Scarecrows go up at Fort Vannoy Elementary

With Halloween around the corner, third-, fourth- and fifth-grade students at Fort Vannoy Elementary School on Thursday put up scarecrows they made with their families.

"We display them for the whole month of October every year," said Kim Nelson, Parent-Teacher Organization president for Fort Vannoy. "It's sort of a Fort Vannoy tradition."

Students make the scarecrows at home with their families before bringing them to school the first full week of October. The scarecrows get tied up to the front fence on campus.

"They get to see them every day they go to school and then go home," Nelson said. "They're all on the fence line, and it's a fun little project we get to do."

The scarecrows took many forms and were made from a variety of materials. Some had pumpkin heads, some were clothed with old clothes from other family members, and some had funny hats.

"We got my old straw hat and I put some feathers in it and attached the crow," said 8-year-old Alena Hogan. "We painted it with black dye and I put some glitter on top to make it look special."

While scarecrows sometimes look scary, Fort Vannoy students were asked to make theirs friendly and fun.

Eden Bolen, 8, had one of the friendliest scarecrows of all, outfitted with a pink princess dress and black felt hair.

"Mine's wearing a play dress," Bolen said. "We've had it for a long time and we don't really care about it anymore, so I use this one for my scarecrow."

Area high schools gather for anti-bullying campaign

Students from every high school between Rogue River and Merlin congregated outside the Josephine County Courthouse on Thursday to kick off an anti-bullying campaign.

Project HALT, which stands for Helping All Local Teens, is an initiative by the Josephine County Foundation organized to raise awareness of the issue and fight against bullying and violence.

More than 85 students from Hidden Valley High School, Grants Pass High School, North Valley, Illinois Valley, New Hope Christian and Rogue River all agreed to run in a 103-mile relay linking the schools today.

After the ceremony, Hidden Valley senior Garret Marcoulier and classmates Sayge Pereira and Averie Richter kicked off the first leg of the relay with a run from the courthouse to Grants Pass High School.

"We hope to see teens running from school to school to bring awareness throughout our community," said Pereira.

Our goal is to have every community member, student and school involved in our project in some way."

All students participating in the run today ran a mile each, tag-teaming the entire stretch.

"More than 85 students have given up their Friday to be part of this run," Marcoulier said. "It takes a lot of people and brave administrators to come and join us and pledge their time to help stop bullying."

The project couldn't have come at a better time. Last Friday a message was found scrawled on a bathroom wall at Rogue River Jr./Sr. High School threatening that someone was planning a school shooting earlier this week. The message didn't say why, and school staff believe it was a prank, but bullying is often cited as an underlying cause for shootings and other violence in American schools.

According to a survey last year, 20 percent of students at Rogue River Jr./Sr. High School felt bullied. Last year it was 4 percent, due to efforts on the part of school staff to eliminate the problem.

Other schools haven't tracked numbers on the level Rogue River schools have, but local officials see the need to push an anti-bullying effort forward. Organizers of the relay race felt an awareness campaign was one of the best ways students could champion the cause.

"We need to get everybody to step up, talk about it and be there as a community," said Chris Pendleton, executive director of the Josephine County Foundation. "You just take all these pieces and put it together, and you have an avenue to open up some doors. "Organizers hope to get community members and local high school students to see that bullying is no longer socially acceptable.

"Bullying is not fun for the kids who get bullied, and it's wrong when others see it and don't say something," said Richter, a Hidden Valley junior and one of the relay organizers. "Those who are bullied should be able to speak out and have that voice."
