Re: GHS New and Modified Courses for 2021-2022

Although much of our recent focus has been on the highly unusual start to the current school year, we have also been working on plans for the 2021-2022 school year. We are recommending three new courses as well as modifications to seven existing courses. Along with these course changes, we are recommending renaming our Physical Education Department to the Wellness Department to better reflect the increasing focus on mental well-being in addition to physical fitness. All of these changes will better enable us to meet the continually evolving needs of our students. The recommendations for 2021-2022 are unlikely to require significant changes in staffing, space, or materials.

To date, these new and modified course proposals have been reviewed by the GHS Department Chairs, Building Leadership Team, Building Administration, Secondary Principals, and the Administrative Cabinet. We await your approval before allowing students to register for these courses.

Just to keep you informed, we are also planning to offer one or two sections of our existing Personal Finance course in a fully-online format during the 2021-22 school year. GHS Personal Finance will now be available to students in a total of four different formats: standard, blended, fully-online, and fully-online summer school.

Please let us know if you have any questions about the proposed changes that appear in this report. We are requesting that this appear on the October 26th Board of Education agenda for an informational presentation, with a subsequent vote for approval at the November 16th Board of Education meeting.

| Special Education | Applied Technology | This semester-long course will serve instructional special education students as they focus on developing technology skills in touch-typing and essential features of the Microsoft Office Suite. Applied Technology will be a taught using a team-teaching approach and will most likely run once every two years. Placement into the course will be through the IEP process, and it will be open to students in grades 9-12. | None | | | |
| Special Education | Applied Videography | This semester-long course will serve instructional special education students as they focus on developing functional skills in the areas of communication and technology. Students will work individually and in groups to produce, film, and edit video projects that will display what they have learned. Whenever possible, GTV will air these projects as part of their regular broadcast. Applied Videography will be taught using a team-teaching approach and will most likely run once every two years. Placement into the course will be through the IEP process, and it will be open to students in grades 9-12. | None | | | |
| Wellness | Social Issues in Sports (dual credit with WCC) | This junior/senior, classroom-based elective course will examine the interaction between sports and culture, the relevance of sport in modern society, and the social processes which influence sport. Topics including the role of youth sports, performance enhancing substances, gender equity, the economics of college athletics, and the interaction between sports and media will be covered. Although this course does not satisfy the PE requirement, it will be classified as a dual credit course with Waubonsee Community College (KPE 201: Current Issues in Sports). | \$4,000 | | | |
