



Site Based Health Center Update-Beaverton High School & Merlo Station**Policy Issue/Situation**

The Beaverton School Board is interested in hearing an update on the services and progress of the two School Based Health Centers in the Beaverton School District.

The Beaverton School District has two School Based Health Centers, one located at Merlo Station High School and the other on the Beaverton High School Campus. The Merlo Station High School Health Center, operated in partnership with Oregon Health & Science University, has provided services for over 16 years. The Beaverton School Based Health Center, in partnership with the Virginia Garcia Health System, opened in December 2014 on the Beaverton High School Campus.

Representatives from both Health Centers are here tonight to present information and answer questions.

Background

School-Based health Centers (SBHCs) are medical clinics that offer primary care services either within or on the grounds of a school. With easy access to health care in a school setting, SBHCs reduce barriers such as cost, transportation, and concerns surrounding confidentiality that often keep children and youth from seeking the health services they need. SBHCs provide a full range of physical, mental and preventive health services to all students, regardless of their ability to pay.

Each SBHC is staffed by a primary care provider (i.e., doctor, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant), other medical, mental, or dental health professionals and support staff such as a receptionist.


SBHCs have existed in Oregon since 1986 and succeed through unique public-private partnerships between the Oregon Public Health Division, school districts, county public health departments, public and private practitioners, parents, students, and community members.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the School Board review the information and discuss as necessary.





What is SHAC?

SHAC promotes awareness of health issues and behaviors through school events, campaigns, dialogues, and other student to student activities

Start of Year

Students were recruited to SHAC through:

- Club Rush at each school
- Freshman Orientation walkthrough of the SBHC
- SHAC presentations to Leadership, Health, and health careers classes
- One-on-one interviews with potential members
- One-on-one meetings with teachers and staff about potential members
- Follow-up meetings for interested students and application process
- Meeting day and time established



SHAC Relationships

Foundations in the schools were built through:

- Developing a liaison relationship with individuals in the school administration
- Coordinator being present at school events and assemblies
- Consistent interaction with liaisons and main contacts in the schools and SBHC

Outreach:

- Made multiple appearances in front classes, staff activities, and student activities
- Initial number of students who signed up during recruitment activities: 35-40





Awareness Day Campaign

Awareness Day is put on by the Oregon School Based Health Alliance, in coordination with Oregon Health Authority and facilitated by the Oregon State Youth Advisory Council.

It is a day where all the student groups from across the state head to the Capitol Building and help to build awareness regarding the importance of School Based Health Centers.



YPAR Project




Youth Participatory Action Research

YPAR is a grant-required curriculum that trains young people (i.e., students) in the research process: (1) problem identification, (2) data collection, (3) data analysis, and (4) action.

Goals for 2016-17 school year

- Retain current members, as well as recruit more during Club Rush and student orientations
- Further develop relationships with liaisons and contacts within the school
- Continue YPAR campaigns, as well as begin new ones
- Empower students to become champions of their own health
- Continue to develop the bonds between schools and SBHCs
- Use new and updated SBHC marketing materials to further develop a more consistent message about the work we do at SBHCs
- Increase knowledge amongst students, teachers, and staff regarding the services offered at the SBHCs

Dental Stats

- April 4th was first day of full service with New DCI Dental Chair
- Appointments available every Monday to school age children
- Patients who are insured or uninsured can be seen
- Reduced sliding scale cost for those without insurance

Growing Appointment Density

What we know:

- Approximately 40% of current SBHC medical patients are eligible for our dental care under OHP, but are never seen by our dental team
- Dental providers can take on more patients
- Patients are in need of care from our dental providers
- Many patients are unaware that dental services are available, and that they are covered under OHP

What we will do:

- OHAs will check dental insurance eligibility and offer appointments to all patients upon check-out
- OHAs will call the list of patients assigned to Virginia Garcia by the DCO's that are not currently being seen
- Hygienists will call eligible patients to fill their schedule when there is down time



New In-School Sealant Program

What we know:

- Over 95% of children have insurance in Oregon, but many still are not able to get proper medical, dental, and mental health services
- Virginia Garcia has built a strong relationship with our schools through our SBHC program

