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- Unless subject to one of the exceptions listed above, any person who possesses a 97 A. deadly weapon or firearm on the real property of an elementary or secondary 98 school in this district, or administrative office building, or at a school-sponsored 99 activity, whether or not the person is lawfully permitted to carry such deadly 100 101 weapon or firearm, will be reported to the local police authorities once school officials become aware of its possession. 102 103 B. A student who possesses and/or uses any deadly weapon or firearm on school 104 105 property in violation of this policy shall be disciplined in accordance with Board 106 of Education Student Discipline Policy. 107 C.   - Note: Under state law, in order to prohibit all persons from carrying deadly weapons and/or firearms onto school property (including persons who hold a legal permit to carry such weapons elsewhere), a school district must affirmatively pass a policy prohibiting such items. The policy above accomplishes this goal. Districts may legally prohibit other weapons as well, but issues exist regarding 1) a district's practical ability to enforce such prohibitions and 2) the definitions used to describe other types of weapons. If a district chooses to enact a wider prohibition on weapons, it is well advised to consult legal counsel for assistance in drafting a policy containing a wider prohibition.
