23974 Special Presentations:

Recognition of Student Spaceflight Experiments Program: Thanks to the work of the ECISD Innovation Department, its PICK Education initiative, and some very generous sponsors, 13 Falcon Early College High School students had the opportunity to compete in the Student Spaceflight Experiments Program. ECISD was one of 31 communities in the U.S., Canada, and Brazil accepted into the program which offered students the chance to develop their own science experiments that potentially could be conducted by astronauts at the International Space Station. The three experiments that were chosen as finalist and were submitted to the National Center for Earth and Space Science Education all came from Falcon Early College High School.

Recognition of Bushman Grant Recipients: Local businessman John Bushman contributed \$100,000 to ECISD in an effort to impact student learning. The plan devised called for awarding five grants of \$20,000 each with \$10,000 being dedicated to the project and \$10,000 to the individual grant writer. Another stipulation was that three of the grants needed to benefit the three ECISD schools in their fifth year of Improvement Required status (the grants benefiting these three schools did not have to be written by a teacher at those schools), Ector Middle School, Noel Elementary, and Zavala Elementary.

The five winning grants and authors are:

Amanda Webber, Hays Elementary 5th grade teacher, whose grant begins a partnership between 5th grade teachers at Hays and Zavala to increase digital literacy of teachers and students.

Janie Steele, Hays Elementary Media Specialist, whose grant is for Zavala and Noel to participate in the reading contest known as the Battle of Texas 2x2 Books.

Stephanie Green and Sydney Garcia, Hays Elementary 2nd grade and 1st grade teachers, whose grant creates a partnership with Zavala to allow students to become "engineers" and learn how to use the Engineering Design Process.

Ronda Rodriguez, Blackshear Elementary 5th grade teacher, whose grant promises to take Blackshear students on virtual field trips to experience and explore all areas of science curriculum through a Google Expedition Virtual Reality kit.

Andrea Crenshaw, Ector Middle School Science teacher, also designed a grant to use Google Expedition Virtual Reality goggles for students to take trips all over the world.

Recognition of Education Foundation Emergency Grants: The Education Foundation of Odessa continues to create opportunities for education in ECISD. The Foundation opened a special grant cycle this fall specifically for the six schools that are in their 5th or 3rd year of Improvement Required status. ECISD teachers submitted 28 grants with 21 of them being funded in the amount of \$37,529. Teachers will implement these grants in the spring semester.

Recognition of National Merit Scholarship Program Honorees: Each year approximately 1.6 million high school students enter the competition by taking the Preliminary SAT (PSAT). Students take the PSAT during their junior year of high school and are recognized as they begin their senior year. Of approximately 250,000 Hispanic/Latino high school juniors who take the PSAT only about 5,000 (the top 2%) are honored as National Hispanic Scholars. Recognition of Washington Post's Most Challenging High Schools List: Odessa High School and Permian High School were recognized for being named to the Most Challenging High School List, this being the second year in a row OHS has made the list. Odessa High School was ranked #1,553 and Permian High School was ranked #1,928. According to the Washington Post, Odessa and Permian High Schools are among the leaders in public schools who are pushing students to achieve through participation in exams such as Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate.

Recognition of Odessa High School selected as Coca-Cola Valued Youth Program Site of the Year: Odessa High School received recognition as site of the year by representatives of IDRA, the organization that created the program. This distinction highlights the effective and innovative ways OHS implements the program. The CCVYP is a student-to-student tutoring program in which atrisk high school students are selected to be mentors and tutors to struggling elementary students.

Recognition of Odessa High School Qualifiers for National Thespian Festival: The International Thespian Society (ITS), founded in 1929, is an honorary organization for high school theatre students located at more than 4,600 affiliated secondary schools across America and abroad. The mission of the International Thespian Society is to honor student achievement in the theatre arts. This year, six Odessa High School students participated in the state festival: Karis Cox, Juan Rivera, Jonathan Spruill, Vianka Suchil, Keylee Dennis, and Caitlynn Almance. Two of these students, Vianka Suchil and Juan Rivera, qualified for the national competition in duet acting. These students have earned the opportunity to represent Odessa High School at the national level. The National Festival and Competition will be held on Jun 25 through June 30 in Lincoln Nebraska.

Recognition of 2017 Mark of Excellence National Percussion Ensemble Honors: The Foundation for Music Education awarded the Permian High School Percussion Ensemble Commended Honors in the 2017 Mark of Excellence Project. This year 287 of the finest musical ensembles in the nation entered this competition, which included band, choir, orchestra, jazz, and percussion categories. Permian High School Percussion Ensemble group entered a recorded performance which is now featured on the MarkCustom.com website as a permanent archive of the achievement and a

valuable reference and resource for other directors. The Permian Percussion Ensemble is directed by John Carroll.

Recognition of Precision Manufacturing Level I Certifications: Odessa Career & Technical Early College High School (OCTECHS) students Jon Travland, Raul Hurtado, Carter Duke, Rogelio Zoe Zavala, Anastazia Pulido, and Aidan Wheeles walked the stage during Odessa College's graduation ceremony, having all earned their Precision Manufacturing Level I Certificates. These students are part of the first group of OCTECHS who started when the school opened at Odessa College in the Fall of 2015. They are on their way to earning an Associate's Degree from OC by the time they graduate from high school. Students who attend OCTECHS can complete an Associate's Degree along with their high school diploma at no cost.