What we will do:

- Using a billable model that creates a self sufficient program, we will provide dental service to 21 high-needs schools in Washington and Yamhill counties
- Our dental team will provide approximately 1500 dental screenings for at-risk children and 1000 dental sealants, which reduce cavities by up to 90%

Adolescents are reported to have the lowest access to health care of any age group and they are the least likely to seek care through a traditional doctor's office. The goal of the School-Based Health Center (SBHC) is to serve student health needs by providing a quality comprehensive health care facility located conveniently at Beaverton High School that is open to all students and employees of the Beaverton School District!

Questions & Answers

Are there licensed medical providers on staff?

Absolutely, the SBHC has a licensed Nurse Practitioner or Physician Assistant and a Mental Health Therapist on staff, plus a Dental Hygienist.

What about insurance?

The SBHC can bill most private health insurance plans and may collect a co-pay at the time of your visit. Oregon Health Plan (OHP) is also accepted, which does not require a co-pay. Contact your SBHC to see if they can take your insurance. No insurance? No problem. The SBHC will assess if you are eligible for a discounted fee, based on income. Families that earn less will pay less.

Do I need an appointment?

Appointments are preferred, but if you have an urgent need, you can walk in. To make an appointment simply call the SBHC to schedule, or walk in and request a visit.

Is my appointment confidential?

Your privacy and safety are a priority at the SBHC. In general, adolescents have a right to privacy regarding some health information. If there is a safety concern, we are required to report by law. SBHC staff work with youth of all ages to involve parents/guardians in their care. If you have any questions about the confidentiality of your care, please ask our knowledgeable staff.

Who operates the Beaverton School-Based Health Center (SBHC)?

Virginia Garcia Memorial Health Center operates an SBHC in the Beaverton, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Willamina School Districts, and two in the Tigard-Tualatin SD in partnership with Washington County and LifeWorks NW.

Who can utilize the Beaverton SBHC?

Any student or employee within the Beaverton School District can receive care at the Beaverton SBHC.

Are there licensed medical providers on staff?

Absolutely, each SBHC has a licensed Nurse Practitioner or Physician Assistant and a Mental Health Therapist on staff, plus a Dental Hygienist. The Physician Assistant can conduct routine exams, diagnose and treat acute and chronic illnesses, as well as prescribe any needed medication and perform immunizations. The Mental Health Therapist can perform therapy, substance abuse screenings and referrals, mental health assessments, IEP support, as well as provide a LGBTQ+ safe zone.

Is the SBHC open in the summer?

Yes! The SBHC is open during the summer months, with modified hours.

Can I use my health insurance?

The SBHC can bill most private health insurance plans and may collect a co-pay at the time of your visit. Oregon Health Plan (OHP) is also accepted, which does not require a co-pay. Contact your SBHC to see if they can take your insurance.

What if I don't have health insurance?

No problem, the SBHC will assess if you are eligible for a discounted fee, based on income. Families that earn less will pay less.

How do I make an appointment?

It's easy, simply call your SBHC to schedule or walk in and request a visit.

What if I get sick suddenly? Can I come in without an appointment?

Of course, during business hours the SBHC can get you in to see a health care provider to address your urgent care need.

What information do I need to bring?

At the time of your first appointment you will need photo identification, insurance and income information, and possibly a signed consent form.

What services are provided?

Think of the SBHC the same as any other medical clinic.

If you're curious about a service or not sure if the SBHC can help you, just call or drop-in and the friendly staff will answer all your questions!

When do I need a signed consent form?

- Any individual 14 years or younger needs a consent form signed by a parent or legal guardian to receive **physical health services**.
- Any individual 13 years and younger needs a consent form signed by a parent or legal guardian to receive **mental health services**.
- Reproductive and sexual health information can be received at any age without consent of a parent or guardian.

Is my appointment confidential?

Your privacy and safety are a priority at the SBHC. In general, adolescents have a right to privacy regarding some health information. If there is a safety concern, we are required to report by law. SBHC staff work with youth of all ages to involve parents/guardians in their care. If you have any questions about the confidentiality of your care, please ask our knowledgeable staff.

