**G.) Non-Curricular Fees Proposal**

Recent amendments to Indiana statute permit school corporations to assess reasonable fees for non-curricular supplemental items. Under Indiana Code, curricular materials are defined as textbooks, workbooks, instructional technology hardware, and software. Items that fall outside this statutory definition may be assessed to families, provided the fees are supported by appropriate justification.

This statutory change allows the district to recover costs associated with certain instructional and operational expenditures that are not covered by the State’s current allocation of \$158 per student for curricular materials, which is distributed through monthly tuition support payments. To ensure affordability and equity, the district has elected to cap any course-related fee at a maximum of \$10 per student per course.

Attached was a list of proposed course fees for Lafayette Jefferson High School, Tecumseh Junior High School, and Greater Lafayette Career Academy (GLCA). The GLCA fees have been approved by the GLCA Governing Board and require approval by each participating school district.

It was the administration’s recommendation that the Board of School Trustees approve the proposed course fees for implementation during the 2026-2027 school year.

**H.) 2026-2027 Latchkey Recommendation**

Interested providers, YMCA of Greater Lafayette and Champions, responded to a request for proposals in a timely manner. All documents, criteria, and requirements have been submitted and have been available for review and approval.

**YMCA:** Amelia Earhart, Edgelea, Glen Acres, Miami, Miller, Oakland, Vinton, Sunnyside Intermediate and other interested LSC schools

**Champions:** All K-12 schools and Little Bronchos Pre-School

It was recommended to continue Latchkey services with the Lafayette Family YMCA. The curriculum provided by the organizations are comparable; however, the YMCA adds services to the swimming pool at the YMCA site on Creasy Lane, before-school care at Sunnyside Intermediate for the LIT program, and all-day care at Vinton Elementary on Fridays. This will also provide a continuity of services for our elementary schools. Please note the scholarship programming and CCDF funding for families as needed. If LSC is not in session due to bad weather, the participating students will still be provided services offsite at the YMCA facility.

*Financial Assistance: The YMCA assures every child has an opportunity to have a safe place to be during the hours their parents are working no matter what their ability to pay through their "Open Door" scholarship program. The YMCA provided \$330,904 in assistance and served 1,894 individuals in 2024 so they could participate in YMCA programs. YMCA currently is a CCDF provider.*

IC 20-26-5-2 requires that each school corporation in Indiana to offer "Latch-Key" or a school-age child care program. This program must be made available to all students, grades K-6, and must operate, at a minimum, after the school day. A school corporation may contract with a non-for-profit or for-profit organization to conduct its programs; however, the legislation requires that such programs utilize school facilities.

School corporations that have "Latch-Key" programs operated by not-for-profit or for-profit organizations, IC-20-26-5-3, as added by PL 1-2005, Sec 10, requires that the awarding of such contracts be subject to the competitive bidding process under IC 5-22-9.

**I.) Miami Elementary and Tecumseh Junior High School Cafeteria Projects**

The Corporation issued a request for proposals for the modification of the serving line at Miami Elementary School cafeteria and for the purchase of new cafeteria tables for Tecumseh Junior High School. The solicitation resulted in one proposal, submitted by C & T Design and Equipment Company, in the amount of \$413,600.

The Lafayette School Corporation has an established working relationship with C & T Design and Equipment and has received consistently high-quality service from the firm in prior projects. The proposal submitted is both low and reasonable and falls below the projected budget for the project, which was \$473,278.

Therefore, it was the recommendation of the administration that the Board of School Trustees accept the proposal from C & T Design and Equipment Company and approve the Miami Elementary School and Tecumseh Junior High School cafeteria projects for completion. As a reminder, the cost of this project will be funded through food service funds.

#### **J.) Requested Letter of Support**

The Tippecanoe County Health Department, formally requested written approval to continue operating Gateway to Hope syringe service program (SSP) at 2300 Ferry Street Lafayette, IN 47904. The program has been in continuous operation in Tippecanoe County since 2017 and has operated out of the Ferry Street address since 2023.

Recently there have been changes to syringe service programs including location requirements in Indiana. Indiana Senate Bill 91 SB91.pdf (IC 16-41-7.5-5.5) requires that a syringe service program may not operate within 1,000 feet of a school, childcare center, or place of worship unless written approval is obtained from the operator of the facility.

Tippecanoe Counties program is a public health initiative focused on reducing the transmission of infectious diseases such as HIV and hepatitis C, improving community safety, and connecting by way of referring individuals to treatment and recovery health services. Services include:

- Safe disposal of used syringes
- Distribution of sterile syringes abiding by the outlined 1 for 1 exchange
- Education on disease prevention
- Referrals to substance use treatment, medical care, and social services
- Minimum weekly community cleanup in and around the area

We are committed to operating this program in a manner that is respectful of the surrounding community and minimizes any potential impact.

They respectfully requested the Lafayette School Corporation's written approval to allow the operation of Gateway to Hope out of 2300 Ferry Street.
