Close Up Foundation Guiding Principles

Curriculum: Their instructors turn DC into a living classroom where the sites are used as a platform to understand the democratic process. The program is designed to align with each state Social Studies, history, & civics standards

Diversity: They are <u>committed to serving all</u> students regardless of academic performance, geography, ethnicity, and financial need.

Nonpartisan: A major <u>goal</u> of the program is not to tell students what to think, rather <u>give</u> them the <u>skills needed to analyze policy issues for themselves</u>.

Ongoing learning: They also provide ideas on activities that students can do for <u>pre-program preparation</u> and <u>post-program reflection</u>.





What will our students learn?



- <u>Communication</u>, <u>collaboration</u> and <u>leadership</u> <u>skills</u>.
- The <u>ability to explain diverse viewpoints</u> concerning current domestic and international policy questions facing Congress, the executive branch, and/or the courts.
- A greater <u>understanding of the rights and</u> <u>responsibilities of citizens</u> in a participatory democracy and the <u>skills necessary to take on</u> <u>those responsibilities</u>.
- The <u>importance of the founding documents</u> of the American government, including the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and The Bill of Rights and <u>how these</u> <u>documents affect life in the United States</u> <u>today</u>.
- How the three branches of government function, how a bill becomes a law and how a president is elected.
- Immigration and other <u>current issues</u> facing the country and their community.





How will our students learn?

Our students will benefit from Close Up curriculum and methodology which includes:

An intense program – students will experience jam-packed days that will provide them with bountiful learning opportunities.

Diversity of participants – students will benefit greatly from meeting and learning from students from around the country and the world.



Active learning – students will be challenged to participate and engage in the learning process at all times.

Onsite study and primary sources – by visiting the sites up close and seeing government in action, your students will come away with a deeper understanding of government and how they can be involved.

Close Up Program

Group Structure and Logistics:

- School groups are divided into smaller groups of 4 and assigned to a workshop group of about 18-20 students
- Workshop groups stay together all week
- Students room 4 to a room
- Average of about 100-150 students on program weekly
- Each group has their own instructor (same all week)
- Students may still meet up with their school group during "down time" and at meals
- Students are coming from all over the United States, and they bring a variety of opinions and lifestyles; this too is a fantastic learning experience!
