Current Status

Unfortunately, following the 2012 Golf season our Golf programs had their funding eliminated for the 2012-2013 school year due to the high level of reductions that took place with in our district. Currently, it is the only OSAA sponsored program that we do not fund. Also, due to OSAA guidelines and BSD requirements in order for our golf programs to compete at the state level they need to raise approximately \$50,000 per year in order to cover the funding items listed above.

In 2012-2013 the golfing community raised over \$140,000 to support Golf in the Beaverton School District. This amount allowed Golf to have funding through this school year (three years total). The goal of the community was that after three years the district would be able to come back and fund the program. Therefore, after this year, Golf does not have the funds to compete at the state level.

Rationale for the Investment-

As one of the largest school districts in the state we believe it is important for our district to be a leader not only in the academic core areas but also state wide in athletics. Therefore, one of the key pieces to athletic excellence in our community and at the state level is to offer and fund all of the OSAA (Oregon School Activities Association) sponsored athletic activities. Currently, we fund 17 out of 18. A district seen as being the model that others aspire to be like needs to offer the 18th activity... Golf.

The athletic directors have put in place all the essential funding that will ensure golf at all five comprehensive high schools for both boy's and girl's. In addition, the area golf courses and our schools are constantly working together to make access affordable to all of our students. From group instruction to teaching the ethics of the game the end result is a partnership that helps us promote diversity (last year almost 30% of the students participating were of an ethnicity other than white), excellence, and puts some of our students in position for financial assistance to attend college.

Our district goal wants our students prepared to..... THINK - KNOW - ACT - GO The golfing community and the athletic directors strongly believe all of these apply to our student athlete who participates in Golf.

Fourth Level Teams

Investment

We are asking the district to provide \$75,000 per year for 4th level teams. This funding would pay for coach's salary, transportation, meet management and official's fees.

Current Status

As one of the BSD athletic reductions of 2012-13 the responsibility of sustaining 4th level teams has fallen on individual athletic programs and their parent groups.

Anywhere from 120-150 SA have been excluded from the athletic program. Many of the student athletes at this level are from diverse cultural and economic backgrounds.

Rationale

For many student athletes opportunities for excellence begin on fourth level teams. Fourth level teams provide various benefits to all student athletes involved in interscholastic sports. There will be benefits of an adult (the coach) devoted to the development of a young person on the field of play as well as the classroom. The coaches monitoring of attendance, grades and classroom behavior enhances the student-athletes individual growth outside the traditional teacher pupil relationship. The student athlete's social growth is broadened as they interact with socially and culturally diverse teammates whom they may never have met in the regular school day.

Sports have become more specialized over the years. With specialization comes costs and access to athletic programs. Moreover, specialization is increasingly correlated to the amount of time and money a family is willing to contribute to a child's athletic development before coming to high school. Equity is reached by allowing more studentathletes to participate in high school athletics through the funding of fourth level teams. These teams create opportunities for athletes who may not have been able to afford private club dues and individual lessons as youths. All student athletes will benefit from interacting daily with teammates from a broad range of economic and cultural backgrounds. Therefore, fourth level teams meet a vital need in our school district for offering opportunities to students who may not otherwise have accessed them.

Collaboration is the very nature of team. The act of being on a team is a cooperative effort. Each player learns how to place the needs of the team above his or her individual desires and begins to develop collaborative techniques while interacting with fellow players, coaches, and support staff. Furthermore, student athletes work together with their coaches throughout the competitive season and off-season. Student athletes also benefit from the efforts of the school personnel through academic coaching and guidance programs intended to assist athletes with schoolwork and better prepare them to be successful in the classroom. It is a coordinated effort of an entire school for student athletes to play on a team.

Program Funding Increase

Investment

We are asking the district to provide an additional \$100,000 per year for additional funding to support our athletic programs. Coaches are often expected to meet community standards without being fully funded – which can lead to serious inefficiencies, as programs struggle to figure out how to pay for outdated equipment, extra coaches, and other key elements for their program to succeed. With additional funding we can help take some of the financial burden off our athletic programs, so their need to fund raise will be more manageable and reasonable to our community, families, and businesses.

Current Status

As the economy has pushed school districts to try to do more with less, our budgets for basic program needs have not kept up with inflation. Without an increase in the cost of living for 20 years this has put an extra burden on our athletic programs to raise more money. Estimated cost per high school for base funding is \$90,000, we currently work with a \$35,000 budget

Rationale

The current budget does not cover the breakdown of our basic needs of our programs. Cost is up, for which our programs usually have to fundraise extra dollars to afford a complete infrastructure. As the cost of program essentials continues to escalate, it puts an increased burden on programs and community to acquire sufficient funding.

We collaborate on a daily basis as a coaching staff to keep things positive and energetic, but burn out is in our near future. To acquire the excellence the district strives for we need to increase our program funding so our programs can be functional once again.

Professional Educational Development

Investment

We are asking the district to provide \$15,000 per year for professional educational development of our coaching staff's. Each comprehensive high school would have \$2,000 available for clinics and workshops throughout the year. The additional \$5,000 would be used for one or two major clinics offered for district coaches each year. The money would be essential to pay for speakers for the workshop and dealing with the expenses associated with such an event.

Return on Investment (ROI)

- More adults supporting student athletes.

Current Status

In the past, districts we able to pay for coaches to attend clinics and workshops around the country to help develop their coaching skills. With the budget cuts of the past, Beaverton coaches receive no funds from the athletic department to help them attend these clinics.

Rationale

Coaches spend more hours with student athletes than the average teacher will during the school year. We invest a great deal of funding to aid teachers, but offer very little to help coaches improve their skills. Coaches devote at great deal of time in helping transform young people into productive members of society. They are constantly teaching lessons about honesty, diligence and commitment to success. These character lessons leave a lasting imprint on the student athlete as he or she ventures into their post-secondary endeavors. Our changing society dictates that training for bullying, hazing, and harassment issues make it essential that we invest in our coaches' development to meet these societal challenges. By investing in our coaches, we are helping them improve their craft, which in turn will help the student athlete have a more positive experience. When student athletes and their parents look more favorably upon the athletic experience, WE all win.
