

Referendum being considered would do what?



New Prek - 5 School

- Energy efficient
- ☐ Full size gym for Elementary 6,000 square feet
- □ 100% AC
- ☐ Will meet CT High Performance Building Standards
- ☐ 600 students
- \square 82,000+/- square feet
- ☐ Will meet school security infrastructure standards
- ☐ Replaces 20 year old TCLC portables

Converts Brown School to a K-5 School

- □ Converts 5 classrooms to 4Kindergarten classrooms
- Bathroom and ADA upgrades
- ☐ Security Upgrades
- ☐ Furniture renewal including library
- Outdoor classroom



Existing Benefits of Brown

- ☐ Full size gym
- ☐ Auditorium (not typical for a K-5 school)
- ☐ 100% AC (except gym/locker room)
- ☐ Large updated outdoor play area
- ☐ Large Library

Polson Updates

- ☐ 1960 Building
- ☐ Ventilation Systems Replacement
- ☐ Electrical Renovation
- ☐ Expand Air Conditioning System (50% of school is air conditioned now)
- Auditorium Upgrades/Improvements (auditorium is not air conditioned now)

Benefits

- Currently owned by Town
- Creates campus feel with connection to Polson and Hand

Concerns

- Softball and Field Hockey fields will need to be relocated which would be expensive and take them off-line for 2-4 years
- Current Jeffrey School would be razed
- Construction in front of Polson for 18 months

Concerns

- Land has not been purchased at this time
- Not as close to Polson and Hand
- Utilities will cost more


Benefits


- Larger land than site #1

- Does not disrupt athletic fields





Elementary Projections (Medium)






- Enrollments projected to rebound next year as homeschool students, delayed entry students, and private school students return to MPS
- Projections show steady increase in elementary enrollment over the next five years as larger birth cohorts enter kindergarten
- Elementary enrollment is projected to level off at about 720 students over the final five years of the projections





Intermediate School Projections (Medium)



 Brown Intermediate School enrollment projected to increase by 25.4% over the next ten years, reaching 400 students by 2030-31



Cost of Referendum VS. Not doing Referendum

\$85 Million Estimated Referendum cost

Estimated Referendum Cost:

\$85 Million

Estimated reimbursement from the state: \$10 Million Estimated net cost of the project to Madison: \$75 Million

Remaining future CIP project costs on all schools post-referendum through 2026: \$44 Million



- Results in 4 schools versus 6 school sites
- Supported by the Tri-Boards
- Combines Pre-k into an elementary school
- Average age of schools after new school is built = 35.5 years old

Cost of Referendum VS. Not doing Referendum

\$100 Million

Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) alone

• CIP plan would cost \$100 Million on 5 schools



- Status of Pre-school and Pre-school building in Madison is not addressed
- No modernized learning spaces
- Still have aging school buildings Average Age = 49 years old

Operating Cost Savings Estimate

- Electrical we anticipate saving \$30,000 to potentially over \$100,000 depending on the school that is build.
- Transportation eliminate one school site and different time for drop off.
 Would be more efficient but not anticipating significant savings.
- Not anticipating overall staffing savings at this time.
