

Unauthorized Leave

Definition

“Unauthorized leave” is defined as nonperformance of those duties and responsibilities assigned by the district and its representatives including all duties and responsibilities as defined by statutes, rules and regulations of the State Board of Education; policies of the Board and administrative regulations of the district. Such unauthorized leave may include, but is not limited to, collective refusals to provide service, unauthorized use of sick leave, unauthorized use of other leave benefits, nonattendance at required meetings and failure to perform assigned duties at school-sponsored activities.

An employee is deemed to be on unauthorized leave at such time and on such occasion as the employee may absent him/herself from required duties.

Disciplinary Action

Unauthorized leave shall constitute a breach of contract and, therefore, may result in the initiation of dismissal procedures, loss of salaries or such disciplinary actions as may be deemed appropriate.

Beginning on the first day of unauthorized leave, no salary will be awarded to an employee who has not faithfully performed all duties prescribed.

Verification of Absence

The superintendent or the supervisor of an employee may require a physician’s verification as to an employee’s claimed reason for absence in any situation which it is believed that no valid grounds exist for the employee’s absence. Any employee missing five consecutive days of work will provide a physician’s verification for the absence. Verification shall be made within five working days of the absence.
