II. Information and Action Items

I	l. I	nformation and Action Items
		Description
	1.	Lac welcomed the Council and thanked everyone for their attendance.
	2.	College Readiness Reading/Writing (T.K. Krpec) (handout attached)
		 The department has been transitioning students through placement levels due to a change in TSIA2 placement scores. The change accounts for a decrease in students enrolled in INRW 0306 (the lowest level of not college ready courses) and an increase of students enrolled in NCBI 0300 (not college-level course). Course offering options are being explored for INRW 0306 to offer a 3 SCH course with a more intensive and direct approach rather than a broad sweeping approach of 6 SCH of combined courses (paired NCBI 0306 and INRW 0306). Students who are not college ready tend to do better taking ENGL 1301 paired with NCBI 0300 but struggle with ENGL 1302 without the additional support. Thus, faculty recommend adding an option to ENGL 1302. Adding ENGL 2311, Technical and Business Writing, to the WCJC core curriculum (component option 010) will be submitted for THECB approval in the spring. If approved, the course will provide students with an option between ENGL 1302 and ENGL 2311. Faculty are looking at ways to better prepare underprepared students for college-level courses (i.e., implementing modules on how to study and use basic, institution-based technologies).
	3.	College Readiness Math (Jennifer Mauch) (handout attached)
		Students with very low TSIA2 placement scores continue to receive instruction to
		improve basic math skills before advancing to a beginning algebra course by taking

23 sections of developmental math courses, paired with a credit-level course, were offered in spring 2024. Student success rates, defined as grade of ABC in pairing both

MATH 0306 (Basic Mathematics for College).

- the credit-level and not college ready (NCR) math course, improved (60%) compared to spring 2023 (46%). A total of 466 students enrolled in development math courses during the spring 2024 term.
- Support options are needed for incoming students who did not pass the TSI; however, they completed the College Bridge Program in high school. Students who pass the College Bridge Program are deemed "college ready" yet routinely struggle in creditlevel math courses. Faculty are considering options.

4. | Continuing Education & Dean of Workforce (Danny Bacot) (handout attached)

- WCJC EMS Program has an agreement with Houston Fire Department (HFD) to train 25-50 paramedic students annually. The first cohort began fall 2024 with 50 students instead of the expected 25. HFD has requested an additional cohort of 25 students to begin in spring 2025. Room TC-101 was re-arranged to accommodate 50 students at the start of fall 2024; however, the room is not conducive to student learning due to an outdated data projector, screen placement, and general classroom configuration. Room T-107 has been identified as a potential location to offer instruction for the new cohort, but there are similar limitations in that space. Also, the current campus IT infrastructure cannot adequately support the WiFi needs of 50-100 new students. There are plans currently in place to upgrade the campus WiFi as part of phase three of the Richmond Infrastructure Upgrade; however, that phase is not planned until FY26. In order to support immediate growth at the Richmond campus, a proposal is on the November agenda for BOT approval of new data projectors, additional projection screens, and to simultaneously move forward with phase three of the IT infrastructure upgrade during the current fiscal year along with phase two. If approved, the funds will be transferred from the MIS Plant fund.
- Currently, there are 1,793 students enrolled in the Vocational Science and Technology & Business programs; 618 and 1175 respectively.
- Organizational changes within the Vocational Science Division:
 - Tim Guin retirement Dec. 24 (current Division Chair and Police Academy Program Director)
 - Gary Bonewald new Division Chair (current EMS Program Director)
 - Karl Johnson new EMS Program Director
 - Grady Smith new Police Academy Program Director
 - Steve Streblow new Process Technology Program Director (replaced Willie Myles), currently in effect
- Curriculum updates for Manufacturing Technology and Process Technology AAS
 degrees are being reviewed for options to add a second Level I Certificate for Process
 Technology.
- Bay City Construction Trades started CE Carpentry classes in April with 6 students enrolled. Discussions are taking place on how to renovate and utilize the additional 7,000 sq. ft. of empty space. The possibility of offering Pipefitting and Plumbing as part of phase two is being reviewed.
- Grant Updates:
 - An application has been submitted for a True Grant for the CE Patient Care Technician (PCT) program; approval is pending.
 - The CNA grant to upskill workers in healthcare has been extended to expend leftover funds.
 - WCJC applied for a TRUE Grant as part of a consortia through the Fort Bend Chamber. If approved, the grant will be used for programs under the IT and Networking department.
 - Funds approved from the JET grant for Automotive will be used to help purchase updated hands on lab equipment.

