The multidistrict collaboration council met November 10th and December 2nd to discuss cross-district initiatives and suggested adjustments to ensure inter-district connections continue for students in all districts. All districts felt that engaging STEM activities are a positive way to help connect kids across communities and backgrounds and help us meet our goals of exposing students to career pathways while building their confidence in developing friendships with peers from diverse backgrounds. Austin will continue E3 and Albert Lea will continue to offer the Discover Drone program provided staffing can be secured. The multidistrict collaboration council discussed that it has been challenging to build connections between districts to support Robotics initiatives, and staffing changes have made it difficult for some districts to offer the program. For the 2027-2029 plan cycle, Southland will offer a summer robotics camp that will be open to students from across the collaborative. This will help enable students from all districts to access robotics programming even if they're not able to recruit local robotics coaches.

*Albert Lea High School will implement the Minnesota Bilingual Seals Program as an intentional academic equity strategy to reduce racial and economic disparities in advanced credential attainment. Staff will actively promote, advertise, and encourage multilingual students—particularly students of color and students from low-income backgrounds—to participate in the program. Outreach will include targeted communication with students and families to ensure they understand both the recognition and postsecondary benefits associated with earning a Seal.*

*To remove barriers to access and expand participation, the District Assessment Coordinator, ALHS language teachers, and Success Coaches will collaborate to provide advising, assessment registration support, and preparation resources. These staff members will work directly with students to explain qualification criteria, outline preparation pathways, and connect participation in the Seals program to broader academic and postsecondary planning. Seal preparation will be embedded within existing language coursework where possible, and students will receive targeted academic language support to strengthen both English literacy and partner-language proficiency.*

*Through this program, students demonstrate proficiency using qualified assessments such as AAPPL and Extempore. Based on predetermined qualification levels, students may earn a World Language Proficiency Certificate, a Bilingual Gold Seal, or a Bilingual Platinum Seal. In addition to recognition noted on the student's transcript, students may also be eligible to earn college credits depending on the college or university. By expanding equitable access to advanced credentialing opportunities and increasing Seal attainment among historically underserved student groups, Albert Lea High School will leverage the Bilingual Seals Program as a measurable strategy for reducing disparities in academic achievement.*

*Albert Lea Area Schools will implement a comprehensive, equity-focused system of instructional improvement to ensure effective teaching, rigorous curriculum, and equitable access to high-quality learning for all students. The district will continue implementation of High Reliability Schools (HRS) Level 1: Safe, Supportive, and Collaborative Culture; Level 2: Effective Teaching in Every Classroom; and Level 3: Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum to establish consistent instructional expectations and aligned curriculum across all schools.*

*Teachers will receive ongoing evaluations based on multiple measures, including student achievement data, to support continuous improvement. Job-embedded professional development will occur through collaborative teams, coaching cycles, peer observations, and Instructional Rounds aligned to the Marzano Instructional Model. Ongoing data review cycles within the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) framework will guide instructional adjustments and targeted interventions to meet student needs.*

*Culturally responsive methodologies will be embedded into daily instruction, supported by professional development and application-based coaching. EL teachers will continue co-teaching in core academic classes to support multilingual learners, and access to co-taught Level 3 coursework will be expanded to increase participation in rigorous instruction. These structures ensure students receive both grade-level content and language development support in inclusive settings.*

*Family engagement will be strengthened through meaningful family nights focused on academic expectations and strategies to support learning at home. District Success Coaches will continue to support students and families, build cultural understanding among staff, and strengthen home-school partnerships. The REACH program for grades 9–11 and Homework/Study Clubs will provide additional academic engagement and support opportunities.*

- *Education - Academic support with the goal of graduation.*
- *Accountability - A support network committed to helping students succeed.*

*Project E3: Environmental Science and Engineering for Everyone is an inter-district summer program focused on math and science enrichment. The cohort-based model will allow up to 100 students in grades 4-5 to spend four weeks (12 days) during the summer exploring science and math through interactive, engaging, high-level, hands-on environmental engineering units. Member districts will send student participants and contribute through incentive revenue. Because Austin works purposefully to ensure that the demographics of their participants in Project E3 mirror their demographics (61% students of color), Project E3 offers an opportunity to students in neighboring districts whose enrollment includes less than 10% students of color to have access to programming that reduces cross-district enrollment disparities.*
