Request for approval by the Fort Smith School Board for allocation of a surplus property school district movable

building for use by Sebastian County and the City of Fort Smith

to establish a Sobering Center

The Sebastian County Quorum Court and the Fort Smith Police Department authorized funding to establish a Sobering Center in 2023. The purpose of the sobering center is to divert nondangerous, nonviolent alcohol intoxicated individuals from arrest and booking into the Sebastian County Jail, to a short-term treatment facility. The sobering center will be contracted for operation by the Western Arkansas Counseling and Guidance Center.

Sebastian County and the State of Arkansas implemented a Crisis Stabilization Unit in 2018, for diversion of mentally ill from booking into the County Jail to short term treatment at a facility operated by contract by the Western Arkansas Counseling and Guidance Center. The Sobering Center will be operated in close proximity to the Crisis Stabilization Unit. This program will help address intoxicated individuals, who may also have other substance abuse issues, to short-term treatment with monitoring by Emergency Medical Staff and support by counselors at the Sobering Center.

This will be the first Sobering Center established in the State of Arkansas as an innovative approach, based upon best practices implemented in other states.

The Sebastian County Jail operates at or above its bed capacity and alternative sentencing and diversion programs are needed to help address jail crowding.

Attached is a memo dated August 30, 2022, to the Quorum Court that provides additional information concerning the sobering center. Included are talking points from Fort Smith Police Chief Danny Baker and the three Fort Smith District Court Judges Grimes, Sharum and Terry. (See enclosure)

Sobering Center

The City of Fort Smith Police Department pledged \$100,000 to help set up the Sobering Center in 2022. Chief Danny Baker provided the attached "talking points" for the Sobering Center and will attend the meeting for comments.

The Fort Smith District Judges will also attend for comments and provided the attached memo dated 9/8/22.

Meetings have been held to review the Sobering Center with the Fort Smith District Judges, Fort Smith Police Chief, Sheriff and Rusti Holwick of the Guidance and Counseling Center. Data concerning Sobering Center arrests was reviewed including bookings for related offenses and a review of the last five years of those individuals involved in the Justice System.

### Reports focusing on 2018

A focus on more accurate numbers for consideration of how many individuals would be engaged that could be referred to a Sobering Center centered on 2018. For 2018:

In 2019 numbers begin to shift due to changes in policy concerning arrests and transfer of incarcerated individuals to the Crawford County jail, with numbers continuing to decrease in 2020 thru 2021 due to the impact of COVID on the Justice System. Numbers in 2022 are not reflecting full scope of these offenders and will continue to change based upon the termination of transport of alcohol related offenders to the Crawford County jail, in August 2022.

Enclosed is a copy of a report reflecting this data with a focus on the "Grand Totals" for 2018 as compared to the other four years as reviewed above.

Since Sobering Centers have not been implemented in the State of Arkansas the Sebastian County approach is an innovative step to address the Justice System and as such, the discussion was to reduce the front-end cost to initiate a sobering center in 2022 by utilizing a trailer to house operations with an operating budget for the program to be funded for one year of 2023.

The proposal is to implement the trailer in close proximity to the Crisis Stabilization Unit as a short-term facility to establish the program in 2022, operating the program for 2023 as a pilot program. The program would then be reviewed in 2023 to consider continued funding for 2024 from other revenue sources.

# SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

#### THE FUNDING OF SOBERING FACILITIES IN SEBASTIAN COUNTY

- 1. Arrest numbers are a good place to start but they do not give the full picture regarding substance abuse issues in Fort Smith and Sebastian County. Numbers should also include drug overdoses, DWI calls AND arrests, Disorderly Conduct, and other crimes that are often the result of intoxicated persons.
- 2. Sobering Facilities are not the "silver bullet" to solving substance abuse/mental health issues. They are, however, a key component of the solution.
- 3. This isn't just about reducing the population of the jail. It's about investing in a long-term solution to reducing alcohol and drug addiction in our community and moving people to recovery outside of the criminal justice system (diversion).
- 4. Substance abuse and mental health issues are not unique to Fort Smith.
- 5. I would argue that the actual per arrest cost (actual and deferred) to the tax payer to incarcerate an intoxicated person is far more than the cost associated with diversion to a sobering facility.
- 6. Diversion from the Criminal Justice System opens the door for assistance by the community that isn't possible through the jail:
  - a. Monetary and In-kind Donations (Facilities, Medical, Legal)
  - b. Volunteerism
  - c. Grants
- 7. The goal of sobering facilities should be to see a reduction in the need for them after a period of time.
- 8. I and the City Administrator are willing to commit funding to sobering facilities. A \$100,000 pledge to assist in the startup of a sobering facility in Fort Smith will be honored.
- 9. Arrest diversion works when it's done properly. The FSPD has accomplished an over 40% reduction in incarceration over the last 4 years with no appreciable overall increase in crime. To be successful, diversion must go beyond just not arresting people. It must include appropriate follow-up, investment of time, and connection to resources. A sobering facility housed at or near the WAGCC is perfectly poised to do that.

Judge:

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Sebastian County Quorum Court in person on 9/13 to addressing the sobering center issue.

Our intent will be to make brief comments about the smart use of tax/recovery act dollars to achieve a maximum amount of public safety. It is our belief that our community is always safer when we confront the reality of the situation with our mental health/substance abuse situation as it relates to our criminal justice system.
