Denton ISD Budget Development Approach

To plan on reduction in funding of approximately 8% or \$15.2 million

To save as many personnel positions as possible

To utilize a "hiring chill" to the extent possible

To review and use comparative data when making decisions

Denton ISD Budget Development Approach

To focus on reserves that might be available for use

To focus on non-personnel reductions first

To focus on district-based personnel reductions second

To focus on campus-based reductions last

- 5% central level budget reductions
- Elimination of certain software titles
- Reduction in field trips
- School Board training reduction

- Discontinued travel and cell stipends
- Reduction in district level personnel in all areas: curriculum, technology, athletics
- Custodial supplies
- General supplies reduction

- District Wide
 - Postponement of major maintenance projects such as chillers, flooring replacement, etc.
 - Change in source of custodial service
 - All divisions have reduced personnel
 - Technology
 - Operations
 - Curriculum and Instruction
 - Administrative Services
 - Academic Programs

- Elementary Staffing
 - Increased class size K-5
 - Funding cuts have resulted in 21 fewer K-4 teachers.
 - 32 K-4 classes exceed 22:1
 - Funding cuts have resulted in 9 fewer 5th grade teachers
 - 25 5th grade classes exceed 26:1

- Middle School Staffing
 - Increased class sizes
 - Funding Cuts have resulted in approximately 22 fewer 6th grade to 8th grade teachers
 - Class sizes often exceed 28:1
- Specialized learning centers have been discontinued or curtailed
- Office paraprofessional personnel has been reduced 20%
- Special programs teachers such as GT and ESL have taken on increased numbers of students

- High School Staffing
 - Increased class sizes
 - Funding cuts have resulted in approximately 28 fewer high school teachers class sizes often exceed 28:1
- More students for each teacher means more grading time and less planning time
- Reduction in office personnel
- Reduced enrichment activities such as field trips.