5. Counseling & Disability Services (Amber Barbee) (handout attached)

Counseling:

- WCJC has 4 counselors who are available to provide individual and group counseling on every campus. The counselors are also providing closed group sessions for PTA students, Sugar Land Nursing students, and students with Autism (Richmond campus) as well as Executive Functioning support groups for 123 neuro-divergent students (Sugar Land campus).
- The 2nd annual S.O.U.L. 5K Walk was held on October 5 with 344 attendees; participation was up from 179 last year. Plans are to schedule this event on the 1st Saturday in October each year.
- The department sponsors Counseling Connection Days to help support and promote Breast Cancer, Mental Health, and Suicide Awareness.
- Art and Soul (Art Therapy) sessions are offered each week for TRiO students. There
 are currently three different groups participating in these sessions.
- The Homestead Pioneer Pantry continues to provide clothing vouchers, food, toiletries, and detergent to about 183 students each month. There has been an increased need for supplies and resources as the program becomes more popular. New services are now available to provide support with medical/psychological assistance for eligible students.
- The department collaborates with Student Life to host student events such as Welcome Week Scavenger Hunt, Pioneer Frontier Resource Fair, Holiday Cheermeister, One Stop Shops, Safe Spring Break, Residence Hall Nights, and more.

Disability Services:

- The DS department is now a 100% paperless department. All requests and supporting documentation are processed and maintained through the Accessible Information Management (AIM) system. Currently, 377 active students are receiving disability services.
- New information cards now include a QR code for students to scan which goes directly to Disability Services information online, including the process to request accommodations.
- Faculty Feedback has been updated to add more specific concern options for faculty when submitting early alerts in Banner. More faculty are utilizing the alert system with 22 faculty and 125 alerts so far this semester up from 19 faculty and 93 alerts in spring 24.
- Disability Services work collaboratively with WCJC Recruitment at transition fairs at several area high schools to help provide support and information for parents and students with special needs.

6. Distance Education (Michele Betancourt) (handout attached)

- In AY 24, DE provided 183 open labs, 77 faculty drop-in visits, 24 face-to-face and Zoom training opportunities, and closed out 270 support requests. DE also continues to update and develop self-paced training and resource courses through Brightspace.
- DE Office hours for student and faculty support per campus:
 - o Richmond; Rm. TC-103 7:00 a.m. 4:00 p.m. (Mon-Fri)
 - \circ Wharton; Rm. PSC-305 8:00 am. 5:00 p.m. (every Mon & Fri and every 2nd & 4th Wed)
 - \circ Sugar Land; Rm SL-201A 8:00 a.m. 3:00 p.m. (every 2nd and 4th Wed)
- DE staff will be available to provide online support throughout the winter-mini session (December 16 January 3).
- Courses in development shells can be fully updated, including dates. Only intelligent
 agents, groups, and textbook/homework links need to be added after content is
 transferred to live shells. Live shells for spring will be available in January, after the
 winter break; however, effective spring 25, faculty must build courses in development
 shells before live shells become available.

- All courses in Brightspace will be taught using the New Lesson View (New Content Experience) beginning spring 25. The current view and the option to "opt-out" from the New Lesson View will no longer be available.
- Brightspace will be updated to allow 5 levels of folders in content modules starting in December. Although best practice is still 3 levels, this will hopefully eliminate errors with content not being visible.

7. Library (Christy Ruby) (handout attached)

Christy was unable to attend the meeting; however, Lindsey reviewed a handout provided by Christy.

- The library has various databases, online offerings, and in-person services for students and faculty.
- Library staff has completed a "weed out" project to remove old, outdated, and duplicate books, videos, and other resources no longer used. More virtual materials are being purchased as opposed to hard copies.
- The library has been reconfigured and organized to help better support students and to be more user friendly.
- A new "Live Chat" feature added to the Library webpage has become very popular with students, especially in the evenings. The chat is open Monday Thursday from 9:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. and from 9:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. on Fridays.

