Presentations/ Recognitions Bridget Matamoros-Mota, Guyer High School was recently honored the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST). Established in 1983, PAEMST is the highest award given by the U.S. Government to K-12 teachers of mathematics and science. A panel of distinguished mathematicians, scientists, and educators at the State and national levels assess the applications before recommending nominees to the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy. Matamoras-Mota began her teacher career at Guyer High School in 2007. She currently serves as the Mathematics Department Chair teaching 11th and 12th grade Statistics, Advanced Placement (AP) Statistics, and Dual Credit Statistics.

COVID-19 Update Dr. Richardson, Denton County Health Department provided the Trustees with an update on the Coronavirus within Denton County. Denton as of today, there is a total of 9406 confirmed cases, 2109 active cases, 7199

recovered cases, with 98 deaths. COVID-19 cases in Denton County case counts are declining and the curve is flattening. Dr. Richardson provide the Board with an overview of the Covid-19 reporting survey Denton County Health Department has developed. The reporting survey has a parent student reporting and a staff (attendance clerks or registrar) reporting survey. ISD's and campuses are already pre-populated in the survey. The Dashboard will provide public information that can be filtered by the school district and campus levels. The Denton County Health department is hoping to have the survey active within the next week.

Susannah O'Bara, Area Superintendent reviewed the procedures for COVID-19 positive cases for students and employee cases.

Dr. Mike Mattingly reviewed the Connectivity preparation for teachers and parents for virtual learning. A Parent Education Support Hotline is available for Denton ISD parents to call beginning Wednesday, August 26 through September 4 from 9 am until 7 pm. Parents may receive assistance on a variety of issues such as Canvas or Seesaw, log-in issues, attendance, transportation, meal service, safety protocols, etc.

Dr. Gwen Perkins, Area Superintendent provided the Board of Trustees about the Hybrid model for secondary students. The hybrid model assists in supporting teachers and students being safe considering the numbers of individuals they interact with daily. An example of this would be a secondary math class with 32 students in which 5 are connected learners and 27 are face to face. By utilizing the hybrid model, the teacher is interacting synchronously/face-to-face with 5 students (online) and 13 - 14 students face-to-face (in-class) daily versus managing safety protocols while instructing/monitoring 27 students face-to-face in class. Students will be divided into Cohort A-L: attending on Mondays, Wednesdays, and every other Friday. Cohort M-Z: attending on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and every other Friday. Students will be working remotely on their days not on campus. All students will have Universal ID's which include student Cohorts on their ID's.

Chris Bomberger, Executive Director of Risk Management& Child Nutrition provided an update for the Table to Truck meal program as well as the cafeteria service for campuses.

Dr. Robert Stewart, Asst. Superintendent of Human Resources provided an overview of the Ed Covid Leave requests, resignations due to Covid and the contact tracing for Covid cases.

Discussion of Legislative Priorities in Preparation of the 87 Legislative Session Deron Roberson, General Counsel and Gwen Perkins, Area Superintendent reviewed legislative priorities from the 86<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session and begin discussion with the Board of Trustees in consideration of outlining their legislative priorities for the 87<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session.

Discussion of Asynchronous Learning Plan Dr. Mattingly, Asst. Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction shared the Denton ISD Asynchronous Learning Plan (Connected Learning), a 37-page plan that describes how virtual learning will be implemented in Denton ISD. The plan will require board approval prior to submission to the TEA for further review and approval. The workshop will give a brief description of the eight sections of the Connected Learning Plan:

- The Basics
- Core Principles
- Curriculum and Instructional Materials
- Progress Monitoring and Student Experience
- Academic Delivery and Implementation
- Instructional Schedule
- Staff Deployment and Support
- Family Engagement

Connected Learning allows Pk-12th grade students to stay enrolled at their home campus while taking courses as fully remote option. Students remain connected to their teachers and peers, and the return to school is seamless; all coursework and credits transfer back without complication. Students will receive a combination of:

- **Synchronous** Students and teachers are in real-time interactive virtual learning.
- **Asynchronous** Students engage in learning content independently and on their own time. It is not at their own pace.

