We also have begun holding our FFA plant sale staring May 6th. This is one of the biggest FFA fundraisers of the year. Mr. Greer and our students do a fantastic job putting together baskets and arrangements and they are widely sought after in the community.

To recap our student college visit funded by Gear Up. We had 18 students travel to Linn-Benton Community College where they received a guided tour from the admissions office as well as information on applying and program offerings (including dual enrollment with Oregon State University). After that, we continued on to Oregon State University. There some of our students met with the CAMP program which is a program designed to support migrant students at Oregon State. There, the students met with former Irrigon/Boardman/Hermiston students to discuss going to school at OSU.