8. Dual Credit & University Transfer (Natalie Stavinoha)

- Bronwynn Cillis has been hired as PT Dual Credit Clerk. She shares an office with Natalie.
- Dual credit enrollment for fall 24 is 918 students, up from 826 in fall 23. The number of home-schooled students enrolling at WCJC is also increasing.
- THECB has removed PSAT and STARR EOC (end-of-course) scores as exemptions for TSIA. ISDs will determine what criteria to use for students who do not have passing TSI scores and will complete an eligibility certification form for those students to take college courses.
- ISD counselors have reported that the early alert notifications sent to inform when student averages fall below 75% are very helpful.
- Wharton and El Campo High Schools currently offer welding classes. El Campo is also offering the intro course for automotive.
- Several ISDs are excited to offer dual credit classes in the future for students to start or complete the following programs:
 - Payroll Specialist Level I Certificate (online)
 - Health Data Analyst Level I Certificate (online)
 - Early Childhood Level I Certificate (online)
 - Industrial Electronics
 - Security Specialist or Network Specialist
- Early College High School (ECHS):
 - o Programs continue with Bay City and Wharton (ROAR)
 - Due to low participation, Wharton PTECH (Pathways and Technology for Early College High Schools) is teaching out the welding classes with only seniors enrolled this year
 - Louise PTECH will begin offering welding classes in spring 25
 - Lamar ISD is interested in starting an ECHS program and is considering a partnership with WCJC
- Articulation agreements:
 - Updated agreements have been signed with Sam Houston State University and Texas Tech University.
 - New agreements have been signed with Texas Women's University for general transfer and blended nursing program which allows a WCJC ADN

- student to take TWU nursing classes and earn a BSN.
- An agreement with University of Houston Victoria is being updated to include an addendum for a blended nursing program.

9. | Senior Citizens (Traci Myers (absent) (handout attached)

Traci was unable to attend the meeting; however, VP Collins reviewed the handout Traci provided.

- The program serves Wharton and Colorado counties (Wharton, El Campo, Eagle Lake, Columbus, and Weimar) with Meals on Wheels, congregate meals, in-person activities, and local transportation. Since October 2024, 2,867 meals have been delivered or served which is up from the same period last year. The increase in meals is due to new members and another increase is expected in November as 10 additional members have been accepted. In AY24 (October 1, 2023 to September 30, 2024), 22,457 meals were delivered or served.
- December 7 is the 5K Stride and Stroll fundraiser at Riverfront Park.
- The program recently held a Halloween party with 25 seniors in attendance. Seniors enjoyed a hot meal and played bingo and dominos. Upcoming events include a Thanksgiving Feast and Christmas Celebration.

10. Vocational Support Services/Perkins (Wendy Tamayo) (handout attached)

- The Carl D. Perkins Grant serves students enrolled in Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses and focuses on improving their success by funding instructional equipment, instructional resources, and student services assistance.
- The grant award for AY25 is \$159,099. Funds will be allocated to purchase a Triton-D10 Scanner for Automotive Technology; professional development opportunities for Early Childhood, Paralegal Studies, and Vocational Support Services; reimbursement for childcare (4 students) and transportation (59 students) expenses; and assistance with testing or PLA (Prior Learning Assessment) fees.
- Focus and Priorities for AY25 include:
 - o Increase enrollment for non-traditional programs;
 - Enhance faculty development and strengthen industry partnerships for recruitment and retention; and
 - Boost awareness and expand financial support for CTE/Special Population students
- Vocational Support Services offer laptop and webcam rental, work closely with Title V
 and academic advisors to support student success, and advise all students interested
 or enrolled in CTE programs.
- Vocational Support Services participate in and/or provide funding support for various events and activities, i.e., One-Stop Registration, Student Resource Fairs, Central Fort Bend Chamber's Manufacturing Day, Women in Industry, and more.

11. Student Success (Lindsey McPherson)

TRiO (handout attached)

- AY 2024-2025 is the final year for the 2020-2025 TRiO SSS Grant cycle. Grant awards for the five-year period total \$1,325,972.00.
- The program exceeded all grant expectations for 2023-2024 and has already met the required cohort number of 144 for 2024-2025.
- The Annual Performance Report (APR) for 2023-2024 is due December 6. The process includes updating over 300 students in our database to maximize Prior Experience (PE) points which will be included in the score of the next grant submission.
- An application for the 2025-2030 grant was submitted on June 24. The application consists of 65 pages along with three distinct Competitive Preference Priorities (CPPs). Points are earned for narrative, CPPs and PE. These points are included in the final score used to determine grant award approval and funding amounts.

