- Principal Bogins touched on McIntyre's many Points of Pride.
- He shared a few of the student and parent testimonials.
- McIntyre's Key Area of Focus: engaging instruction, family connections, school climate, social and emotional learning, and rigor and fun.
- MES Proficiency: 13% grow in math between card marking 1 and card marking 3; 14% growth in Reading proficiency between card marking 1 and card marking 3.
- Mrs. Bush utilizes manipulatives while teaching object/number correspondence.
- Mrs. Croitori taps into kinesthetic learning while exploring the Area Formula.
- Ms. Purdy's 4th graders conducted as experiment where they compared 2 different types of "lava", thick and thin. They used this information to figure out why volcanoes have different shapes and how the type of lava explains why some volcanoes explode.

b. Report 63-67 BP #40 Stevenson Elementary Site Renovations – Bond Funds

• This work incorporates site drainage improvements, upgrade of storm water management system, replacing site concrete, and asphalt paving. The total award amount for BP #40 is \$1,082,000.00. The contingency total is \$108,200.00 bringing the construction total to \$1,190,200.00.

submitted in our PQ Application to the State outlined the things that we are committed to do.

c. Report 63-68 Bus Garage Environmental Clean Up – Operations Budget & 90% Musta

- To comply with our latest FAR the district must test groundwater quarterly and submit samples for analysis. Arch Environmental personnel will revise the Final Assessment Report for the site based on these sample findings. The original FAR was withdrawn from review by EGLE in September of 2024. The reason for withdrawal was based on discussions between EAG, SPS, and EGLE. During these discussions EGLE staff stated that new Risk-Bases Corrective Action (RBCA), criteria would become available in the spring or early summer of 2025, EGLE staff stated that new RBCA criteria would be less stringent. Arch will also prepare all the paperwork necessary to receive reimbursement from Musta. \$37,810.00 for quarterly groundwater sampling and \$17,415.00 for revised FAR or \$55,225.00 which up to 90% Musta reimbursable.

d. Report 63-69 Staffing & Payroll Services – ECE SubHub

- Head Start Performance Standard 1302.21 Center-based option. A program must maintain appropriate ratios during all hours of program operation, except:
- (i) For brief absences of a teaching staff member for no more than five minutes; and,

- (ii) During nap time, one teaching staff member may be replaced by one staff member or volunteer who does not meet the teaching qualifications required for the age.
- An Early Head Start or Migrant or Seasonal Head Start class that serves children under 36 months
 old must have two teachers with no more than eight children, or three teachers with no more than
 nine children.
- A class that serves a majority of children who are three years old must have no more than 17 children with a teacher and teaching assistant or two teachers.
