Suicide Prevention Training

A team from Mat-Su Central School provided inservice training to SISD staff on Friday, September 13th. The team included Counselor Tara Moore, Assistant Principal Stacey McIntosh, and two student leaders; Rylee McIntosh and Sage Tedds. They shared the “Navigating Transitions” curriculum available through the DEED eLearning Classroom. This curriculum provides interactive resources for teacher-led as well as student-led lessons for grades 5-12. The student leaders were able to model for teachers how the student-led piece is implemented. Teachers will use these skills and this curriculum to give students skills to adapt to an ever-changing world; whether those changes occur while on the island or beyond it, in the near or distant future. This training was made possible by a grant from Prince of Wales Health Network.

Alaska Safety and Well-Being Summit

The Alaska Safety and Well-Being Summit was held in Anchorage on September 18-20. I attended sessions on The Neuroscience of Traumatic Stress, Comprehensive Approaches to School Safety and Supportive Learning Environments, Violent Threat Assessment, and Preparation and Response to Active Shooters. These sessions have helped me to provide effective staff support, and improve communication district and community wide. This training was made possible through funding provided by the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development.

Howard Valentine ASC

I traveled to attend the ASC meeting at Howard Valentine School in Coffman Cove. It is great to see a number of community members willing to participate in and support the guidance of the school. The ASC voted to use some of its funds to help students attend the carnival in Naukati. This is a plus for both communities. A concern was also brought by a student that she had not received reimbursement for stacking wood over the summer. The ASC agreed to help her remedy this and I am working with District Office staff to track down the funds. This was a positive example of several people working together to improve communication district wide.

Naukati School Climate Meeting

Naukati hosted a meeting on Wednesday, October 16th to address parental concerns about the overall school climate. It was highly productive and highlighted the aspects of school, both academic and extra-curricular, that the school is doing right. Parents also used the platform to provide positive solutions to obstacles in school-community relations. SISD Counselor Amy McDonald served as the moderator and did an excellent job of drawing out a balanced representation of points of view, as well as assuring that all voices were given a chance to be heard. This meeting was an action step toward improving communication district and community wide.

Hyder

Hyder students have had an eventful first quarter. The silver salmon arrived and all students were able to catch fish. After studying fish science and fishing techniques in the classroom, curing their own eggs for bait, their hard work paid off. Students also learned how to clean their catch, fillet the fish and brine/cure their salmon for smoking. We smoked a large batch of fish and everyone took fish home to share with their family. A few other all-school activities have included hiking the local trails, gathering rose hips for tea, picking high bush cranberries and mint for water infusions, attending a professional theater performance in Stewart, BC and participating in a public health disaster drill. While studying meter reading in the high school consumer math class, a representative from BC Hydro stopped in and shared with the kids how to read meters, relating that to electrical and hydro power use.

Elementary students have completed over 30 STEM challenges using 30 different building materials. The upper elementary students are taking a coding class at the local public library and many of our students will be starting after-school figure skating and hockey this month.

We have a Halloween Potluck scheduled for October 30th and our students will be sharing their theater reviews, bat poetry, haunted house listings and their latest student written (k-6) classroom book, Scaredy Bear, with the community.
