1. What's new at CIHS?

On November 20th Seventy three C-I music students along with nine adult chaperones, Mr. and Mrs. Olson and Ms. Planer embarked on an educational and musical adventure! The Crosby-Ironton high school band and choir toured the cities of Memphis and New Orleans. Students and chaperones had a fantastic time performing, visiting museums and different cultural areas of both cities.

The tour started with a band clinic at the University of Memphis with Dr. Albert Nguyen and a choir clinic with Dr. Demetrius Robinson. Students were able to perform for both directors and then have a chance to work with and learn from these talented college conductors. The next stop was tour of Graceland. The choir was asked to do am impromptu performance upon arrival. They had the chance to sing the national anthem at the visitor's center in the Graceland compound. From there, the two buses headed to the National Civil Rights Museum. Students were able to view the balcony and room where Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated. The museum also had the window propped open from across the street, so visitors could see where the deadly bullet originated. That night students had a tasty dinner at Alfred's on Beale and were able to shop along Beale Street.

On Thanksgiving Day, the group returned to Alfred's for a fantastic Thanksgiving lunch feast. This group consisted of clarinet, trumpet, trombone, piano, string bass and drumset. The band was stellar!!! The musicians talked about how they ended up playing professionally and answered questions from C-I students. The swamp tour was the other highlight for many students. Each swamp boat driver was hilarious and connected well with high schoolers. Students on Brandon's boat got to meet and hold several of his "pets" including Morty the crayfish, Flapjack the softshell turtle, Malachi the corn snake and Handbag the baby alligator!

Mr. Olson and Ms. Planer were so happy to be able to share this experience with music students from Crosby-Ironton. This trip was a once in a lifetime event for most.
