## 2016-2017 College and Career Guide Report

This position has provided me with the opportunity to assist students as they transition into post-secondary options. This report was created to share the value of creating a college bound culture within our schools, while providing evidence and outcomes of the existing program.

During these events, I provided an informational table which covered Act/Sat testing dates, application deadlines, scholarships, summer programs, and more. I was also able to meet and connect with many of the parents which have in turn helped with the promotion of college awareness. This was also a great chance to help make the students and community aware of my position and what assistance is available.

## College and Career Advisor Events

- 1) BHS College Application Night November 8<sup>th</sup>
  The goal of College Application Night was to educate parents and students of the deadlines that are vital to the college going process. We discussed ACT/SAT tests, admissions deadlines, scholarship deadlines, and the importance of filling out the FAFSA. There were many volunteers that came to assist students with FAFSA information as well as entities who were in attendance to promote their scholarship and internship opportunities. In attendance of this event we had 21 seniors, 12 parents, 3 staff members, and 10 other volunteers.
- 2) College and Career Fair February 2<sup>nd</sup>
  The College and Career Fair was created to showcase the many schools, programs, and career options for our students. We had 7 colleges represented along with another 8-10 local entities in attendance to share information about upcoming job opportunities for our students. For this event 37 students, 12 parents, 3 staff, and 27 volunteers or representatives were present. The event lasted approximately two hours and provided an opportunity for many of these students to reach out and begin to think about what their future options are.

## 3) College Night

February 3<sup>rd</sup> The college representatives were able to set up tables during the weekend of our Wasilla basketball games. There were good turnouts at each of the tables from community members who were attending the basketball games. This was a great opportunity for the community to

see the representatives present at the games while in turn providing the recruiters the opportunity to connect with the community during an event which is obviously well attended.

#### 4) College Preview Day April 1st

This event was created for our seniors to have the experience of being on a college campus. Some of the key elements of this preview day included the in-class activities, tour, and our guest who presented scholarships and even included a reality fair which students who participated were entered to win scholarships specifically for this event. We had 14 seniors who participated in this event. Of the fourteen, nine were students who had traveled in from other villages. Ilisagvik and ASRC covered the costs of these students travel and stay. ASRC also participated in this event by hosting them for a career readiness session which included discussions regarding resume and interview skills, along with other career readiness topics. This was a huge step for many of these students who now feel much more confident going into the college and career environment.