Final Results-Sale of Unlimited Tax School Building Bonds, Series 2020 Dr. Scott Niven, Chief Financial Officer outlined the results of the final bond sale from the 2018 bond issue. Overall, the District sold \$308 million in bonds with an overall interest rate of 1.93%. These results will save the taxpayer over \$43 million in future interest costs

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Growth Report

Rocky Gardiner, Templeton Demographics provided the Board of Trustees the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Growth Report. The impact of Covid-19 saw record levels of unemployment rising in May after states began to reopen. Leisure and hospitality and retail trade accounted for the largest share of the employment increase after accounting for the largest declines. Unemployment rate is 13.3%. Texas and DFW's unemployment rates peaked in May and began dropping in June with the largest declines in leisure, hospitality, education and health services.

Median home prices remain near record highs across the state. Home inventory was tight as sales dropped in April. In the month of June total monthly home sales rebounded and surpassed 2019 levels in Austin, DFW, Houston and San Antonio. Low interest rates resulted in a fast recovery for the housing market and we are growing faster than a year ago. Annual starts are up by 15%, annual closings are 12.4 % and builders may exceed their 2020 projections. DFW multi-family market is down about 1% and has not fared as well. Denton ISD is now ranked as the fastest growing school district in DFW based on new housing with 2841 annual closings. Denton ISD has 55 actively building subdivisions with 42 future subdivisions and approximately 4,881 future multi-family units in the planning stages.

Mr. Ryan also provided an overview of the conceptional design plans for Braswell High School additions that includes a classroom wing addition which is planned for a 9<sup>th</sup> grade addition. The classroom wing will increase the student capacity from the current 2400 to 3200 students. Garry also reviewed the new stadium complex that will hold approximately 7000. The complex will include a track, food truck area, new home and visitor locker rooms, media suite in the press box and a press box lobby.

2020 Summer School Programs Report Dr. Dan Ford provided the Board with an update of the 2020 Summer School programs including Bilingual/ESL and Secondary. Elementary students attended a half day program for 12 instructional days during the month of June. The funding for this program came from Student Success Initiative, Title I funds, and Special Education funds. These funds were used for instructional materials, payroll, and transportation. Students in grades 3-5 attended 12 virtual instructional days during the month of June. The 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grade June Summer School was successful at providing meaningful interventions to the students because of the specialized support that is

provided by Teachers, Special Education Teachers, and Curriculum Specialists. Special Education Inclusion teachers were able to support the classroom teachers and provided specialized instruction. Additionally, a Reading Specialist and a Math Specialist worked alongside the classroom teachers in a coaching capacity to ensure instructional time with students was maximized and meaningful.

In July students in grades 1-5<sup>th</sup> attended 8 days of face-to-face instruction for the jump start program. Every Elementary campus hosted Jump Start with the exception of Wilson Elementary due to construction issues. Wilson students attended Ginnings for their Jump Start program.

Elementary Bilingual ESL upcoming kindergarten and first grade students with online support and instruction using Zoom and other video streaming platforms to connect with students daily, Monday – Thursday, from June 8 – 25. The BE/ESL Department distributed instructional supplies for each student, including 35 chrome books and 15 jetpacks. Every upcoming kindergarten and first grade student in summer school was able to fully participate and obtain access to the curriculum. All students were provided targeted instruction based on their individual needs according to EOY SELI and ELI data. Experienced instructional teachers supported these students by providing targeted language and content instruction on a daily basis.

Middle School Summer School was held virtually in two separate sessions. Session I was held June 1- June 18, 2020 and session II was held July 6- July 23, 2020. Summer School required a combination of collaborative meetings: whole group zoom, small group zoom, and one-on-one zoom meetings. Students had access to google classroom through their SSO portal and were introduced to a variety of activities.

High School Summer School was held 100% online from June 1-July 23, 2020. Summer school was offered as a free educational resource for all students in need of credit repair. Canvas was used as the online classroom where teacher check-ins, announcements, and messaging took place. Edgenuity was used for content delivery. Teachers monitored progress and graded within the Edgenuity courseware.