Can the SBHC work with my doctor?

Absolutely, SBHC staff can coordinate with your Primary Care Physician regarding chronic illness care or treatment and other medical concerns. Licensed staff can also refer you to a specialist when needed.

Can I get my teeth cleaned at the SBHC?

Yes, you can make an appointment with our licensed Dental Hygienist to have a dental screening, cleaning, and dental sealants.

Annual Report: Academic year 2015-2016 Merlo Station High School,
School-based Health Center

To: Beaverton District Board of Directors

The 2015-2016 academic year at Merlo Station High School School Based Health Center (SBHC) has seen a continuation of previous services and also a number of transitions. The academic year started with a nurse practitioner, medical assistant, and social worker available to students five days per week during times the school was open to students. Providers demonstrate collaborative teamwork in order to provide high quality services to a diverse community of adolescents, children, and infants within this unique high school setting. Medical services are provided by OHSU School of Nursing (SON) nurse practitioners (PNP & FNP) and medical assistants (MA). Mental health services are provided by a licensed clinical social worker (LCSW) employed by LifeWorks. Having the mental health provider co-located within the SBHC is essential for the provision of comprehensive adolescent health care as it allows for seamless referrals and has significantly enhanced the overall depth and quality of holistic care that we are able to provide to the Merlo Station students. Typical services provided at the SBHC include: preventative health, health promotion, anticipatory guidance, mental health evaluation and therapy, immunizations, treatment for acute and chronic conditions, routine and episodic well-child and adolescent care, and general pediatric health education. Administrative services for the SBHC are provided by the on-site clinic director, the SON Assistant Dean for Academic Practice, and SON financial staff.

SBHC staff periodically attend Merlo Station High School classrooms to discuss SBHC services and to conduct SBHC outreach. Such visits are done roughly every six weeks according to academic cycle changes. This in turn, has familiarized the SBHC staff with students, many of whom have then become new patients to the SBHC, and some of whom have opted to inquire about career pathways to becoming a nurse, a social worker, or a medical assistant. SBHC staff members have also been asked to deliver classroom educational sessions on nutrition, exercise, and vaccines. The activities of the renewed Hallways to Health grant (funded by the National School-Based Health Alliance) was initially started within the SON/SBHC and then transferred in February to the Merlo Station High School. The willingness of the Vice Principal, Bill Klatz to continue the important activities of this grant is gratefully acknowledged.

Funding for the operations of the SBHC have been provided from Washington County and represent adequate and generous contributions

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from the State, Beaverton School District, and the Mental Health Expansion grant. Billing for students seen by Gina Silva, the LCSW was started in the Fall of 2015 and these billing services currently meet the expectations of the State for SBHC certification requirements.

Related to personnel, in November one of the MAs resigned and was replaced in January. At the beginning of January, the pediatric nurse practitioner Elizabeth Pruett submitted her resignation from the SON and consequently from the Merlo Station SBHC; this resignation became effective February 5th. Two FNP faculty (Dr. Gary Laustsen & Dr. Mandy McKimmy) from the SON were able to adjust their existing academic schedules to provide medical coverage due to this unexpected resignation. Medical services provided by the nurse practitioner were reduced to three days per week but MA and mental health services continue to be offered five days a week. Dr. Laustsen, as Assistant Dean for Academic Practice also assumed the role of Clinic Director. Students in some of the advanced practice nursing programs in the SON have participated in clinical training with the nurse practitioners at the SBHC.

Efforts to have a selected electronic health records (EHR) system installed at the SBHC were delayed in early Fall 2015. Exploration of other systems was initiated but with an anticipated new medical sponsor assuming operations, no further efforts to install an EHR system was made. The on-site clinical director has continued to participate in the Washington County SBHC Initiative Steering Committee meetings.

The availability of adequate and suitable space for the SBHC operations continues to be a topic for future consideration. There is a need for a larger space for mental health services and a confidential office space for medical providers. A restroom for use only for SBHC services would also be an additional improvement.

Attached is a summary of patient care services for September 2015 to March 2016.
