Secretary Corpus Christi, District 2 The Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) were approved by the State Board of Education in 1997 and implemented in the schools in Texas in fall 1998. Two courses in the TEKS are available under which districts may choose to offer curriculum such as your Alma A. Allen, Ed.D. Bible course curriculum. It would be a local district decision, of course, but innovative Houston, District 4 course approval would not be necessary if districts choose to offer curriculum such as Linda Bauer yours in the following two established courses. The Woodlands, District 8 Joe J. Bernal, Pb.D. Special Topics in Social Studies; TAC §113.38, Social Studies. In this San Antonio, District 3 course, students are provided the opportunity to apply the knowledge David Bradley and skills of the social sciences to a variety of topics and issues, Beaumont, District 7 including the use of critical thinking, problem-solving, and decision-Bob Craig making skills. Upon successful completion of the course, students are Lubbock, District 15 awarded one-half unit of credit. There are currently four PEIMS Pat Hardy numbers for this course, so students may take this course with different Fort Worth, District 11 content for a maximum of two credits. Mavis B.