InfoSnap and Connected Learning Update Dr. Gwen Perkins, Area Superintendent provided the Board with the current numbers of student registrations. Denton ISD utilizes an InfoSnap online registration system to manage enrollment/registration of our returning students and our new to Denton students. This report provides an update of completed registrations for returning students and new student enrollment within the system as of August 25, 2020. The report provides the number of returning students, by campus, who have completed online registration,

together with the number of those students who expressed an interest in the Connected Learning program and the number of new students, by campus, who have completed online registration, together with the number of new students who expressed an interest in the Connected Learning program. As of August 25, 2020, we have 30,669 students registered, 14,000 + registered for Connected Learning with a 47% interest in Connected Learning.

Open Forum

Candi Harris - My husband and I are parents to 4 boys, ages 14, 11, 6, and 4. We are also full-time employees for organizations that have extended to us the opportunity to work from home during this challenging time. Like many other parents, we are concerned about the current health crisis and are working to be as cautious as we can when moving about our daily lives. Like many other parents, we too hope for the best education for our boys and believe that public school can offer that. However, we have a tiny village here in Denton – the six of us and my mother-in-law and older brother; out of concern for our own health as well as theirs, we've decided to enroll our boys in the Connected Learning plan. Unlike many parents, we are in a unique position to be able to work from home while our children learn online. I applaud the district for maintaining an option for those children who need to be in school for whatever reason. We, however, are privileged to be able to choose the CL program. With what little information was sent out, we decided to go with this option hoping for a good teacher-led experience. While school has not yet started, I already have some concerns that I want to share with you tonight.

I have read the district plan on CL – I wish this was presented to parents earlier in the decision-making process. One section addresses the communication that has been sent out to parents – the videos that included CL info. These videos discussed "predictability and consistency" and mentioned that teachers will be provided with the "best training". The one specifically about elementary reports that students in CL will have a similar experience to those learning in person. I am concerned about how true this will be in the coming weeks/months.

• While a colleague of mine shared info about a dedicated remote teacher for her school, I have learned that at our elementary school will not have this person for 1st grade specifically. I am concerned that teachers needing to spend dedicated time with students in the classroom will not have enough time to also balance adequate interaction with students at home via synchronous learning time. I anticipated assisting my children with virtual learning, but with the information we've received in the last day or so, it seems we will need to be their actual teacher. I would love to see dedicated teachers to the remote learners.

- Our first meet-the-teacher call via Zoom didn't go very well at all. The teacher has a terrible connection (in the classroom) and we, along with others on the call, could not understand most of what was going on. She would call on students, just to talk over them asking if they were there. Then, she would move on to another child while the previous one was still talking. You could see the kids getting frustrated and my own son asked if we could leave about 10 minutes into the call. Several participants didn't know that they were not muted...and the teacher didn't seem to know that she could mute them on her end as a host. Other parents have shared similar stories and as someone choosing virtual learning for their children, this concerns me about the going forward. Allowing exceptions for significant technology issues, I do hope we will see virtual instruction that makes good use of the technology platforms such as Zoom.
- Communication has been absolutely terrible. I know the district has sent out several emails and videos, however if these videos and emails aren't consistent with what we're getting from the campus, we're left to be confused and frustrated. When calling the McNair campus about my confusion, I was told "I guess you'll know something by Tuesday night". Now, we're being told that we'll know something every week about how the schedule for that week will go that does not seem predictable. It seems like we'll need to spend time every Sunday trying to figure out what the next week will look like.

I know that we are all frustrated and trying to figure this thing out. However, I expected that with a summer to plan moving forward in what is clearly a long-term pandemic, that this would have gone much more smoothly than it has. I expected communication to be much more transparent. This does not leave me feeling very confident in the Connected Learning program. It has only left me grateful that I have the ability to rework my schedule to work with my children for much more of the day than originally planned. Unfortunately, not every parent has this ability and I'm worried that this will continue to widen the achievement gap.
