#### Texas Primary Results

- Voter Turnout: As we discussed in the Fall of 2011 the primary results did set the stage for the 2013 session.
- There are fewer registered voters in Texas today than there were at the time of the gubernatorial primary in 2010.
- Republicans outvoted democrats
- 1.4 million (11.56%) registered voters voted in the Republican primary and 587,000 (4.5%) voted in the Democratic primary.
- 13 million registered voters

#### Texas Primary Results cont.

- State Board of Education (15 members)
  - 3 members did not seek re-election: Craig, Berlanga, and Farney
  - 3 incumbents lost their bid for re-election: Soto, Clayton, and Lowe.
- SBOE Runoff Battles
  - District 2 (D): Cortez upset Sanchez
  - District 10 (R): Maynard upset Osborne
  - District 13 (R): Miller upset Spurlock

#### Texas House Turnover-Primary

- Turnover from last session plus 20% new members this election cycle could mean as many as 50% of house members will be freshmen or sophomores in 2013.
- 91 seats have no general election contest or a third party challenge
- 30 members did not seek re-election (7 D/23 R)
- 13 Chairmanship vacancies
- 40 members not returning-this number may increase after the general election.

#### **Texas Senate-Primary**

- 4 senators did not seek re-election, which includes chair of Senate Education and Senate Finance (Shapiro and Ogden)
- Big surprise in District 25, where Senator Wentworth lost to Donna Campbell
- 4 chairmanship vacancies (Senate Education, Jurisprudence, Economic Development, and Transportation & Homeland Security).

  - Weber-Retired- U.S. House District 14
  - Allen- unopposed in general election
  - Aycock-has an opponent
  - Dutton- unopposed in general election
  - Guillen- has an opponent
  - Huberty- has an opponent
  - Strama- unopposed in general election

#### Where are they now?

- Senate Education Committee
   At least 2 of the 9 will not be returning
  - Shapiro, Chair-Retired
  - Ogden- Retired
  - Patrick, Vice Chair-has an opponent
  - Carona- unopposed
  - Davis- has an opponent
  - Gallegos-has an opponent
  - Sellger- unopposed
  - Van De Putte-unopposed

## Key Leadership Positions in Education

- What is ahead for newly appointed Commissioner Michael Williams?
  - TEA Sunset from last session
  - LBB Budget request (10% Cut) Departmental
  - \$5.4 billion cuts to k-12 from last session
  - Agency and ESC cuts from 2011
  - New Accountability Systems from last session
  - Senate Confirmation
  - School Finance Litigation
- K-12 Leadership positions open & filled
  - New Senate Education Committee Chair: OPEN
  - New Senate Finance Committee Chair: Sen. Tommy Williams
  - New House Public Education Committee Chair: OPEN
  - New Pensions and Investments Chair: OPEN

## State Budget Outlook: thus far...

- Sunny forecast for the Rainy Day Fund (to be used???)
  - aka: Texas Economic Stabilization Fund
  - Current estimate at \$7.3 billions by the end of 2013up from \$6.5 billion estimate during the last session
  - Increase in oil and gas productions is the main reason for the increase
  - BUT remember it takes 3/5 vote to close prior previous gaps and 2/3 vote to spend for other reasons
  - State sales tax continues to increase (almost 10% over last year)

## State Budget Outlook: thus far...

- Leadership asks agencies to find 10% cuts 2014-15
- LBB asks agencies to find 10% cuts in 5% increments in drafting 2014-15 budget requests
  - Exceptions to the request : PSF, debt service for bond authorizations, Medicaid, contribution requirements for pensions.
  - REMINDER: PSF was NOT spared last session
- LBB also told agencies their baseline budgets can't exceed current appropriations. Agencies can request exceptional items.

(TEA could request SSI funding)

- In addition, the LBB letter also noted additional cuts may be necessary during the second year of the biennium
- Sales tax up, job growth up, but still uncertainty
