

Priority 2:

Michigan DNR Trust Fund Grant Application for Sunken Lake Park Main Campgrounds Upgrade in the total amount of \$250,000 (\$187,500 State; \$62,500 Parks Match, and In-Kind) to upgrade the current campground outdated power poles, place 2 aluminum docks to provide access to the lake with a fishing platform, upgrade the current gravel road in to the main campground from the day use area, guardrails place for safety in an area left of the driveway and improve the office/store to preserve this building that was built in the 30's by the CCC.

Alpena County Sunken Lake Park is located at 14600 Fletcher Park Road, Posen, MI, 49776 in Presque Isle County, but owned by Alpena County.

The Narrative of Sunken Lake

Sunken Lake Park or what can be referred to as "The Sunrise Side's Wooded Paradise". Sunken Lake is located in western Alpena County in Michigan which is owned and maintained by the Alpena County Commissioners Office. Alpena County covers 1.695 square miles of Northeastern Michigan and has a population of 28,847 as of the 2022 Census. Like most of Northern Michigan, Sunken Lake has a glacial landscape due to Michigan's geological history. Most of Alpena County is covered with surface water such as rivers, lakes, and streams. Soft limestone impacts the land features due to how much water movement there is. At one time, Sunken Lake extended throughout this valley. During the summer, the lake would drain into the sinkhole west of Sunken Lake with unexplored caversn believed to underlie this area. There is lore that claims that the water flowed through an underground stream to Lake Huron. A large logging camp thrived here on the virgin White Pine, Norway Pine, Hemlock, and Cedar trees. Just south of the swings in the picnic area, is the remnants of the old "Tote Road". Here stood horse, barns, and the "Elephant Hall" which was the lumberman's camp.

In 1900, the dam was built to divert water into the north branch of the Thunder Bay River. This helped the "River Driver" to float the logs to the Alpena Saw Mills which build items such as: square timber, cedar and pine shingles, spools, lath, etc..

This area of Alpena and Presque Isle counties is immediately underlain by a thick sequence of Devonian limestones and some shales, called the Traverse Group. They are deposited in an inland sea some 360 to 420 million years ago. At Mystery Valley the bedrock is the Alpena Limestone Formation, in the upper part of the Traverse Group. Approximately 800 feet below Mystery Valley, and below the Traverse Group, is the older Detroit River Group. It includes limestones, shales, and considerable evaporites – anhydrite and gypsum. These two dissolve in water much more readily than limestone. Water circulating at depth is removing these minerals to Lake Huron. They have been totally removed further north by ground water flowing through the rock toward the Great Lakes. Mystery Valley and the basin of Sunken Lake to the east were created by collapse of Traverse Group rocks into the cavities formed by the dissolving of Detroit River Group evaporites, probably nine to ten thousand years ago, as the glaciers retreated from the area.

The result was the settling of large rock blocks with some crushing, and locally the creation of deeper sinkholes. On the southern side and around the deep sinkhole in the Valley are "earth cracks", some large enough for a person to enter. These were created when the wall rocks of the valley slipped toward the valley by separating along natural fractures (joints) in the rock. Evidence for the dissolving of the exaporites is found where the water that goes underground in the sinkholes returns to the surface. It emerges from submerged sinkholes in Lake Huron, twenty miles to the east. The resurgent water is saturated with dissolved gypsum. Michigan was glaciated during the last ice age and considerable amounts of glacial outwash – sand and gravel – mantles the limestone in this area. That these sinkholes are not also filled with outwash sand and gravel shows that they opened to the surface or increased in depth following the melting of the glaciers.

Mystery Valley is now separated from Sunken Lake by an earth dam built in 1899. Prior to that, the North Fork of the Thunder Bay River filled the whole 1.5 mile long valley in the Spring and overflowed into its continuing channel to Thunder Bay. Later in the season, the whole of the North Fork flow diverted into the western end of the valley and disappeared underground in the present deeper sinkhole. The dam permitted logs cut in the upper North Fork area to be floated to Thunder Bay without danger of floating into and being trapped in the blind portion of the valley. Today a lake forms in Mystery Valley from flow rising out of the sinkhole as the water table in the vicinity is raised and the sink hole drainage system is back flooded by spring melt water and rain. By early summer the lake disappears back into the same hole from which it came.

The importance of Sunken Lake truly cannot be denied. Connecting trails to local history helps submerse trail users in their surroundings and it helps cultivate community pride. Alpena, MI, has a history of logging that helped create commerce routes throughout the area. Trails could hold more historical significance if named after the logging founders of Alpena, who were Fletcher, Lockwood, Oldfield, and Minor. Trails improve the quality of life, knowledge within the community, and diversity through increased tourism. The social benefits of trails continue beyond there; they allow families and friends to come together and create a sense of place. By connecting with nature; you truly connect in your relationships. Sunken Lake campground is also placed on the US-23 Heritage Route, starting in Standish, MI, to the Mackinaw Bridge. This Heritage Route covers over 200 miles of road.

Sunken Lake provides camping and recreational opportunities to the residents of Alpena County and tourism to the area. We provide a warm welcome that includes camping, a boat launch, and day use areas for anyone who would like to visit one of our three parks. We also have an additional feature by having a drive-up day use area at Manning Hill. In 2023, we crossed paths and served 12,980 participants and campers. We predominantly serve Alpena County residents. Our camp records indicate that our current campers are from Alpena County and close surrounding areas. With promotion and advertising of the new activities available to our camping residents and visitors, We are hoping to bring more people to our beautiful parks. We are constantly looking to improve the user experience and help connect people to the outdoors.
