12-6-6 Violation – (Other Noncompliance)

Condition: The District did not notify the New Mexico State Auditor's Office about the cyber incident (criminal violation) that occurred during the year.

Criteria: Per 2.2.2.10(N)(2) NMAC, "an agency, LPB, or IPA shall notify the state auditor immediately upon discovery of any apparent violation of a criminal statute in connection with financial affairs. If an agency or IPA has already made a report to law enforcement that fact shall be included in the notification. If not immediately known, a follow-up notification shall include an estimate of the dollar amount involved, if known or estimable, and a description of the apparent violation, including names of persons involved and any action taken or planned."

Effect: The New Mexico State Auditor's Office was unaware of the situation and could not properly prepare a response, if necessary.

Cause: According to the District, due to legal and strategic temporary restrictions, the District did not timely notify the NM Office of State Auditor regarding the cybersecurity incident and ultimately did not end up providing the notification.

Auditors' Recommendations: We recommend that the District timely notify the New Mexico State Auditor's Office about any matters that may fall within the compliance requirements of 12-6-6 NMSA.

Agency Response: During the cyber incident that occurred during the fiscal year, the District did not notify the New Mexico Office of the State Auditor as required under 2.2.2.10(N)(2) NMAC. At the time of the incident, the District worked with legal counsel, technology personnel, and law enforcement to investigate and respond to the matter. Due to legal and strategic considerations during the response process, notification to the Office of the State Auditor was not completed.

The District recognizes the reporting requirement and agrees with the recommendation. The District will ensure that any future incidents involving a violation of financial affairs are promptly reported to the Office of the State Auditor in accordance with state requirements. The Associate Superintendent of Finance will be responsible for ensuring compliance with this requirement. The District will update internal procedures to ensure the reporting requirements under 2.2.2.10 NMAC are reviewed and addressed as part of incident response and compliance processes. Notification to the Office of the State Auditor will occur within 24 hours of discovery of any such incident.
