## **Changes Barber Shop Cuts Women's Hair Too**

Our adventure began with a client consultation with **TeacherZ** on day 1, which was January 24th. Barbering InstructorG had us begin by asking her several questions to simulate being in the workforce out in the community. She told us about her hair and it's challenges (cowlicks, waves, coloring and styling damage, very fine, etc.). On day 2, we washed, cut, dried, and styled her hair. On day 3, we completed our first woman's haircut experience with a follow up visit. Since she has a challenging natural wave pattern, we re-trimmed her bangs while they were dry. We discussed how it looked after she styled it. The process of washing, cutting, drying and thermal styling her hair was a great learning experience and we look forward to more opportunities to cut women's hair in the future. We thank you TeacherZ for your willingness to help us learn.

I shampooed her hair before her hair-cut and blew it dry afterwards. It's best to cut hair when it is wet. The person-toperson hands on experience was awe-some because it's different than working on a manikin.



Cutting TeacherZ's hair was very intimidating. I started by separating her hair into five sections to establish a guideline to blunt cut the crown (top of her head). After that I used the original guide and cut a 2" x 2" parting down the center back of her hair holding it at a 45° angle. I went from the crown to the hairline, then worked both sides until I reached the front. It seemed like a quick and efficient way to do a woman's haircut but it took me 1 and 1/2 hours.



I completed her look with a thermal styling process that looked amazing. When she first walked in I couldn't help but think, "wow, what a task!" Once I got further into the thermal style, it became more comfortable. I was pretty confident about the style but on the edge about burning her. The curling irons get hot! I gave her big long curls which brought out the highlights in her hair.

# Detecting Skin Cancer

The rules for detecting skin cancer are below. If you notice any of these on your skin, please see your doctor to have it checked and evaluated.

A is for Asymmetry - One half of the spot does not match the other half. If you were to draw a line through a spot, it would not look the same on both sides. Normal moles and freckles are the same on both sides.

B is for Border Irregularity - The edges are ragged, notched or blurred.

C is for Color - The color is not uniform and there are shades of brown, black, tan, red, blue, or white.

D is for Diameter - The spot is larger than a pencil eraser or is growing.

E is for Elevation and Evolving - The spot rises above the normal skin surface and has an uneven feel or it changes shape, size, shade or bleeds.

	"A" IS FOR ASYMMETRY  • If you draw a line through the middle of the mole, the halves of a melanoma won't match in size.	
	"B" IS FOR BORDER  The edges of an early melanoma tend to be uneven, crusty or notched.

- 2010 Kathryn Bigelow became the first woman to win an Oscar for Best Director.


# 21st Century Technology Skills

# Eye Protection is a Must for Many Sports:

- The most protective eye gear is made from a plastic called polycarbonate and has been tested especially for sports use.
- Facemasks or polycarbonate guards or shields that attach to a helmet are worn in sports such as football, ice hockey, and softball and baseball when batting.
- Goggles are often worn for soccer, basketball, racquet sports, snowboarding, street hockey, and baseball and softball when fielding.
- If you wear glasses, you'll probably need prescription polycarbonate goggles - don't just wear your regular glasses when you're on the court or field.
- All eye protection should fit securely and have cushions above your eyebrows and over your nose.

# Mouthguards Protect your Mouth, Teeth, and Tongue:

- You should wear a mouthguard if you play a contact sport or other sport where head injury is a risk, such as football, basketball, hockey, volleyball, martial arts, boxing, or wrestling.
- Mouthguards can be fitted for your mouth by a dentist or purchased at sports stores.
- If you wear a retainer, always take it out before you start to exercise, practice, or play.

# Seek Medical Treatment Whenever You Experience:

- Moderate to severe pain
- Pain that interferes with daily activity or sleep
- Swelling of the injured area
- An inability to perform normal activities

Proper techniques also promote safety. This goes for any sport, from motor racing to baseball. Baseball players know not to spike the opposing player who's covering the bag, even when sliding hard into second base. And when two tennis players rush the net, an expertly angled volley is the correct shot - not a hard smash socked directly at an opponent's face! So whether you're following rules, regulations, or proper techniques, remember that they aren't there to restrict you - they're there to keep you safe and injury free.

Add barbeque sauce, steak sauce and simmer stirring often for 15 to 25 minutes until thickened. Add salt and pepper to taste. Add water to thin (if too thick). To serve, top the toasted buns with a large scoop of the hot sloppy joe mixture and a single slice of cheese.