• The program proudly covers the cost of caps and gowns for graduating TRiO students. 37 students graduated in May 2024.

Title V & Academic & Career Advising

- This is the final year of the Title V grant. A plan to retain and transition 3 positions to Academic Advising and purchase software for 5 programs is being submitted.
- Chatbot, an AI generated platform on the website to search and answer student questions, has been implemented and is being used a lot by students.
- The advising department had 10,457 academic advising sessions, 6,456 sessions for career advising, and 4,059 sessions for transfer students from Sept 1, 2023-Aug 31, 2024.
- The advising department hosts a variety of events including college tour trips, transfer and career fairs on the Wharton and Richmond campuses, and Summer Bridge Program.

Campus Life (handout attached)

- Student Life collaborates with other Student Success areas to host numerous events on all four campuses, such as Welcome Stations and Welcome Back Bags/Lunches, Pioneer Planner Party, Pioneer Snack Wagon, Halloween Treats/Spooktacular Day Bash/Pioneer Spirit Hunt, Pioneer Give Thanks Lunch, Holiday Cheermiester, and more.
- Student clubs are rebounding. There are 15 active clubs and organizations in addition
 to Phi Theta Kappa. Creating a category for "interest groups" is being considered. The
 club handbook and club processes have been revised to be more "user friendly" for
 students and advisors to start clubs.
- 117 residents currently live in the residence halls including four Resident Assistants (RAs), two in each hall. RAs help assist with various events such as birthday parties, cookie baking contests, cookouts, and game nights.
- The Learning Centers are available on three campuses and services include tutoring, computer labs, study groups, academic recovery assistance, and access to student resources. To date, 2,300 students have checked in at one of the centers since the start of the fall semester. The centers also offer workshops on Brainfuse (online tutoring), time management, study skills, etc. In addition to paid part-time professional tutors, a peer tutoring program has been implemented. The program has been a huge success.
- New laws and rules for Title IX became effective Sept. 1. Some states, including Texas, are appealing the new laws at the Federal level. The position for the Title IX Coordinator has been reposted.

Vocational Support Services -

The Carl D. Perkins grant is focused on improving the academic and technical achievement of Career and Technical Education (CTE) students. Funds are allocated to Wharton County Junior College for instructional equipment, instructional resources, and student services assistance.

Students majoring in an Associate of Applied Science Degree or certificate as listed in the WCJC catalog may be eligible for support. Funds are used to support or reduce out of pocket expenses for CTE students who have monetary challenges. Students must identify with one of the Perkins Special Populations categories to qualify.

TRiO SSS Fall 24 Update

23-24 GAN & TRiO SSS Cohort Numbers



On July 15, 2024, the Department of Education issued our final Grant Award Notification (GAN) for the 2020-2025 TRiO SSS Grant Cycle. The authorized funding for the 2023-2024 budget period amounts to \$271,459.00, bringing the five-year total to \$1,325,972.00. We successfully reached our target cohort of 144 students for the 2023-2024 year and have already fulfilled the required cohort number for 2024-2025.

Prior Experience (PE) Points



In years 2-4 of Annual Performance Reports, if the cohort numbers and objectives are achieved, grants can earn up to 15 PE points. These points are then added to the final score of new grant submissions for the upcoming grant cycle. In the past, grants could accumulate a total of 45 PE points, but since cohort numbers and objectives have not been consistently met by other TRiO grants, an average from the three years will now be applied, limiting it to a maximum of 15 points. WCJC has consistently received all 15 points per APR year.

2023-2024 Annual Performance Report (APR)



On November 4, 2024, the Department of Education published the 23-24 Annual Performance Report (APR) for the 2020-2025 grant cycle, which is due by December 6th. This process necessitates updating over 300 students in our database to maximize our chances of receiving all Prior Experience (PE) points for the 2023-2024 period, which will be averaged and included in the score of our recent grant submission.

2025-2030 Grant Submission



The Notice Inviting Applicants (NIA) was released on May 1, 2024 with a deadline set for July 30, 2024. In May and June, we participated in grant writing workshops and collaborated with Study Smart Tutors to ensure our proposal met reader expectations. We submitted a total of 65 pages along with three distinct Competitive Preference Priorities (CPPs) on June 24th. Submissions can score up to 100 points on the narrative, up to 10 points on the CPP's, and up to 15 PE points.
